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## *THE FIRST GENERATION*

1.2. **DOROTHY POST HUBERT** (24 Oct 1918 - 9 Jan 2021). Born at home at 799 Carroll Street, Brooklyn, New York, during a major influenza epidemic (her mother was so ill that there was concern that both might die). Graduated from Packer Collegiate Institute in Brooklyn Heights, 1935; Vassar College, B.A., 1939 (majored in bacteriology). Worked as a laboratory assistant for a doctor on the east side of New York before she got married. In the 1980s became a trustee for the Post-Morrow Foundation. Died of COVID-19 and pneumonia in the East Patchogue hospital. Ashes buried in Woodland Cemetery in Bellport, L.I.

Married **CURTIS KNOWLES JONES** (14 Aug 1911 - 6 Jan 1989). Born at 3220 Irving Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minnesota, the only child of EDMUND and BESSIE JONES. Family moved to 2511 Lake Place when he was two or three years old. Graduated from West High School in Minneapolis; B.A., 1933, University of Minnesota; B.D., 1936, S.T.M., 1938, and Th.D., 1945, Union Theological Seminary, New York, NY. Met DOROTHY HUBERT while an assistant minister at the First Presbyterian Church in Brooklyn Heights. Married on August 2, 1941 in Brookhaven, L.I. Children: CURTIS, DAVID, and RICHARD. Presbyterian minister at Baldwin, NY, Charleston, WV, New Kensington, PA, Brookville, PA, and Daretown, NJ. Retired to East Patchogue, L.I., in August 1976; continued as interim minister and supply minister in many churches on Long Island. Died in his sleep, at home, of liver cancer. Ashes buried in Woodland Cemetery in Bellport, L.I.

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### *Key to Numbering*

Number to the left of the period: The generation of the ancestor back from Dorothy Jones (first generation).

Number to the right of the period: Divide by two to locate descendent in the next generation. (If the number is odd, add 1 and then divide.) Multiply by two to locate ancestor in prior generation.

## THE SECOND GENERATION

2.3. **PHILIP ARTHUR HUBERT** (8 Jan 1881 - 14 Mar 1969). Born in Stamford, CT. Graduate of Stevens Institute, Hoboken, NJ. Met HELEN POST in Bellport in summer of 1905. Married her on 26 Oct 1910 at 162 Ross Street, Brooklyn (Ralph Flanders, later a Senator from Vermont, was best man). A structural engineer and treasurer of Dual Leathers Corp., 150 Nassau Street, New York City. Brothers: William (20 Sept 1892 - 18 Jan 1920, died of tuberculosis) and Walter (7 Dec 1887 - Dec 1893); sisters: Lily Marianne ("Aunt Lil" -- designed toys for F.A.O. Schwartz; b. 22 Jul 1882 and died in Bellport in 1968), Anna Elizabeth (who loved music and whom PHILIP greatly missed; 28 Feb 1879 - 27 Feb 1889), and Claire (3 Apr 1885 - 14 Apr 1894). Children: James, Helen, Elisabeth, DOROTHY, Louise, Anne, and Philip, Jr. Died of cancer in Brooklyn Heights. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport, L.I.

2.4. **HELEN MARION POST** (6 May 1890 - 28 Dec 1973). Born in Brooklyn, NY. Attended Adelphi Academy in Brooklyn. Died at home at 1 Grace Court, Brooklyn. Sisters: Jessie Wells Post and Elisabeth ("Betty"), wife of Thomas I. Morrow. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport, L.I.

## THE THIRD GENERATION

3.5. **PHILIP WILLIAM GENGEMBRE HUBERT, JR.** (9 Jan 1852 - 3 Jan 1925). Born in Cincinnati, Ohio. Educated at private schools in Boston and Paris. Married on 1 Jun 1878 at St. John's Church in Stamford, CT. Music critic for the *New York Evening Post* (1877-90) and *New York Herald* (1890-94). After his Thoreau-esque attempt in Bellport (with his family), he returned to the editorial staff of *New York Herald* (1906-11). Author of *Liberty and a Living* (1885), *Nursery Lesson Book* (1886), *Inventors* (1893), *The Stage as a Career* (1900) and a history of the Merchants' National Bank of New York. Also wrote plays: "Insanity for Two," "Lightning Courtship," "Tickled to Death," and "A Railway Tragedy--Perhaps." (The plays are not mentioned in any obituary.) Decided on a summer home in Bellport when he and a friend (an architect named Rich) wanted to find a summer place for their families and asked the Long Island Railroad ticket-seller for tickets to Bayport; they received tickets to Bellport by mistake, but liked Bellport so much that they stayed. Died in Bellport of arterio sclerosis. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport. His sister Marie Hubert Frohman was an actress and mother of Philip Hubert Frohman, architect of the National Cathedral of the Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C.

3.6. **ANNA HAIGHT HOLMES** (25 Jul 1855 - 12 Feb 1943). From Stamford, CT. First organist in Christ Episcopal Church in Bellport, L.I. (the three stained glass windows over the altar are in memory of three of their children who died when she and PHILIP first came to Bellport). Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport, L.I.

3.7. **JAMES HOWELL POST** (13 Oct 1859 - 5 Mar 1938). Born in New Rochelle, NY, during the temporary residence of his parents there. Married on 26 Oct 1887 at the South Third Street Presbyterian Church in Williamsburg, NY (then a separate city from Brooklyn) by LOUISA's father. Started in business with B. H. Howell, Son & Co., sugar merchants located at 129 Front Street, New York, NY. Became president and board member of the National Sugar

Refining Co. of New Jersey (“Jack Frost”), with refineries in Long Island City and elsewhere. A director of various sugar importing companies, banks, American-Hawaiian Steamboat Co., insurance companies, Brooklyn Edison Co., Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit Co., New York Rapid Transit Co., Underwood Typewriters Co., and other companies. Philanthropist, well-known and well-respected in New York City in his day, giving both time and money. Concerned especially with children in Brooklyn; also interested in many institutions, including the Brooklyn Eye and Ear Hospital, Princeton Theological Seminary, and Adelphi College and Adelphi Academy. One day he refused to give money to a man who then complained “Why do you give so much to Jewish organizations?” He replied, “All I am I owe to a Jew.” “Who was that?” “Jesus Christ.” The man stormed out, exclaiming, “Damn it all to hell!” Awarded LL.D. from Colgate University in 1929. Gave the village of Brookhaven the building for the Brookhaven Free Library, and land along Beaver Dam Creek and along Carmans River for a boat landing. Died at 88 Remsen Street, Brooklyn, and buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport. (His sister Mary Post Cantine [“Aunt Molly”] is buried nearby.)

3.8. **LOUISA HENDERSON WELLS** (25 Nov 1859 - 5 Mar 1944). Born at parsonage, South Third Street Presbyterian Church, Williamsburg, NY. Died at 88 Remsen Street, Brooklyn, and buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport, L.I.

#### *THE FOURTH GENERATION*

4.9. **PHILIPPE WILLIAM GENGEMBRE HUBERT** (30 Aug 1830 - 15 Nov 1911). A Renaissance man. Born in St. Owens, Paris. “Christened on a barricade as he came into the world during one of those lively occasions when the Parisians have fought in the streets for a new cause. Politics and patriotism were blended into the event and a tri-colored cockade was pinned upon the baby’s dress.” (N.Y. Times 7/12/1914.) His father was wounded that day. Spent his first 9 years with his grandfather, until the latter’s death. While his grandfather was in court persuading King Louis Philippe to reduce the length of French workers’ workday, little Philippe was running around and making noise; to keep him quiet, the king put him in a wastebasket and gave him a little ivory figurine to play with. At age 14, ran away to Indret, but since his grandfather had died (and his grandmother had left), he could not enjoy the comforts of the governor’s residence or the privileges of being the governor’s grandson. Worked 12-hour days as an iron worker; the first week he slept outdoors in a hammock. Then lived in a small furnished room for 2 years. A local priest started the education of the poor boy with evening lessons. To save money for books, he ate only bread and water (he marked notches on his loaf of bread to divide it into equal portions for his meals). After 2 years, he successfully passed the examinations for admission as a clerk in the government offices in Nantes. Came to America with his father and family in 1849. Studied architecture under his father in Cincinnati, Ohio. Married first CORNELIA on 22 Feb 1851 at his mother’s house in Cincinnati. Because Americans had trouble pronouncing and spelling “Gengembre,” had name officially changed to “Hubert” by a Private Act of Congress in 1865. In 1853, appointed first professor of French, Spanish and history in Girard College, Philadelphia. Wrote successful text book on teaching French. Moved to Boston and continued to teach; turned down an assistant professorship at Harvard. Wrote short and serial stories for magazines under pseudonyms. Wrote the play “The Witch” under the name Paul Hamilton (ran for two years from coast to coast). Did not like teaching or writing, and, while still in his twenties, when he sold an invention (the first self-fastening button) for \$120,000, and moved in

1865 to New York City where he became interested in architecture and apartments (a relatively recent innovation). Formed the firm of Hubert and Pirsson. Pioneered the sky-scraper apartment building (12 stories instead of 5). In 1880, introduced the idea of cooperatively-owned apartments (“The Hubert Home Clubs”) for the middle-class (he and his father came out of the Fourier communitarian/socialist tradition). (Called them “clubs” for snob appeal and because the building had lots of servants.) Architect who designed the Hotel Chelsea / Chelsea Hotel, Lyceum Theatre (a cooperatively-owned “theater club”), “The Spanish Flats” on Central Park South, and many other buildings in New York City. Built the Navarro apartments (the “Spanish Flats” that once covered the block at 7th Avenue between 58th and 59th Streets); at the time, these were by far the largest apartment buildings in the world. Introduced such innovations as refrigerators cooled from a central plant, apartments with running water cooled and filtered for drinking, and the first fireproofing of whole apartments. Had patent on “duplex” and “triplex” apartments (the French style of small private 2-story dwellings built one over another). Although a hard worker all his life, he also tried to invent things to ease the workload of men and women (including housework). Married secondly Lily Goodall, a friend of his daughter Marie from school, on 20 Apr 1892 in New York City. Retired to California in 1893. Drove the second car ever driven on the streets of Los Angeles. His grandson, Philip Hubert Frohman, the architect of the National Cathedral, spent much time with him when he retired from his New York practice and moved to Los Angeles, CA. He died there in a house he designed at 2144 Hobart Blvd. and is buried in the Hollywood Memorial Park Cemetery. Held over 65 patents (mostly for labor saving devices); still others were pending when he died. Children: PHILIP WILLIAM, JR., Adelbert, Charles, Lily, Marie, and Louis.

4.10. **CORNELIA DOISY DE VILLARGENNES** (2 Jul 1828 - 27 May 1883). Born in Belfast, Ireland. Died in New York City. Buried in Woodlawn Cemetery in the Bronx, NY. PHILIPPE’s brother Henri married her sister.

4.11. **SAMUEL HANFORD HOLMES** (31 Jul 1831 - 13 Jun 1889). A business man in Stamford, CT. Had a sister Elizabeth Lavinia and may have had brothers named Luke and Frederick. Buried with MARY in St. John’s and St. Andrew’s Episcopal Cemetery, Stamford.

4.12. **MARY ELIZABETH HAIGHT** (29 Mar 1834 - 13 Apr 1894).

4.13. **WILLIAM POST** (13 Feb 1828 - 21 Mar 1888). A carpenter. Married on 8 Jan 1859. Died of an illness he contracted during the famous blizzard of 1888. (Many people still went to work during the storm and died later.) The storm was called the “White Hurricane” (12-14 Mar 1888) with 80 mph winds and 21 inches of snow. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport. See Post article.

4.14. **ELEANOR C. SACKETT** (28 Feb 1836 - 26 Feb 1866). From Greenwich, CT. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport.

