

Medford Gets Share Of Storm's Lashing

REPORTS of the "big wind" which savagely tore the top off

Long Island Wednesday being to hit a few of the eastern points, the storm's fury and three windows are out of the big school building, resulting in no classes being called yesterday. Miller's garage on the State road at the rear of their home was blown over. The telephone

system is crippled in many places, telephone poles being out on both Main and Ohio avenues. Losses do not end there, however, as there are a number of houses damaged by falling trees. The whole scene, as in every village along the coast, is a picture of an uprooted appearance.

The first half of the hurricane, the one from the east, took hold of a village that the storm had swept over, and it was that lying on the ground, then the one from the west came along two hours later and brought it right back to its original position.

The Old Palmer-borough in East Moriches was almost completely wrecked.

The huge main doors of the Stony Brook Yacht club, which open out on the water, were swept open by the force of the tide, and when an inspection of the place was made several hours later, a rowboat was found standing in front of the bar.

The gale took hold of the two-car garage on the Ocean property, 15 Terrace court, Patchogue, and it fell in against the Tafe house, exposing the interior to the elements. Total damage: One radiator cap removed.

Brief Highlights of Storm Ruin

The lighting company men also toiled through the night to restore service. Although its current Wednesday night was limited to the business section, Patchogue was one of the villages that had no electric power at all at the time. Throughout the late afternoon, industrial units stalled for various reasons at factories and other machinery lacked electric power.

One station man, referred to as "Old fashioned" because they keep a hand-operated gas pump or two at their stations, resided in some business during the late afternoon and night in sections where the lack of electricity necessitated the closing down of gas customers having only electrically-operated pumps.

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Frederick Schaff's boat-renting business at Mastic Beach, well known throughout Long Island and the metropolitan area, was seriously hit by the storm, many of his small boats being blown up. His car, standing near his stand at the beach, was almost covered over with mud.

If the Patchogue river had risen another foot Wednesday night, the new cabinet being constructed in the Gil Smith bungalow for Sidney N. General would have been lifted off its skids and informally launched.

The George Reich family did not change their summer residence at Cherry Point, but nevertheless they have new neighbors now. At Eastport, a good-sized cabin cruiser, anchored in a covek there before the storm, afterwards was washed on the outer edge of a large thick brooding house 200 feet away.

From Eastport, two smaller cruisers landed in the branches of a pine tree about ten feet off the ground.

Down Moriches way, a two-story bungalow near the shore was submerged for a time and when the tide receded, all that was left of the first floor was the two-story apartment. Siding, plaster and interior wall trimmings were far away.