4.15. **THE REV. DR. JOHN DUNLAP WELLS** (25 Oct 1815 - 31 Oct 1903). Born in Whitesborough, NY. Dropped the “e” from “Welles.” Married JESSIE on 1 Mar 1849 in New York City. Entered Union College as a sophomore; left after his junior year to accept a call to Green Academy, Huntsville, Alabama in 1838. In 1840 entered Princeton Theological Seminary. Stated supply minister in Baltimore; then minister in the private chapel at the country estate of James Lenox, a lawyer in New York. Minister of a church at Madison Avenue and 29th Street (at the time a field with squatters) until December 1849. Minister of the South Third Street

Presbyterian Church, Williamsburg, NY (now part of Brooklyn), for fifty years. Remained interested in missionary work in America's Southwest and in Liberia (his sister, Helen Wells White, and her husband died in Fair Hope, Cape Palmas shortly after their arrival there). Doctor of Divinity, Princeton Theological Seminary, 1864; LL.D. offered later from another college but declined. Author of *Saved by Grace, The Pastor in the Sick Room, Boys and Young Men in Relation to Business*, and numerous articles and sermons. He is buried in Evergreens Cemetery in Brooklyn (he and a member of his church went up to the Catskill mountains and got the original evergreens for the cemetery — several thousand trees). See Wells article.

4.16. **JESSIE HENDERSON** (16 Oct 1821 - 23 Dec 1871). See Henderson article.

### THE FIFTH GENERATION

5.17. **CHARLES ANTOINE COLOMB GENGEMBRE** (3 Jun 1790 - 23 Mar 1863). Born in Paris. Named "Colomb" after Columbus, because his father admired the new American republic. From Kate Hubert's family tree: CHARLES' father had a brother with this name who was a clergyman in Paris. Member of the Corps de Garde under the brother of Napoleon. Studied engineering. Designed the mint at Cassel. Studied architecture in Italy. In 1814, competed for the Grand Prix de Rome, winning the second prize in architecture. His architectural style book became a standard European textbook. Met MARIANNE when he and his father were touring England and met MARIANNE's father. Married at St. Pancras in the Fields Church, London, on 12 or 17 Apr 1818. Designed and installed the largest gas heating and lighting system of its kind in the Paris Opera. Practiced architecture in France until 1848. Building the canals of Paris when interrupted by the revolution of 1830, in which he was wounded by a bayonet and was financially ruined. Went to London and stayed with MARIANNE's relatives for a year. Drew the plans for Robert Stevenson's steam locomotives and took out patents for his first six-wheeled locomotive. Also made plans for Boulton's Manchester and Liverpool Railroad. Also worked at the iron works in Indret, France. In 1835, built a steam boat, the "Marianne," and hauled people and freight between Port Louis and L'Orient in Brittany for 3 years, 4 trips a day. The boat was destroyed in a storm, much to the delight of the local shippers who did not have a steam boat. Came to America after the establishment of the Second Republic. Sailed from Liverpool on 22 Jun 1849 and reached New York City on 1 Aug 1849. Settled in Cincinnati, Ohio; later moved to Manchester and Allegheny City, PA. (Allegheny City and Manchester are now part of the northside of Pittsburgh.) Architect. Also painted landscapes; his daughter Sophie Gengembre Anderson ([wikipedia.org/Sophie\\_Gengembre\\_Anderson](http://wikipedia.org/Sophie_Gengembre_Anderson)) became a well-known portrait artist (she and her husband Walter are buried in Falmouth, England). She specialized in genre paintings of children and women, typically in rural settings. Designed several buildings, including the Allegheny City Hall in 1860 (the site was occupied by the Buhl Planetarium; now a parking garage); the building was said to be simple and tasteful, and was well-thought of by later architects. In connection with designing the city hall, he was offered a share in the graft expected from the city government; he became thoroughly disillusioned with the ethics in America and vowed never to speak English again, and was said to have kept his word. Because the Gengembres never heard their name pronounced properly in America, they started using "Hubert" (MARIANNE's mother's family name) before his death. Died in Allegheny City of a severe cold. Buried there in Union Hill Cemetery.

5.18. **MARIANNE FAREY** (12 Jul 1799 - 12 Feb 1883). Born in Woburn, Bedfordshire. During the French Revolution of 1830, ordered workers to chop down the trees around her and CHARLES' home and to use the trees to block the road that the Royal Artillery was advancing on. Died in New York City (lived in Harlem). Buried in Woodlawn Cemetery in the Henry G. Hubert plot (Plot 4171), Bronx, NY. Her brother John (20 Mar 1791 - 17 Jul 1851) was a scientist of some note: Began making drawings for encyclopedias and journals in 1805. Member of the Institute of Civil Engineers. He received the Silver Medal and Gold Medal from Society of Arts, 1813; engaged as a civil engineer for constructing iron works in Russia in 1819; author of "A Treatise on the Steam Engine, Historical, Practical, and Descriptive," 1813; introduced steam engine indicators to England.

5.19. **COMTE ADELBERT JACQUES DOISY DE VILLARGENNES** (30 Jan 1792 - 4 Aug 1879). Born in Paris. Entered the French Navy in 1807 as an apprentice; became a midshipman but his father had him transferred to the army. As a lieutenant, fought under Napoleon; wounded in Austria. In Spain, taken by English as prisoner of war to the British Isles for 14 months. Met Elizabeth Nixon in Ireland and, after his release, married her on 22 Oct 1814 in Dublin. Returned to France to fight again for Napoleon in two battles before Waterloo. After Napoleon resigned, returned to Newry, Ireland to teach French and Italian. Elected to the Institute in Belfast in Jan 1819. Elizabeth died in Jun 1826 after a long and painful illness. Married ELIZABETH HAMILTON on 3 Jul 1827 in St. Peter/Paul Church in Dublin, Ireland, with ELIZABETH's uncle William presiding. Their children were all born in Belfast. Immigrated to America in 1846. Teacher, farmer, linguist; French and Italian Consul. The Doisy's came to Cincinnati and met the Gengembres there. He and his wife both died in College Hill, Hamilton County, Ohio. There is a tall monument for him in the family plot in Spring Grove Cemetery in Cincinnati. His daughter published his *Reminiscences of Army Life under Napoleon Bonaparte* in 1884 (ending the foreword with "Vive L'Empereur Napoleon!").

5.20. **ELIZABETH CATHERINE HAMILTON** (13 Dec 1794 - 31 Jul 1885). Born in Dublin, Ireland (Bray?). Christened on 5 Dec 1796 at St. Nicholas' Church in Dublin. Died in College Hill, Ohio. "Seemed to be a taint in Grandma Doisy's family. She had always been 'queer' or eccentric the polite would call it. A physician has another word for it." (Letter from Kate Hubert.)

5.21. **SAMUEL H. HOLMES** (25 Nov 1798 - 17 Sep 1879). He and NANCY had a son Rev. Stephen Ferris Holmes (1842 - 1931) and daughter Elizabeth Lavina Holmes (1837 - 1909). Buried with NANCY in St. John's and St. Andrew's Episcopal Cemetery, Stamford, CT.

5.22. **NANCY ELIZABETH HOLLY** (7 Feb 1808 - 16 Feb 1878).

5.23. **DR. NATHANIEL D. HAIGHT** (8 May 1803 - 12 Sep 1879). Born in Peekskill, NY. Educated in medicine in Pittsford, NY; graduated, 1825. Moved to Stamford, CT around 1825. First lived in North Stamford; then moved into the village itself. Married PHEBE there on 4 Jul 1825. Had an extensive medical practice in Stamford.

5.24. **PHEBE DAUCHY** (28 Jan or Feb 1805 - 10 Jul 1892). Born in Ridgefield, CT.

5.25. **CALEB POST** (6 Jul 1785 - 15 Sep 1872). Born in Southampton, L.I. Married on 27 Oct 1816. Carpenter. Around 1823 built the Post House still standing near the corner of Beaver Dam and South Country Roads in Brookhaven (although it has been moved away from the

road); was the summer home of JAMES H. POST. Member of South Haven Church when it was located in Fire Place (church now located on what was his property). Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport. See Post article.

5.26. **MARY SMITH** (17 Feb 1790 - 5 Dec 1869). From Moriches, L.I. Buried in Woodland Cemetery, Bellport.

5.27. **JOHN SACKETT** (May 1784 - 14 Feb 1864). Baptized at St. John's Episcopal Church, Stamford, CT. Married first Mary Mead on 12 Jul 1809 (d. 24 Aug 1824). Married secondly CORNELIA on 9 Jan 1829 in the Second Congregational Church of Greenwich, CT. Sold land to the New York and New Haven Railroad. Also owned land south of the railroad station in Greenwich. Buried in a family plot in the Congregational Church Cemetery in Greenwich, CT. Died at the age of 79 years, 8 months, and 21 days.

5.28. **CORNELIA OLMSTEAD** (2 Feb 1808 - 11 Apr 1862).

5.29. **SOLOMON WELLES** (24 Jun 1788 - 6 Jan 1818). Born in Cambridge, NY. Married there on 25 Dec 1812 by Rev. JOHN DUNLAP. Drafted in 1813 to go from Cambridge to protect Plattsburg, NY, from the British in the War of 1812. Moved to Whitesboro (Whitestown), Oneida Co., NY (about 5 miles west of Utica). Was a silversmith ("watchmaker"). (We have spoons and an ink well set made by him.) Died of "consumption" (tuberculosis). See Wells article.

5.30. **MARION [MARY ANN] DUNLAP** (11 Jun 1793 - 28 Jun 1870). Born in Cambridge, NY. Died in Williamsburg, Kings Co., NY. Buried in Evergreens Cemetery in Brooklyn.

5.31. **DAVID HENDERSON** (28 May 1783 - 23 Mar 1863). He, his twin brother Thomas, and his father DAVID emigrated from Kirkcaldy, Fife, Scotland. They settled first in Fredricksburg, VA. DAVID moved to New York City in the 1800s where he married JESSIE on 23 Nov 1815. They lived between 31st and 32nd Streets and 3rd and 4th Avenue. He failed as a wholesale dry goods merchant, and received an appointment in the Custom House. From a letter from Jessie Brower, one of their grandchildren, about his family in Virginia after the Civil War:

The homestead [in Fredricksburg] was shelled to pieces during the [Civil] war. His sisters two of whom I think were unmarried were so bitter over the fact [DAVID] did not come home and fight for the South that they broke off all relations. After he died, [his widow JESSIE] heard that they had lost everything and she wrote them and asked them to come to New York and make their home with her. Their answer was that if she would buy their Confederate bonds they would feel more kindly toward her -- that they had lost everything through the North and would look on that as a sort of reparation. She wrote back that she could not afford to do that but would gladly give them a home. She received no answer to that letter.

5.32. **JESSIE CAIRNS** (d. 12 Dec 1866). Came to visit her sister in New York City, and the War of 1812 prevented her return to Scotland. Met DAVID and married him. Famous for her beauty. Her brother William was their father's heir and lived chiefly in New York City.



## THE SIXTH GENERATION

6.33. **PHILIPPE JOACHIM JOSEPH GENGEMBRE** (ca. 1763 - 1838/9). A note on Kate Hubert's family tree: "The Gengembres were supposed to have come from Holland, way back." (According to a friend of Uncle Henry Torrey, the name "Gengembre" (from French for "ginger") was invented during the French Revolution to hide an aristocratic background.) Born in Paris and died in Indret, France. Inventor and engineer. Trained as a chemist -- studied with Lavoisier and discovered one or two important gases. Invented the first sewing machine. Went to America during the French Revolution and on his return to Paris became chief engineer of the Mint of Paris; there he invented automatic placing of coins under a press, and marking letters around edges of coins (to replace milling and thus makes counterfeiting more difficult). After showing his new press to Napoleon, was made Chief Inspector of the Mints of the French Empire, Holland, Prussia, Spain, and Italy. Knew Benjamin Franklin and Robert Fulton in Paris. First house in Paris heated by a furnace and lighted by gas (thought to be very dangerous). (The girandole in the dining room is made from a gas fixture from his Paris home.) Lighted the Paris Opera with a new gas. Advisor to the King Louis Philippe. Persuaded the king to reduce the workday in France from 16 or 14 hours to 12. Organized the first cooperative associations (e.g., grocery club and bakery club) in Paris. The people idolized him for always striving to ameliorate the conditions of the poor. Governor of Indret. First director of the government works at Indret (still active), a small island near the mouth of the Loire about six miles from Nantes (on the west coast of France), where the first steam warships used by the French Navy were constructed. Designed ships so large that the minister of the marine refused to permit them to be built because the minister could not believe they were feasible. Monument to him in Nantes. Gate in the French Navy's munitions and armament works in Indret known (at least up to 1950) as the Gengembre Gate. Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur, bestowed in person by Napoleon. Married first JEANNE, secondly Charlotte Girard, and thirdly Mlle. Chabanal. After death of JEANNE, traveled to New Orleans; then St. Louis, where he stayed long enough to plan the city's fortifications; traveled to Canada where he traded furs with the Indians; stayed ten years in the French colony in Boston while engaged in the fur trade (never learned English).

6.34. **JEANNE CHARRONNE** (d. 3 Jun 1790). Died giving birth to CHARLES.

6.35. **JOHN FAREY** (24 Sep 1766 - 6 Jan 1826). A geologist of some importance. Baptized 12 Oct 1766 in Woburn, Bedfordshire. Married on 10 May 1790 at St. Pancras Church, London. Appointed agent to the Duke of Bedford in 1792. Received a common school education in Woburn, Bedfordshire; at 16 sent to school in Pullman's Academy in Halifax, York; received special instruction in (natural?) philosophy, mathematics, drawing, and surveying. In 1792 was appointed agent of the Duke of Bedford's estates; this position lasted until the Duke's death in 1802. Instituted an improved system of agriculture for the Duke. The family home was Pottsgrove, three miles was Woburn Abbey. In 1801, became acquainted with William Smith, the father of British Geology, and his theories of stratification. In 1802, after death of the Duke, moved to London and established an extensive practice as a consulting surveyor and geologist. Later lived at 37 Howland Street, Fitzroy Square. Was secretary of the Smithfield Club. Collected soils, rocks, and minerals from all the places he visited in England and drew up a large number of sections and maps intended to illustrate the relative position of strata throughout England (never published). Conducted surveys of soil types and rock strata. Drew up a detailed geological section of the succession of strata (from Carboniferous rocks through Triassic and

Jurassic to the Cretaceous) for the region from Ashover in Derbyshire to the Lincolnshire coast; this was the first published geological map of an English county. Made a survey of Derbyshire's minerals and agriculture for the Board of Agriculture, 1809-10. Published *Survey of the County of Derby, Including A General View of its Agriculture and Minerals*, 8 volumes, 1811-13. Also wrote 60 scholarly articles on geology (including many articles published by the Royal Society and in *Rees's Cyclopaedia*) and many other subjects (including the steam engine, the theory of music, and decimal coinage). Intended to publish more of his research, but his active career was terminated by an attack of apoplexy at his house in Howland Street, London. As late as 1967, a geology magazine published redrawings of his earliest geological sections, with a discussion of their content and significance. Styled himself a "land and mineral surveyor." "Mr. Farey was a man of most laborious research, and of very retiring habits; rarely mixing in society, but pursuing his studies with incessant application, impelled by a thirst for knowledge rather than by the desire of wealth or fame." Some of his firsts: first published geological map of a part of England; first published regional descriptive memoir; first geometrical exposition of the nature of a fault; first printed list of the sequence of strata based on paleontological data; first printed references to the discoveries of William Smith. Died at his house in Howland Street, London. Buried at St. Pancras, London. (From the age of fourteen, his son John assisted him by making drawings and plans; this latter John Farey became a mechanical engineer of some note -- so it was probably the younger John Farey that CHARLES GENGEMBRE was visiting when he met MARIANNE FAREY, John's sister.)

6.36. **SOPHIA HUBERT** (24 Dec 1770 - Jul 1830). Born in Westminster, London. She and JOHN were keen singers, he a tenor and she a soprano. Her relatives included a number of London architects and surveyors.

6.37. **VISCOUNT JEAN ANTOINE DOISY DE VILLARGENNES** (1754 - ca. 1830).

6.38. **ANNE MARIA AUGUSTINE, VISCONTESSE ROUX de MONCLAR** (b. 1758).

6.39. **LIEUT. EDMUND [EDMOND] BURK[E] HAMILTON**. His brother William was Rector of St. Peter's in Dublin in the 1820s.

6.40. **REBECCA PETER**. Born in Bray, Ireland?

6.41. **STEPHEN HOLMES** (18 Oct 1765 - bef. 12 Apr 1809). Born in Greenwich, CT. Married HANNAH in the Second Congregational Church of Greenwich, CT, on 20 Nov 1797. The marriage record describes him as "of New York." (May have married first Enor Raymond in Dec 1796?) Died in New York in 1809.

6.42. **HANNAH FERRIS** (7 Jul 1775 - 14 Jul 1861). On 12 Apr 1809, received STEPHEN's legacy under his father REUBEN's will. Married secondly the Rev. Mr. Jonathan Brown. Died in Stamford, CT. Letters of Administration were issued to her son Luke.

6.43. **ISAAC HOLLY** (26 May 1768 - 22 Jan 1827). Married 20 Dec 1795 in Stamford, CT. After LEVINA's death, married her cousin Elena [Elinor?] Bishop. Buried with Elena in St. John's and St. Andrew's Episcopal Cemetery, Stamford.

6.44. **LEVINA [LAVINA] BISHOP** (29 Jul 1769 - 16 Oct 1815). Born in Stamford.

6.45. **JOHN HAIGHT** (b. 19 Jul 1773 or 1774 - aft. 1821). A Quaker of Cortland, near Peekskill, Westchester Co., NY. (Not Cortland, Cortland Co., NY.) Married on 1 Apr 1794.

6.46. **PHEBE WILLIAMSON** (b. 25 Sep 1776).

6.47. **JACOB DAUCHY** (8 Mar 1768 - 1857). Born in Ridgefield, CT.

6.48. **LOIS**. JACOB and LOIS had children with the first names "Watts" and "Keeler." "Keeler" is the last name of JACOB's mother; so "Watts" might be LOIS's mother family name.

6.49. **JAMES POST** (1741 - 24 Aug 1813 at the age of 72 years and 7 months). Married on 4 May 1774; married secondly Abigail. Moved from Southampton to Moriches, L.I., around 1794. Buried in the Old Cemetery in Center Moriches, L.I. Abigail (d. 7 Jan 1843 in her 87th year) is buried near him in the Old Cemetery in Center Moriches. See Post article.

6.50. **MARY HUNTING** (17 Oct 1749 - 27 or 29 Dec 1788). Born in Southampton, L.I.

6.51. **BENJAMIN SMITH** (17 Apr 1764 - 15 Feb 1837). Had a brother Elkanah of Moriches or Manor of St. George who married Jerusha Havens of Moriches.

6.52. **RACHEL CONKLING** (7 Sep 1760 - 20 or 28 Jun 1820). Born on Shelter Island, in the town of Southold, L.I. Buried on a farm in Center Moriches. Tombstone: "Rachel, wife of Benjamin Smith, died June 20, 1820, Ae. 59." She and her children are mentioned in the 1826 will of her uncle Shadrack Conklin of Shelter Island. See Post article.

6.53. **JUSTUS SACKETT** (1740 - 15 Jan 1827, in his 87<sup>th</sup> year). Buried in the family plot in the Second Congregational Church Cemetery, Greenwich, CT.

6.54. **ANNA [ANNE] LYON** (10 Sep 1740 - 15 Jan 1837). Buried next to JUSTUS. According to her tombstone in Greenwich, she died at the age of 96 years, 4 months, 9 days.

6.55. **DANIEL OLMSTEAD** (9 Mar 1780 - 8 Sep 1860). Born in Wilton, CT. Married ARNA in the Second Congregational Church of Greenwich, CT, on 19 Feb 1803.

6.56. **ARNA HAYS** (28 Jul 1786 - 29 Sep 1865). Born in Greenwich, CT. Baptized as an adult on 11 Sep 1808 in the Second Congregational Church of Greenwich. Buried in the Episcopal Church Cemetery in Greenwich.

6.57. **EDMUND WELLES, JR.** (30 Aug 1746 - 17 Sep 1826). Born in Hebron, CT. Married there, 22 Feb 1770. "An early graduate of Yale College, and a gentleman of the old school, who never studied a profession, but contented himself with the cultivation of a farm -- with the very substantial & commodious brick house that he built." (*Helen Maria Wells Memoriam* by the Rev. JOHN D. WELLS.) Town Clerk in Cambridge, NY, 1777-81, 1789-1805. Died there; buried a week later in the cemetery south of town. See Wells article.

6.58. **WEALTHY ANN [WELTHIAN] GOODRICH** (24 Sep 1750 - 11 Sep 1814). Born in Wethersfield, CT. "A Goodrich of New England stock & of the same parentage with the author of the Peter Parley books. She was a godly woman and cared for the souls as well as the bodies of her children, all of whom, I believe, were confessors of Christ." (Ibid.)

6.59. **THE REV. MR. JOHN DUNLAP, JR.** (15 Sep 1757 - 7 Mar 1829). Emigrated from Delphington, Scotland in 1774. Fought in the Revolution (on the side of the Colonies).

Both he and his father “did important service in the army at the peril of their lives.” (Ibid.) Married on 11 Apr 1791. Licensed to preach the Gospel, 13 Oct 1789. Accepted a call from Cambridge, Washington County, NY, 13 Oct 1790; continued there until 14 Sep 1816; then served the Young Men’s Missionary Society of New York City in organizing Presbyterian churches in western New York. Was a Chaplain during the War of 1812 for the regiment from Cambridge. See Wells Article.

6.60. **CATHERINA CURTENIUS [CURTINIUS]** (21 Jan 1761 - 24 Jul 1830). Born in New York City. Baptized on 27 Jun 1761 in the Reformed Dutch Church in New York, NY. Died at quarter past 6:00 P.M. Was 69 years, 6 months, and 3 days old when she died.

6.61. **DAVID HENDERSON** (1 Jul 1754 - 23 Jan 1838). From Kirkcaldy, Fife, Scotland. Immigrated to Fredricksburg, VA. Received 2,666 and 2/3 acres from the state of Virginia for serving 3 years as a midshipman in its state navy. Served on the ship “Dragon” during the Revolution from 1 Apr 1777 to 1779. Was a Mason. Deacon Elder of the Presbyterian Church in Fredricksburg. Owned many house and field slaves. One of the town’s “most active, industrious and successful merchants.” From the Fredricksburg newspaper: “Few have been permitted to number as many years upon Earth and as few have filled the various stations which were allotted to him in public and private with more zeal and consistency.” See Henderson article.

6.62. **MILDRED ALLEN** (ca. 1764 - 26 Feb 1818). Buried in Fredricksburg, VA.

6.63. **EDWARD CAIRNS** (1742 - 1819). Heir of his father. Head of the firm of Cairns, Frears, Carmichael & Halliday, of Birmingham, Scotland and Wall Street, New York City. Added to the new Torr House and laid out beautiful grounds surrounding it. Made Shireland Hall, near Birmingham, his principal residence. Married ANN in 1775. Elected Low Bailiff in 1806; took leading part to have statue of Lord Nelson erected in Birmingham, 1806. Tall, handsome, dignified, courteous and considerate to all. Habit of reading newspaper aloud to villagers of Auchencairn all day, explaining and exaggerating the extent of the English victories over the French. Acquiesced in smuggling going on on his property. Supervised the festivities of the fair on fair day in Auchencairn. Did not like the villagers of Buittle and Dundrennan; on one occasion, the villagers heard his uncomplimentary description of themselves and chased him into the village inn and nailed up the doors; the villagers of Auchencairn had to come and rescue him (pulled him through a hole in the thatched roof); he and the Auchencairn villagers counterattacked, putting them to flight (some ended up being ducked in the mill stream). His sister Janet married William Nicol who became one of the foremost classical scholars in Scotland and one of the closest friends of the poet Robert Burns, who wrote several sonnets and poems in the Nicols’ house; William is the subject of one Robert’s drinking songs; he was also the subject of a practical joke at the hands of Sir Walter Scott, who was then a student at his school. Picture of him in Lawlor, *History of the Cairns Family*.

6.64. **ANN[E] HUMPHREYS**. Silhouette of her in Lawlor, *History of the Cairns Family*.

#### THE SEVENTH GENERATION

7.69. **JOHN SPEAK FAREY** (24 Mar 1728 - 27 Mar 1798). Baptized on 3 Apr 1728. Married first a woman named Worlet. Was a carpenter and builder in Westminster, London.

Married RACHEL on 7 Aug 1763 at St. John's Church, London. Died in London. Buried at Woburn Abbey, the home of the Duke of Bedford, near London.

7.70. **RACHEL WRIGHT** (d. 1800). Buried with JOHN.

7.71. **FREDERICK HUBERT**. Of London.

7.72. **SOPHIA**.

7.73. **VICOMTE JEAN ANTOINE DOISY DE VILLARGENNES**. From Kate Hubert's family tree: All records of the Doisy [D'Oisy] family were lost during the French Revolution, but the Doisy de Villargennes date back to the Crusades of the 11th century. The family Coat of Arms is a shield with a red crescent, topped by a helmet with its visor closed, and with greenish-gray plumes galore. The crescent indicates that one of the ancestors returned from the Crusades; the helmet indicates that he was a standard-bearer of the Barons d'Artois in the 11th century.

7.74. **MARIA JEANNE CAYEUX**.

7.79. **WALTER PETER** (b. 1737). Born in Dublin, Ireland.

7.81. **REUBEN HOLMES** (ca. 1731 - 16 Apr 1808 at age 75.) Married first Mary Brown. Married RUTH in 1761. Will dated 28 Jan 1804 and probated 20 Apr 1808.

7.82. **RUTH WOOD** (bapt. 25 Jan 1746 - 23 May 1799). Baptized in the First Church of Huntington, L.I.

7.83. **STEPHEN FERRIS** (27 Dec 1740 - 12 Feb 1824). Lived in Greenwich, CT. Was an American soldier during the Revolutionary War. Was a Private in Capt. George Peck's Company of Col. John Mead's Regiment of Militia (13 Apr to 5 Sept 1776 and 1 Nov 1776 to 23 Jan 1777). He and SARAH are buried in Old Sound Beach Cemetery on Tomac Avenue in Greenwich, CT.

7.84. **SARAH HANFORD LOCKWOOD** (6 Sep 1754 - 23 Nov 1848). Buried with STEPHEN.

7.85. **NATHAN HOLL[E]Y** (26 Feb 1728/9 - 6 Nov 1810). Married HANNAH on 11 Oct 1763. (Because of the late age of Nathan and the difference in ages, this may have been his second marriage.) Worked in the Commissary Department during the Revolutionary War.

7.86. **HANNAH JAGGER [GAGER]** (20 May 1741 - 1826). Born and died in Stamford. (Starting with this generation, the male descendants of JEREMIAH JAGGER began to spell their name "Gager.")

7.87. **ALEXANDER BISHOP** (20 or 25 Jun 1745 - 29 Aug 1807). Of Stamford, CT. Married on 18 Sep 1766 or 1768 in Stamford. Married secondly Hannah Holly.

7.88. **MARY BATES** (12 Feb 1748/9 - 8 Jul 1771). Baptized on 16 Apr 1749 in Stamford.

7.89. **JOHN HAIGHT** (6 Nov 1735 or 1736 - May 1809). A Quaker. Lived in Cortlandt, Westchester Co., NY. Married SARAH on 24 Feb 1754. Elected town assessor in town's first election in 1788. Died in Peekskill. Will dated 11 May 1809; probated 2 Jun 1809.

7.90. **SARAH SARLES [SEARLES]** (b. 28 Dec 1739). Born in Cortlandt, NY. May have had a brother John.

7.91. **JOHN WILLIAMSON** (d. Feb 1795). Of Bedford, NY. Will dated 7 Feb 1795; probated on 3 Mar 1795. He was married to a Mary at the time of his death.

7.93. **CAPT. VIVUS DAUCHY [DOSSEY]** (ca. 1707 - 16 Dec 1795 at age 88). Last name pronounced Dow'chi. Born in France. A descendant of Huguenots. Came to New Rochelle, NY, around 1725. Later moved to Ridgefield, CT. Instrumental in founding the first Episcopal Church (St. Stephen's) there. Married first Rachel Wallace (d. 1748) on 28 Mar 1732 in Ridgefield; married secondly Hannah Sherwood (d. 1754) on 24 Mar 1750 in Ridgefield. Married MARY last in 1754. Had children over a 34 year period. Buried next to MARY in Ridgefield. (Their son Vivus was killed in the French and Indian War.)

7.94. **MARY KEELER** (10 Oct 1725 - 23 May 1816). Born in Wilton, CT. Married first Richard Olmstead in Wilton.

7.97. **CAPT. JOHN POST** (1700 - 3 Jan 1792). One of the first settlers of Quogue, L.I. Captain in the First County Militia. Buried in Quogue Cemetery.

7.98. **ABIGAIL HALSEY** (1705 - 17 Mar 1772). Buried in Quogue Cemetery.

7.99. **SAMUEL HUNTTING** (9 Apr 1710 - 12 May 1773). First married Mary, daughter of David Gardiner, the 4th Proprietor of Gardiner's Island, who died soon thereafter. Married ZERVIAH on 30 May 1746 in Newport, R.I. Merchant and Justice of Peace in Southampton, L.I.

7.100. **ZERVIAH RHODES** (ca. 1718 - 22 Nov 1780). From Newport, R.I.

7.101. **BENJAMIN SMITH**. Probably of Moriches, L.I. Does not appear to have been a member of any of the large "Tangier" or "Bull" Smith families of Western Suffolk County. May have been a descendant of Arthur Smith of Setauket, the earliest settlement in Brookhaven. (Benjamin is a common name in the Arthur Smith family but not in other Smith families of Long Island.) Not connected to the Smith family after whom Smith Point is named ("Tangier" Smith).

7.102. **ABIGAIL** (1735 - 28 Sep 1800). From wills and the location of graves in cemeteries, it may be that she is related to William Bower, David Hallock, or Daniel Downs, or she might be a Havens, Younges, or Tredwell.

7.103. **THOMAS CONKLIN** (1733 - 4 Feb 1783). Married PHEBE on 30 Jul 1760. Children: Thomas, Benjamin, \_\_\_\_\_, Lewis (a neighbor of BENJAMIN SMITH 6.51), James, Phebe, John, and RACHEL. Had brothers Shadrack, James, and Benjamin, and sister Mary.

7.104. **PHEBE GLOVER** (bapt. 21 Sep 1735).

7.105. **HON. NATHANIEL SACKETT** (8 Jan 1720 - 177\_). Born in Newtown (now Elmhurst), Queens, NY. Resided for a few years in New York City; had business there for several years thereafter. Moved to Greenwich, CT, about 1753, and established his permanent home there. Represented the town in the General Assembly, 1756-60. Justice of the Peace for Fairfield County, 1757-60. Was member of Capt. Van Horne's militia company. Married ANNE about 1739; secondly married Elizabeth; thirdly married Sarah Lockwood.

- 7.106. **ELIZABETH BUSH** (7 Jan 1721 - ca. 1746).
- 7.107. **EPHRIAM LYON** (bapt. 27 Sep 1708 - 1751). Of Fairfield, CT. Three brothers and a sister were all baptized the same day, 27 Sep 1704/5. Will probated on 2 Jun 1751.
- 7.108. **EUNICE THORP** (18 Mar 1710 - 2 Oct 1762). Of Fairfield, CT. Baptized on 14 May 1710. Married secondly John Fanton.
- 7.109. **ISAAC OLMSTEAD** (22 Jan 1759 - 31 Dec 1797). Born in Norwalk, CT. Lived in Wilton, CT. Married on 15 April 1779 in Redding, CT. During the Revolution, enlisted on 1 Apr 1777 in Col. Philip Bradley's Connecticut Regiment for three years (part of General Putnam's army). Corporal, 1781-3, in the Light Infantry Battalion commanded by Col. Alexander Hamilton. Received a £30 bounty for enlisting. Remained under May 1784, although formally mustered out in Dec 1783. Married secondly Sarah Lyon on 25 Sep 1793.
- 7.110. **MARTHA "MARY" PARSONS [PERSONS or PIERSON]**. Daughter of Timothy Parsons (1732 -1810) of Redding, CT.?
- 7.111. **ABRAHAM HAY[E]S** (b. 14 Dec 1743). Born in Greenwich, CT.
- 7.112. **CHARITY**.
- 7.113. **EDMUND WELLES** (8 or 9 Feb 1720/1 - 1 Jun 1805). Born in Saybrook, CT, and raised in Hebron, CT. A carpenter and farmer. Married on 12 May 1743 in Southampton, L.I. Captain during the French and Indian War of a company raised to invade Canada. After MARY's death, moved and became a founder of Cambridge, Washington County, NY, in 1780. Town Supervisor. Died there. Will dated 7 Jan 1800; codicil 18 Apr 1804; probated 1 Jul 1805.
- 7.114. **MARY HOWELL** (14 Feb 1718 - 2 Jan 1776). Born in Southampton, L.I. Buried in Gilead, CT.
- 7.115. **SAMUEL GOODRICH** (b. 21 Nov 1721). Lived in Tolland, CT. Married on 10 Jun 1741.
- 7.116. **ELIZABETH WHITING** (bapt. 8 Aug 1725). Had twin brother Charles. Born in Hartford, CT.
- 7.117. **JOHN DUNLAP** (1724 - Sep 1776). Emigrated from Delphington [Dolphinton], Lanark County, Scotland, 7 Aug 1774, with his son JOHN. Served in the American army during the Revolution. Died in camp in Albany, NY, of a disease contracted in the army and is buried there. (More soldiers died during the war of disease than from fighting.)
- 7.118. **MARY THOMPSON** (b. 25 Jul 1731). Born in Innerleithen, Scotland. (Her father may be an Alexander Thomson.) Married JOHN in Scotland. Died in Peebles, Scotland about the close of the Revolution. Her ancestors lived several hundred years on one farm in the county of Peebles.
- 7.119. **PETER CURTENIUS [PETRUS THEOBALD CURTINIUS]** (bapt. 9 Jun 1734 - 1798). Baptized in the Dutch Reformed Church, Hackensack, NJ. During the Revolution, was Commissioner of Military Stores under General Washington for the Provisional Congress (located sources of supplies); collected lead to make bullets (especially from windows) for the American Army; supplied tents to Connecticut. Belonged to the Committees of 51, 60, and 100

in New York City. In 1776, was a leader of the Sons of Liberty in the destruction of the Statue of George III on a horse, located in Bowling Green; the lead was taken to Litchfield, CT, to be used by the army. (The group then tore off the royal insignias from the iron fence around Bowling Green — the fence is still there and the tops of the posts still feel rough.) One of 4 delegates from New York to the New Haven Convention to regulate the price of labor, etc., Jan-Feb 1778. Family retreated to Connecticut during the War. After the War, passed upon loyalist claims for damages. Second Auditor General of the State of New York, 8 Apr 1782 until 15 Mar 1797; had to settle the numerous claims of the state against the United States government, and straighten out the confused condition of currency in the state. Proved to be one of the leading financiers of his time. Second in the state only to Alexander Hamilton in financial ability. Member of the firm of Goelet & Curtenius, at the sign of the Golden Key in Hanover Square, New York City; moved to the sign of the Golden Anvil on Broadway. Sold his store for cash, and paid 1,600 pounds for the relief of the American Army. Married CATHERINA in Aug 1755. Died in New York City. Buried in Beechwoods Cemetery, New Rochelle, NY, in the tomb of his son-in-law, Elbert Roosevelt, beside his daughters, Jane and Elizabeth, his son, General Peter, and his grandson, Isaac Roosevelt. Monument to his memory still there. In the many trying experiences of his offices, he is said never to have “lost his temper, although occasionally he did express himself with a good ‘damn.’” Newell Woolsey Wells noted that the nose in the painting of him “possesses a tint that is very suggestive of Holland gin.” See Wells article.

7.120. **CATHERINA GOELET** (bapt. 2 Jul 1735 - 1798). Born in New York, NY. Christened in the Dutch Reform Church, New York, NY.

7.121. **DAVID HENDERSON**. Married MARY on 15 Feb 1744 in Kirkcaldy, Fife, Scotland.

7.122. **MARY GARDINER**.

7.123. **THOMAS ALLEN**. Of Fredericksburg or Spotsylvania, VA?

7.125. **WILLIAM CAIRNS** (1716 - ca. 1783). Heir of his father JOHN. Married in 1740. Somewhat cheap in land deals; sued over them and lost. Started a business in Birmingham, England (perhaps selling dry goods or making buttons) that expanded to New York City. Shortly before his death built a new residence at Bankend about a mile from the old Torr House, now known as Torr (bricks from the old house carted away by neighboring farmers for building).

7.126. **ISOBEL [ISABEL] EWART**.

7.127. **ABEL HUMPHREYS**. A merchant in Kiddminster, Scotland.

7.128. **ANN** (ca. 1689 - 6 Apr 1744) (?). According to the *History of the Cairns Family*, there is a ring belonging to this line of the family with the inscription “ANN HUMPHREYS died on 6 Apr 1744 at age 55.” Those dates do not match the ANN who is the wife of EDWARD CAIRNS, so the ring may refer to her mother.

8.137. **JOHN FAREY** (ca. 1692 - 1752). From Bedfordshire farming stock. Married first Mary Garrard in 1717; she died on 10 Mar 1724. Married MARY on 14 Mar 1726. The only John Farey on record born in Bedford at this time was baptized 8 Jun 1691 in Thurleigh; he was the son of Thomas Fary and Mary Haines.

8.138. **MARY SPEAKE** (d. 1771). Buried at Woburn Abbey, near London.

8.161. **BENJAMIN HOLMES** (ca. 1693 - 1745). Born in Greenwich, CT. Married Greenwich, 18 May 1721. His father STEPHEN died while BENJAMIN was still a minor, so he chose a guardian to be appointed (JONATHAN HOBBY).

8.162. **SUSANNA REYNOLDS** (b. 1706). Born in Greenwich, CT.

8.163. **WILLIAM JOHN WOOD**. Of Long Island.

8.165. **SAMUEL FERRIS** (21 Sep 1706 - 25 Apr 1786). Lived in "Old Society" or "Greenwich Point" area of Greenwich, CT. Ensign in the town's "train band" of militia. Buried in the Old Burying Ground in Greenwich.

8.166. **ANN LOCKWOOD** (1713 - 2 Jul 1789). Born in Greenwich, CT.

8.167. **DAVID LOCKWOOD, JR.** (b. 27 Dec 1729).

8.168. **HANNAH HANFORD** (d. 8 Feb 1807, at the age of 77 years, 11 months, 17 days). Born in Norwalk, CT, on a Saturday at 11 o'clock in the morning. Buried in the old cemetery in Sound Beach, Greenwich. Married secondly Meriday Bostwick and thirdly John Perot.

8.169. **NATHAN[IEL] HOLLY** (b. 26 Sep 1692). Married on 1 May 1718 in Stamford, CT.

8.170. **SARAH WEBB**. According to land grant records in Stamford, CT, she had a brother Joshua who was deceased in 1760 and sisters Mary Hill and Margery Holly.

8.171. **JOHN JAGGER** (7 Dec 1702 - 31 Mar 1743). Of Stamford, CT. Also may have spent time in Bedford, Westchester Co., NY. Married on 9 Nov 1732 by a Justice of the Peace.

8.172. **REBECCA INGERSOLL**.

8.173. **ALEXANDER BISHOP** (5 Jan 1710/1 - aft. 1799). Of Stamford, CT. Married on 22 Oct 1734.

8.174. **SUSANNAH HOLLY** (8 Apr 1711 - 2 Nov 1798). Born at 4:00 A.M.

8.175. **JOHN BATES** (23 Oct 1716 - 27 Nov 1800). Married MARY on 22 Jan 1745/6 in Stamford. Married secondly Sarah Bostwick. Will dated 16 Jul 1794; probated, 9 Feb 1801.

8.176. **MARY FERRIS** (22 Mar 1717 - 21 Oct 1750 in her 33<sup>rd</sup> year). Born and died in Stamford, CT.

8.177. **JOSEPH HAIGHT** (ca. 1710 - 1800). From Dutchess County, NY. A Quaker. Lived 5 miles south of Chappaqua Meeting House in Westchester Co., NY. Married first ZERUIAH in March or April 1734 in Chappaqua. Married secondly a woman named Anna, and third Sarah Coles.

8.178. **ZERVIAH SUTTON [ZERRIAH/SUVIAH/SOPHIA SUTTEN]**. Of Chappaqua, Westchester Co., NY.

8.187. **DEACON DAVID KEELER** (ca. 1692 - 1776). Born in Norwalk, CT. Married on 14 Aug 1721 in Norwalk. (If dates in some official records are correct, they had their first child 10 days prior to their wedding.) Early settler of Wilton, CT -- his name appears on a 1726 petition for parish status. Auctioneer for selling old meeting house to raise money to build a new one. Became a deacon in 1749. Will dated 24 Feb 1762 and probated 7 Oct 1776.

8.188. **MARY ST. JOHN** (22 Aug 1700 - Oct 1776). Born in Norwalk.

8.193. **CAPT. JOHN POST** (1674 - 3 Mar 1741). A town trustee and captain in the militia in Southampton, L.I. Appointed Ensign in the Northern Company of Southampton's militia on 11 Dec 1711 and worked his way up from there.

8.194. **MARY HALSEY** (b. ca. 1682). Of Southampton, L.I.

8.195. **JOSHUA HALSEY** (1674/5 - 1 Jun 1734). A town trustee of Southampton. Buried there. Will dated 15 Nov 1753. Brother of MARY (8.194).

8.196. **MARTHA WILLMAN** (d. 1753 or 1754). Will dated 15 Nov 1753 and probated 15 Jan 1754.

8.197. **THE REV. MR. NATHANIEL HUNTTING** (15 Nov 1675 - 21 Sep 1753). Harvard College graduate, 1693; M.A., 1696. Studied theology with Increase and Cotton Mather. Married on 27 Oct 1701 in Boston. The second pastor of East Hampton, L.I., Presbyterian Church (1696 - 19 Sep 1746); installed 13 Sep 1696. Baptized Montauk Indians; slaves attended the church. A number of his sermons are in the East Hampton Free Library. The house built by the town for his family is now The Hunting Inn. His old homestead remains in the possession of his descendants; was held under a grant from King William IV to Josiah Hobart (assigned to NATHANIEL) for the rent of one peppercorn a year, to be paid in Manhattan. Buried at the Old South End Burial Ground in East Hampton.

8.198. **MARY GREEN** (1682 - 1733). From Boston, MA. Buried with NATHANIEL. Her brother Joseph was the minister who took over at Salem Village, MA, after the witch trials of 1692. Her brother John was taken prisoner by the Turks in 1681.

8.199. **SAMUEL RHODES** (ca. 1685 - 1769 at age 84). A carpenter ("housewright") in Newport, R.I. Married 1717. His will is dated 1762 and recorded 9 Aug 1769. Buried in Newport. Possibly the son of either William or John Rhodes of Newport (the records for this period are very incomplete).

8.200. **JOYCE ATHEARN(?)** (22 Sep 1681 - 1773). Born in Tisbury, Martha's Vineyard. Buried with SAMUEL. (This is probably the JOYCE who is the wife of SAMUEL, but it is not certain. Their first child was named James; the next two are apparently named after JOYCE's parents -- MARY and SIMON.)

8.205. **THOMAS CONKLIN** (b. ca. 1695- 4 Mar 1782). Born on Shelter Island, L.I. Married 29 Jun 1732. Will dated 4 Jun 1770. In his father's will: he was to receive 50 pounds to be paid by his older brothers John and Henry when he reached age 23. Married RACHEL on 29

Jun 1732. Served on Shelter Island as Assessor (1739, 1759), Constable and Collector (1741, 1747), and Overseer of the Poor (1746, 1754, 1757, and 1761).

8.206. **RACHEL MOORE** (d. 16 May 1750). From Southold, L.I.

8.207. **SIMON GLOVER**. Born in Oyster Ponds (Orient Point), L.I. Married in the township of East Hampton, 14 Oct 1735.

8.208. **RACHEL DIBBLE** (b. 13 Sep 1713).

8.209. **THE REV. MR. RICHARD SACKETT** (ca. 1686 - 9 May 1727). Born in Newtown (Elmhurst, Queens), L.I. Married first time while still a minor; his wife died in childbirth. RICHARD then entered Yale University and studied for the ministry; graduated with honors, 1709. Married ELIZABETH in 1710. In 1711, was preaching to the congregation of Maidenhead and Hopewell, N.J. In 1712, resided in Saybrook, CT. In 1714, succeeded to the First Church of Greenwich; in 1716, formed another church in western part of the town. Remained there until he died suddenly; was so well the day before that he preached twice. "Mild temper and pleasant manner and much beloved by his people."

8.210. **ELIZABETH KIRTLAND** (b. 27 Jan 1688). Born in Saybrook, CT.

8.211. **JUSTUS BUSH, JR.** (bapt. 3 Dec 1699 - 23 Nov 1760). Born in New York, NY. Moved to Greenwich, CT. Owned a grist mill on Horseneck Creek in Greenwich. Died in Cos Cob, CT. (House is now the site of the Greenwich Historical Society.) Estate settled 22 Dec 1760. (Second wife Elizabeth Anne Belden? Married in Rye in 1737?)

8.212. **CHARITY**.

8.213. **SGT. SAMUEL LYON** (d. 1732). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Married on 10 Sep 1697. Will probated on 17 Jul 1732.

8.214. **SUSANNA JACKSON** (10 Sep 1670 - 19 Oct 1718). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

8.215. **JOHN THORP** (d. 1 Mar 1741/2 at age 63). Born in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Moved to Greenhill, CT. Married MARY on 15 May 1699. Will dated 28 Feb 1741/2 and probated 22 Mar 1741/2.

8.216. **MARY DAVIS** (d. 27 Jan 1758 at age 80). Born in Greenfield, CT. May be the daughter of a John and Lydia (Waller) Davis of Greenhill, CT

8.217. **JAMES OLMSTEAD** (17 May 1730 - 29 Sep 1807). Born in Norwalk, CT. Married on 11 Sep 1754 in Wilton, CT. Married secondly Sarah Patchen, widow of Elias Morehouse of Ridgefield, CT.

8.218. **SARAH TROWBRIDGE** (ca. 1732 - 14 Jan 1788).

8.221. **ABRAHAM HAY[E]S** (b. 26 Nov 1727). Married in Fairfield, CT, in 1748.

8.222. **MARY ADAMS** (18 Oct 1728 - bef. 1793). Of Fairfield, CT.

8.225. **THOMAS WELLES** (perhaps 10 Jan 1694 - 4 Feb 1760). Emigrated from Dudley, Worcestershire, England, in 1712 to Saybrook, CT. Married there on 13 May 1720. Settled in Hebron, CT, by 1725. A sailor and farmer (husbandman). Will dated 20 Dec 1745, but not probated until 16 Jun 1760. One of the original 61 patentees (including his son, EDMUND,

7.113) of Cambridge, Washington County, NY, to receive 61,000 acres from King George III, 23 Jul 1761. The tract extended from near Albany to Lake George.

8.226. **ELIZABETH MERRILLS** (13 Dec 1685 or 1686 - 13 Dec 1770 at age 84). Born in Saybrook, CT, and died in Hebron, CT.

8.227. **EZEKIEL HOWELL** (b. 21 Jan 1688/9). Born in Southampton, L.I. Inherited land in Moriches, L.I., from his father. Married on 22 Nov 1711 at Southampton. Died before 2 Apr 1739. (This information is from court records. Family records list his younger brother AUSTIN as MARY ROGERS' husband and the father of MARY HOWELL. Howell family histories are not in agreement on the point.)

8.228. **MARY ROGERS** (b. ca. 1691 - 26 Jun 1756). Born in Southampton. Buried with grandson in Gilead, CT.

8.229. **JOSIAH GOODRICH** (15 Jun 1690 - 13 Sep 1731). Married on 5 Dec 1711 in Wethersfield, CT. Moved to Tolland, CT. Married secondly Sarah, daughter of Rev. Stephen Mix.

8.230. **SARAH PORTER** (12 Dec 1692 - 8 Jan 1726/7). Died in Wethersfield.

8.231. **CAPT. CHARLES WHITING [WHITON]** (5 Jul 1692 - 7 Mar 1738). Born in Hartford, CT, and died in Montville, CT. Married 10 Jan 1716/7 in Hartford.

8.232. **ELIZABETH BRADFORD** (15 Dec 1696 - 10 May 1777). Born in Duxbury, MA, and died in Stonington, CT. Married secondly Deacon John Noyes.

8.237. **ANTONIUS CURTENIUS**. Of Dutch ancestry.

8.238. **ELIZABETH DE FOREEST**.

8.239. **PHILIPPUS GOELET** (bapt. 13 Aug 1699 and/or 8 Nov 1701). Christened in the Dutch Reform Church, New York, NY. Married CATHERINA there about 1731.

8.240. **CATHERINA BOELEN** (b. 2 Sep 1709). Born in New York City.

8.249. **JOHN CAIRNS** (d. 1745). Succeeded to the Torr estate in 1714 when his grandfather died. Added to and renovated the old Torr House (original square tower may have been from the 15th century); house no longer stands. Married 1715. In 1744, apprenticed a son to a merchant and shipowner; when the son ran away, JOHN was called upon to pay surety money; he refused and was ordered to be imprisoned, but he probably died before going to prison.

8.250. **ANNA TODD**.

9.321. **STEPHEN HOLMES** (14 Jan 1663/4 - 15 May 1710). Of Stamford, CT. Married 18 Nov 1686. Moved to Bedford, NY around 1687. Surveyor of Highways, 1691. Witnessed a deed of land from some Indians to Daniel Simpkins. Moved to Greenwich, CT, by 1692. Fence viewer, 1695 and 1708. Selectman, 1708-9. Died in Greenwich. Estate inventory, 13 Dec 1710.

9.322. **MARY HOBBY** (1670 - 15 Sep 1713). Born in Greenwich. Married STEPHEN in a double ceremony when her (twin?) sister Rebecca married Samuel Hardy. Married secondly Benjamin Green on 13 Feb 1712/3. Died in Stamford.

9.323. **JONATHAN REYNOLDS** (1683 - 1740). Born in Greenwich, CT. Married REBECCA on 13 Apr 1701 or 1704. Lived in the Horseneck area of Greenwich. Commissioned an Ensign (second lieutenant) of the East Company of the Trained Militia Band of Horseneck. May have owned land in Poundridge, NY.

9.324. **REBECCA SEAMAN [SEMORE]**.

9.329. **JAMES FERRIS** (1662 (?) - 6 Nov 1726). Married about 1699. Lived in Greenwich, CT. An ensign in the "train band" (town militia) in 1690.

9.330. **MARY**. Alive at time of JAMES's death. May have been JAMES' second wife.

9.331. **GERSHOM LOCKWOOD** (d. May 1752). Admitted a Freeman in Greenwich, CT, 7 Feb 1697. Deputy to Colonial Assembly, May 1726. Justice of the Peace, 1726-1728. ("Freemen" were admitted to church membership, and consequently permitted to vote and to take part in general civic affairs; required to have a certain amount of land or income; also entitled to the title "Mister" and in some colonies permitted to wear more costly clothes.)

9.332. **MARY WEED or WOOD**.

9.333. **CAPT. DAVID LOCKWOOD** (Aug 1707 - 4 Dec 1755). Of Greenwich, CT. Married on 9 Apr 1728. Representative from Greenwich to General Assembly in 1745. Captain in the "trainband" of Greenwich. Will dated 29 Nov 1755 and probated 9 Dec 1755. Estate of 1753 pounds, 10 shillings, and 6 pence.

9.335. **CAPT. ELNATHAN HANFORD** (23 Jan 1707 - 24 Aug 1764). Born in Norwalk, CT. Selectman for 5 years; member of the General Assembly for two years; State auditor, 1747; elected Town Clerk on 18 Dec 1747 and held the office until his death. Ensign, 1744; Lieutenant, 1746. Married secondly Hannah Bartlett. Died at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Estate inventoried on 4 Dec 1764.

9.336. **SARAH ST. JOHN** (ca. 1704 - 17 Dec 1751).

9.337. **CAPT. INCREASE HOLLY** (20 Aug 1643 - 20 May 1732). Born and died in Stamford, CT. Married on 2 Apr 1679. Received land from Stamford for being a soldier in King Philip's War, 1675-76. An ensign and lieutenant in Stamford's train band in 1699 and 1707.

9.338. **ELIZABETH NEWMAN** (1654 - 5 Dec 1713 at age 59). Born and died in Stamford. Her sister Hannah married INCREASE's brother John in a double wedding.

9.339. **CALEB WEBB** (26 Mar 1664 - 14 or 24 May 1704). Married in 1684.

9.340. **SARAH**.

9.341. **SGT. JONATHAN JAGGER** (Mar 1675 - 8 May 1752 in his 77<sup>th</sup> year). Of Stamford, CT. Married on 22 Aug 1700.

9.342. **REBECCA HOLMES [HOMES]** (ca. 1680 - 1 Apr 1749). Of Stamford, CT.

9.345. **JOSEPH BISHOP** (16 Oct 1664 - 14 Sep 1733). Lived in Stamford, CT. Married on 3 Nov 1691. Justice, 1704, 1711, 1714-33. Lieutenant, 1709; captain, 1710. Will dated 8 Jun 1727 and probated 21 Nov 1733. "The Worshipful Joseph Bishop, Esq." died in Stamford.

9.346. **ELIZABETH KNOWLES** (d. 29 Apr 1754 at age 85). Married first Joseph Bulkley. Died in Stamford.

9.347. **JOHN HOLLY** (29 Mar 1679 - 20 Sep 1745). Married on 6 Jan 1703/4 in Stamford, CT.

9.348. **SUSANNAH SELLECK** (b. 2 Feb 1683). Born in Stamford, CT.

9.349. **JONATHAN BATES** (d. Sep 1753). Born and died in Stamford. Representative from Stamford for 15 years between 1710 and 1745. One of the signers for of 1736 petition for a new church (now Darien Congregational Church). Will dated 15 May 1753; probated 2 Oct 1753.

9.350. **JOANNA SELLECK** (b. 31 May 1686). Born in Stamford, CT. An original member of the Darien Congregational Church.

9.351. **PETER FERRIS, JR.** (30 Jun 1660 - 2 Jan 1736). Born in Greenwich, CT. Married first Sarah Hoyt (d. 10 Dec 1715). Married MERCY on 15 Jun 1716 in Stamford, CT.

9.352. **MERCY BELL** (5 Nov 1678 - 24 Jul 1731). Of Stamford, CT. Married first John Holmes (son of STEPHEN and MARTHA HOLMES); secondly Samuel Hoyt. She married fourthly Dr. Richard Barnum.

9.353. **SAMUEL HAIGHT [HEYT]** (1667 - 1 Jul 1712). A Quaker. Of Eastchester, Westchester County, NY. Married CHARITY by 1691. Lived at least briefly in Flushing, Queens ("Nassau Island"). Will dated 21 Sep 1712 (?) and probated 21 Oct 1712.

9.354. **CHARITY FIELD** (b. ca. 1671). Of Eastchester, NY.

9.355. **JOSEPH SUTTON** (d. bet. 1765 and 1770 at age 80). Born in Hempstead, L.I. Living in Rye, NY, by 1718 and in Greenwich, CT, by 1725. Then moved to King St., New Castle, Westchester, NY (near Chappaqua). A yeoman freeholder. Owned slaves in 1755.

9.356. **MARY SANDS** (ca. 1701 - aft. 1751). Born in Sands Point, Cowneck, Nassau Co. Married at age 14.

9.373. **JOHN KEELER** (ca. 1658 - ca. 1720). Born in Hartford, CT. Married first a daughter of John Beckwith; married MEHITABEL on 18 Jun 1679. Prominent citizen of Norwalk, CT. Deputy to General Assembly in Hartford, 1698. Will dated 27 Feb 1718/9 and probated 3 May 1720.

9.374. **MEHITABEL (HITTABELL) ROCKWELL**. Married secondly Zerubbabel Hoyt.

9.375. **JOSEPH ST. JOHN** (6 Apr 1664 - 26 Sep 1731). Born, married, and died in Norwalk, CT. Married on 5 Mar 1695/6.

9.376. **SARAH BETTS** (ca. 1665 - 26 Aug 1755). Born and died in Norwalk.

9.385. **JOHN POST** (ca. 1646 - 1687/8). A carpenter and land owner in Southampton, L.I. Married 3 Nov 1670. Will dated 9 Dec 1687 and probated 21 Mar 1687/8. Inventory of his estate included oxen, cows, horses, pigs, pewter, beds and bedding, metal pots, "a Negor m," carpenter tools, and bushels of grains.

9.386. **MARY.**

9.387. **ISAAC HALSEY** (bapt. 18 Nov 1632 - 31 Jan 1724/5). Baptized in Kempston, Bedfordshire, England. Came with family to Lynn, MA, at age 6. A land owner and a trustee of Southampton, L.I. Lived on the west side of Main Street near the north end. Buried in Southampton.

9.388. **MARY BARNES.**

9.389. **ISAAC HALSEY.** See 9.387.

9.390. **MARY BARNES.** See 9.388.

9.391. **ABRAHAM WILLMAN.** Of Quogue, L.I. Received deed from his father ISAAC in 1688 for land in "Quaquanantuck Purchase" (Quoque).

9.392. **HANNAH.**

9.393. **JOHN HUNTTING** (9 Oct 1636 - 19 Sep 1718). Born in Hoxne, Suffolk. Married on 18 Apr 1671. Sailed to America with his parents. Died at Dedham, MA.

9.394. **ELIZABETH PAYNE** (b. 6 Mar 1648).

9.395. **JOHN GREEN** (Jun 1636 - 3 Mar 1691/2). Of Cambridge, MA. Married on 20 Oct 1656. In May 1681, appointed Marshal General of the colony, succeeding RUTH's father. Estate inventoried 4 Apr 1691 (estate included house, orchard, 16 acres, and a privilege "in ye towne Commons").

9.396. **RUTH MITCHELSON** (b. 9 Nov 1638). Married secondly Samuel Champney. Estate inventoried 4 Apr 1691.

9.399. **SIMON ATHEARN [ATTHARN]** (ca. 1642 - 20 Feb 1714/5). Probably from Boughton-Under-Blean, Kent. Came to New England as a servant of NICHOLAS BUTLER. Married on 4 Oct 1665 in Tisbury, Martha's Vineyard. "Amid the settings of a most peaceful and bucolic life he managed to stir up more contrary breezes than any man of his time, and was a continual thorn in the flesh of the ruling family [the Mayhews]." Problems started when he brought land in Tisissa (in West Tisbury) from the Indians contrary to the rights granted Thomas Mayhew; this led to long-lasting litigation. Bought 20 acres in Tisbury. A ring leader in the failed rebellion against Thomas Mayhew when he was appointed governor for life. After Mayhew's death, SIMON became involved in another long series of law suits with William Rogers (Rogers sued him for stealing cows and libel). Tired of the suits, SIMON chastised Rogers in court for which Rogers sued him for "halling or pulling sayd Rogers by the eres and caueling him sayd William Roge and thefe with other Skurvie words in court." The court found for SIMON even though the acts took place there. SIMON also was successfully sued for trespass by the town's schoolmaster after SIMON entered the school while it was in session and wrote a "mock verse" in his daughter's schoolbook. Also prominent in public life: on committee to lay out 16 shares in a new purchase of land, 1675; county commissioner, 1686; constable of

Tisbury, 1687; assessor, 1692; town commissioner for small trials, 1693; selectman, 1695. Also represented Tisbury at the General Court for several sessions. Died in West Tisbury; buried with slate gravestone.

9.400. **MARY BUTLER** (1652 - 8 Apr 1741). Born in Edgartown, Martha's Vineyard and died in Tisbury. Married when she was only 13 years old. According to a family tradition, SIMON chose MARY as his future bride when he saw her and her friends playing with dolls near her father's house.

9.409. **JOHN CONKLIN** (ca. 1658/9 - 4 Mar 1705/6). This John Conklin may have been one of the earliest settlers of Shelter Island. Born in Hashamomack, in Southold, L.I. Inherited one half interest in his father's estate. Will dated 15 Jan 1705/6; probated 14 Oct 1706. Had two black slaves.

9.410. **SARAH SCUDDER** (15 Dec 1670 - 18 Aug 1753 at age 89). Born in Huntington, L.I. After JOHN's death, she bought land at the junction of Moriches River and Great South Bay for 230 pounds; area known as "Fireplace" (now Brookhaven). Buried in Hashamomack, L.I. Will dated 19 Jan 1732 and probated 1 Apr 1755; she left one half of the Fireplace land (described as in St. Georges Manor on the south side of Nassau Island and known as Waracta Neck) to son THOMAS and the other half to her son Joseph; they also divided the slaves, stock, and implements there.

9.411. **BENJAMIN MOORE** (d. 27 Jan 1728/9 at age 50). Married in Southold, L.I.

9.412. **ABIGAIL HORTON** (ca. 1676 - 2 Jun 1746 at age 70). Born in Cutchogue. Died in Southold.

9.413. **SAMUEL GLOVER** (1680 - 2 May 1732).

9.414. **MARTHA**.

9.415. **THOMAS DIBBLE [DEBELL]** (21 Aug 1677 - 22 Feb 1754). Born in Windsor, CT. Married on 2 Apr 1699/1700 in East Hampton, L.I.

9.416. **RACHEL MULFORD** (22 Mar 1684 - 22 Nov 1743). Of East Hampton, L.I.

9.417. **CAPT. JOSEPH SACKETT** (23 Feb 1656 - 23 Sep 1719). Born in Springfield, MA. His father died in 1659 and he grew up with his mother's family. As a young man, moved to Newtown, L.I. An officer in the Presbyterian Church there. Married there 1677. Road Commissioner, Assessor, Collector, and Supervisor of the town; Commissioner to adjust town and county boundary disputes. An Ensign, Lieutenant and Captain of colonial troops. Married first ELIZABETH; secondly married Anna (she lived only a short time); thirdly married Mercy Whitehead. Will dated 20 Sep 1719 and probated 22 Dec 1719. Held lands in New York and New Jersey.

9.418. **ELIZABETH BETTS** (b. ca. 1652). Of Newtown, Queens.

9.419. **LIEUT. JOHN KIRTLAND** (Aug 1659 - 20 Jan 1716). Adopted and raised by his aunt Susanna and her husband John Westall of Saybrook, CT. Married on 16 or 18 Nov 1679 in Saybrook. Inherited the Westalls' estate upon their death. Man of some prominence. Commandant of the Saybrook fort (built by LION GARDINER), 1702-3.

9.420. **LYDIA PRATT** (1 Jan 1659 - 13 Sep 1730). Born in Saybrook, CT.



9.421. **JUSTUS BUSH [BOCSH]** (bapt. 28 Oct 1674/5 - Jun 1737). Anglicized the family name. A blacksmith like his father. Home on Stone Street, near Battery Park. Married ANNE in the Dutch Church of New York City on 23 Feb 1697; both joined it 1699. Moved to Greenwich, CT, by 1712. Purchased land from one of the original proprietors of Rye, NY, in 1726. One of 18 proprietors of Peningoe Neck, 1737. Owned an interest in a copper mine in Farmington, CT. Only member of the family to move to New England. Died in Rye, NY. Will dated 24 Jun 1737 and probated 4 Dec 1737/9.

9.422. **ANNEKEN [ANNA/ANNETJE] SMITH** (bapt. 15 Mar 1656[?] - Oct 1745). She was from Boswyck. Died in Rye, NY. Will dated 6 Oct 1745 and probated 31 Oct 1745..

9.425. **RICHARD LYON** (d. 17 Oct 1678). In Fairfield, Fairfield, CT, by 1649. Freeman, 1664. Commissioner for Fairfield, May 1669. Oversaw a witch trial. Will dated 12 Apr 1678.

9.426. **MARGARET** (d. 1705). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

9.427. **JOHN JACKSON** (1640 - 11 Nov 1689). Born in Portchester, NY. Lived in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. On 6 Jan 1686 entered into contract with the town to build a corn and fulling mill over the Uncoway River (near the Mt. Grove Cemetery in Bridgeport); granted 8 acres north of the mill and 2 acres on the east side of the river.

9.428. **ELIZABETH SMITH** (22 Oct 1644 - 6 Oct 1703).

9.429. **JOHN THORP** (Jul 1643 - 17 Oct 1720). Born in New Haven, CT. Moved to Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Granted house lot on 3 Sep 1679. Died there.

9.430. **HANNAH FROST**. Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

9.433. **DEACON JAMES OLMSTEAD** (15 Oct 1708 - 17 Mar 1777). Born in Norwalk, CT. Married on 12 Aug 1729. Moved to Wilton, CT, in 1732.

9.434. **HANNAH** (ca. 1708 - 5 Oct 1769).

9.435. **DANIEL TROWBRIDGE** (b. 13 Aug 1701). Married SARAH in Norwalk, CT, on 18 Sep 1725. Lived in Stratford, CT. Moved to Wilton, CT. Farmer. Surveyor of highways and on town committee for highways.

9.436. **SARAH SEYMOUR**. Born in Norwalk, CT, after 1710.

9.442. **MARTHA PATCHEN** (bapt. 12 Sep 1703).

9.443. **STEPHEN ADAMS** (ca. 1708 - 4 Nov 1794, age 86). Of the town of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Married SARAH on 17 Oct 1727. Married secondly Esther, the widow of John Hill. Will dated 23 Sep 1793 and probated 25 Nov 1794. Died suddenly "in one breath."

9.444. **SARAH FINCH** (ca. 1707 - 9 May 1764). Born in Fairfield, CT (probably Stamford).

9.449. **EDMUND WELLES** (b. 16 Jan 1653/4; liv. 1723). Of Dudley, Worcestershire, England. An edgetool maker. (His brother Thomas and wife Grace may be THOMAS's parents.)

9.450. **MARGERIE BATE** (d. 27 Jan 1704/5). Marriage bann published 4 Jun 1681.

9.451. **THOMAS MERRILLS, JR.** (ca. 1656 - 7 Nov 1711). Died in Saybrook, CT.

9.452. **ELIZABETH ROE** (ca. 1658 - 1693).

9.453. **COL. MATTHEW HOWELL** (8 Nov 1651 - 4 May 1706). Born and lived in Southampton, L.I. Married on 8 Nov 1677. Served Southampton as commissioner, treasurer, Justice of the Peace, town clerk, and trustee. Was a lieutenant colonel in the militia. High Sheriff for Suffolk County. Represented Suffolk County in colonial legislature in Albany, 1691, 1692, and 1694-1706. In 1701, expelled from legislature by the governor either, depending on which family history you read, for presenting a paper considered “disloyal to his Majesty and disaffected with his government” (i.e., wanting more freedom) or for non-appearance; returned immediately by the people in Suffolk. Will dated 31 Oct 1704. Inventory of his estate (5 Jun 1706), included oxen, cows, horses, sheep, pigs, and slaves. Massive gravestone with coat of arms in Old South End Burial Ground in East Hampton.

9.454. **MARY HALSEY** (29 Aug 1654 - ca. 1710). Born and died in Southampton. May have married secondly Captain Samuel Mulford.

9.455. **OBADIAH ROGERS** (1655 - 26 Mar 1716). Born and died in Southampton, L.I. Married SARAH on 20 Dec 1683 in Southampton. Married secondly Mary Lupton, widow of a man named Clarke.

9.456. **SARAH HOWELL** (1663 - 11 Oct 1685).

9.457. **COL. DAVID GOODRICH** (4 May 1667 - 23 Jan 1755). Married HANNAH on 7 Mar 1689. Married secondly Prudence Churchill.

9.458. **HANNAH WRIGHT** (10 Mar 1670/1 - 27 Apr 1698). Born in Wethersfield, CT.

9.459. **SAMUEL PORTER, JR.** (6 Apr 1660 - 29 Jul 1722). Of Hadley, MA. Married on 22 Feb 1682/3. Sheriff; Justice of the Peace, 1707-11; Judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas; House of Representatives, 1698, 1708, 1712, 1713; Governor’s Council. Important merchant and trader; imported goods directly from England. One of the wealthiest men of Hampshire County, MA. Enjoyed such luxuries as imported china ware, silks, linen, and the service of two black slaves (Ralph and Sue). Arranged marriages of his children to other wealthy families. Acquired over 2000 acres outside of Hadley, but died just as the great wave of 18th century land speculation was beginning to take over. Never acquired the power of political appointment of such “River Gods” as John Pynchon, son of WILLIAM PYNCHON.

9.460. **JOANNA COOK** (10 Jul 1665 - 13 Nov 1713). Of Northampton, MA.

9.461. **COL. WILLIAM WHITING** (b. Feb 1659). Born in Salem, MA. Moved to Hartford, CT. Married on 6 Oct 1676 in Hartford. Captain of a company of English soldiers and Indians for an expedition to Maine. As a colonel, led a body of horse and infantry into Hampshire, MA, to repel the French and their Indian allies in a war of 1709-10. Officer at Port Royal, 1710-11; led expedition into Canada. Represented Hartford in the General Court, 1710-15; was its speaker, 1714. Sheriff of Hartford County, 1722.

9.462. **MARY ALLYN** (3 Apr 1657 - 14 Dec 1724). Born in Hartford, CT.

9.463. **LIEUT. SAMUEL BRADFORD** (Jul 1667 - 11 Apr 1714 at age 46). Born in Plymouth and lived in Duxbury, MA. Married on 31 Jul 1689. Lieutenant of Colonial forces,

1688-1714. Juryman, 1700; constable, 1701; selectman, 1702. One of three men appointed to divide the common lands in Duxbury in 1710. Had land in Little Compton, R.I. Will dated 26 Jan 1713/4 and probated 16 Jun 1714 (names family and a black servant named William). Died in Duxbury.

9.464. **HANNAH ROGERS** (16 Nov 1668 - Sep 1754). Born in Duxbury and died in Hingham, MA. Will dated 16 Apr 1734 and codicil dated 1 Jun 1747.

9.475. **ISAAC DE FOREEST** (bapt. 25 Apr 1655 - ca. 1700). Only child of his parents to remain in New York. A baker. Married on 4 Sep 1681. Deacon in the Dutch Church (Church of St. Nicholas on Pearl Street), 1690 and 1696. Overseer of Public Works, 1699. "Orphan master" (important because of the number of people killed by Indians); once paid 60 guilders to ransom a boy and 94 guilders to ransom a girl. In 1686, living on Brouwer (Stone) Street in New Amsterdam, next door to his widowed mother.

9.476. **LYSBETH VAN DER SPIEGEL** (bapt. 26 Feb 1662). Born in New York City.

9.477. **JACOBUS GOELET** (b. 1668). Born in New York City.

9.478. **JANNETJE COUSSAERT [COSAER]** (b. ca. 1665). Born in New York City.

9.479. **ISAAC BOELEN** (bapt. 20 Dec 1685.) Born in New York City.

9.480. **CATHERINA WALDRON** (b. 23 Sep 1689). Born in Harlem, New York.

9.497. **DAVID CAIRNS** (d. 1694). Predeceased his father.

9.498. **MARGARET HALTHORNE** (d. 1718).

9.499. **THE REV. MR. WILLIAM TOD**. Minister of Buittle in Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland.

10.641. **JOHN HOLMES** (ca. 1635 - aft. 1713 and bef. 13 Apr 1715). Born in Stamford, CT. Married 11 May 1659 in Stamford. Freeman, 1669. Fence viewer for the East Field in Stamford, 1671 and 1675. Moved to Bedford, NY, in 1687. A blacksmith. A Commissioner, Townsman, and Constable. One of the patentee for Bedford in 1704. In 1710, he was the oldest of Bedford's 156 residents by far at age 75. Died there.

10.642. **RACHEL PURCELL WATERBURY** (bapt. 1636 - 20 Jun 1713). Born in Pfalz, Germany. Naturalized in London, England, 23 Feb 1637. Died in Bedford, NY.

10.643. **MR. JOHN HOBBY [HUBBY]** (1632 - Apr/May 1707). Born in England. One of the purchasers in 1656 of land from the Indians of the land on which Newtown, L.I., was founded. Conflicts with the Indians and Dutch drove most of the English back across Long Island Sound. Married about 1662. One of the original patentees of Greenwich, CT, in 1664. Became one its most useful citizens. Surveyors of highways, 1679; fence viewer 1685, 1694. Selectman ("townsman"), 1679-1701. Deputy to colonial legislature, 1682, 1696, 1697, 1701. On committee to decide boundary between Stamford and Greenwich and between Connecticut and New York (not settled until 1731). On many other town committees. Involved in getting a new

minister and constructing the town Meeting House. On jury for a witch trial. Died in Greenwich. Will dated 24 Apr 1707; estate inventory 26 May 1707; probate 12 Jun 1707.

10.644. **SARAH GRAY**. Died before JOHN.

10.645. **SERGEANT JONATHAN REYNOLDS** (1660 - bef. 1728). Of Greenwich, CT. Married 7 Dec 1682. Received a home lot in Greenwich on 23 Aug 1700. Sergeant in the Horseneck Greenwich Trained Militia Company. He and his brother were appointed to a committee to discharge their minister for dullness. Involved in lots of church disputes.

10.646. **NEVELL RIDE [RIDEMERE, RIDEWERE]**.

10.657. **JAMES FERRIS** (b. ca. 1642). Married in Boston. An original settler of Greenwich, CT.

10.658. **MARY MERRITT or LOCKWOOD** (b. 1646). Born in Watertown, MA. Died in Greenwich, CT. (It may be that their some JAMES married MARY MERRITT and this JAMES married MARY LOCKWOOD.)

10.661. **GERSHOM LOCKWOOD** (6 Sep 1643 - 12 Mar 1718/9). Born in Watertown, MA. Principal carpenter and builder of Greenwich, CT. Name came from the Bible: Zipporah bore Moses a son "and he called his name Gershom; for he said, 'I have been a sojourner in a foreign land.'" (Exodus ii. 21-22.)

10.662. **LADY ANN MILLINGTON**. Came to America in pursuit of her lover, a British army officer. After failing to find him, became a school teacher.

10.665. **ROBERT LOCKWOOD** (ca. 1656 - bet. 17 May 1731 and 23 Jan 1732). Born in Watertown, MA. A "husbandman" of Greenwich, CT. Worked on church affairs. Will dated 17 May 1731 and probated 23 Jan 1732.

10.666. **MARY**.

10.669. **THOMAS HANFORD** (18 Jul 1668 - 7 Jun 1743). Chosen schoolmaster in Norwalk, CT, on 21 Feb 1692. Inherited the homestead of his older brother Theophilus and inherited his birthright as the eldest son, receiving a double portion of his father's estate. His and HANNAH's gravestone in good state in East Norwalk.

10.670. **HANNAH LOCKWOOD** (d. 28 Dec 1745, at age 78 years and 5 days). Widow of John Burwell.

10.671. **JAMES ST. JOHN** (1674 - Jun 1754).

10.672. **MARY COMSTOCK** (19 Feb 1671 - 17 Oct 1749).

10.673. **JOHN HOLLY** (1618 - 25 May 1681 in his 63<sup>rd</sup> year). A prominent citizen of Stamford, CT, in almost constant service of the town or colony. Born in England. Immigrated to Cambridge, MA, in 1630. Settled in Stamford by 1644. Bought land from WILLIAM NEWMAN in 1667; bought more land and received grants from Stamford; did not sell any but gave it to his sons. Freeman, 14 Oct 1669. Collector of custom and excise, 1658, 1662; on committee of three in 1652 and 1667 for settling disputes with Indians; magistrate, 1654-55; selectman (townsman), 1666, 1671, 1673-4, 1678; juryman, 1667; on committee to settle boundary dispute with Greenwich, 1667; fence viewer, 1664, 1666-7, 1676; town recorder, 1669;

town clerk, 168-70; surveyor of highways, 1671; town auditor, 1672-3. Marshall of the Court, 1648; deputy to General Court in Hartford, 1654-5, 1663; commissioner (justice) for Stamford and Greenwich, 1667-81, along with RICHARD LAW. Greenwich tried to get him to move there; may have moved there but soon thereafter returned to Stamford. Will dated 14 Apr 1681; probated 28 June 1681. FRANCIS BELL was a witness. Left estate of £312.

10.674. **MARY [WAITSTILL?]** (ca. 1620 - 7 Apr 1714).

10.675. **WILLIAM NEWMAN** (b. 1610). Born in England. A planter in Stamford, CT. Immigrated to America probably around 1630-1635. From court records: in 1659 complaints were made to the court in New Haven respecting the size of shoes, and the court heard that WILLIAM had an instrument which he had brought from England which “was thought to be right to determine this question, did order that the said instrument should be procured and sent to New Haven, to be made a ‘Standard’ which shall be the rule between buyer and seller, to which it is required that all sizes be conformed.” (Suggests that he was a shoemaker.) Representative in the General Court in New Haven. Active in civic affairs (was on committee to lay out the highways). May have moved to Narragansett, RI, after 1676, but probably died in Stamford by then.

10.677. **RICHARD WEBB** (ca. 1611 - 15 Mar 1675/6). Probably from Dorset, England. In New Haven, CT, by 1643. In Stamford, CT, by 1651 when he bought a house near an abandoned mill he later took over (house moved in 1943 to Darien). Had Quaker leanings. Objected to harsh treatment of Stamford by New Haven. Freeman of Connecticut (not New Haven), 1662. Juryman, 1667. Selectman, 1667, 1668; townsman, 1670. Fence viewer, 1671. Will dated 7 Jan 1675/6; inventory (by RICHARD LAW and FRANCIS BELL) on 29 Apr 1676.

10.678. **MARGERY [MOYER or ROBINSON or GREGORY?]**.

10.681. **JOHN JAGGER [GAGER]** (d. 16 Oct 1684). Born in Wethersfield or Stamford, CT. Apprenticed to a cooper in New Haven at age 15. Was in Stamford by 1641. Large land owner there; some land in recognition of his father service in the Pequot War. Freeman, 1670. Will dated 20 Oct 1682 and probated on 16 Feb 1684.

10.682. **HANNAH CROSS**. Of Windsor or Wethersfield, CT.

10.683. **STEPHEN HOLMES** (d. 15 May 1710). Married and died in Stamford, CT. Freeman, 1669. Constable, 1690. Having attained the biblical age of 3 score and 10 years, he began to distribute his property among his children in 1703. Will dated 6 Sep 1707; probated on 3 Jan 1710/1(? conflicts with date of death); estate inventory on 14 Nov 1710.

10.684. **MARTHA** (d. 13 Mar 1727/8).

10.689. **THE REV. MR. JOHN BISHOP** (3 May 1610 - 16 Nov 1694). “An eminent divine and scholar.” “Celebrated throughout the New England colonies as one of the most self-sacrificing and hard-working divines.” Born in Holway, Dorsetshire. Graduated Balliol College, Oxford, 7 Jun 1632; M.A., 15 Apr 1635. Became Rector of Batcombe, Dorset, 1636-40. Arrived in Massachusetts, 1640. A schoolmaster in Taunton while studying theology under Increase Mather. Two men (including FRANCIS BELL) who had heard of him came from Stamford, CT, and asked him to be the second pastor of the church there. Walked to Stamford in 1644 and remained the pastor there over 50 years until his death. Annual salary of £70, mostly

paid in goods. Freeman, 13 Oct 1670. The colony gave the good divine 200 acres of land in New Haven. Married REBECCA in Stamford. Married secondly Joanna Boyce, a widow. Will dated 16 Nov 1694 and probated 12 Mar 1694/5. Buried in West Park Cemetery, Stamford, between his two wives.

10.690. **REBECCA GOODYEAR** (b. ca. 1626). Born in St. Mary, Woolnoth Parish, London.

10.691. **JOHN KNOWLES** (ca. 1634 - Dec 1663). Born in Fairfield, CT. Freeman, 1664. Married around 1668 in Stamford, CT.

10.692. **REBECCA CABLE**.

10.693. **INCREASE HOLLY**. See 9.337.

10.694. **ELIZABETH NEWMAN**. See 9.338.

10.695. **CAPT. JOHN SELLECK** (b. 21 Feb 1643). Born in Stamford, CT. Wealthy ship owner and captain. Married on 28 Oct 1669 in Stamford. Taken prisoner by the French on an ocean voyage in May 1689.

10.696. **SARAH LAW** (b. 1639).

10.697. **JOHN BATES** (ca. 1641 - 26 Dec 1714). Of Stamford, CT. Ensign in town militia, 1685. Deputy to General Court, 1689-90.

10.698. **SARAH CROSS** (d. 18 Feb 1711/2). Of Stamford, CT. "A useful and skillful midwife." Gave testimony as midwife in Oct 1692 in the Clawson witchcraft trial.

10.699. **JOHN SELLECK**. See 10.695.

10.700. **SARAH LAW**. See 10.696.

10.701. **PETER FERRIS** (ca. 1633 - 28 Sep 1706). Born in Fairfield, CT. Married ELIZABETH on 15 Jul 1654 in Stamford, New Haven Colony. Married second Ruth Weed, a widow, in 1707/8, 50 years after his first marriage.

10.702. **ELIZABETH REYNOLDS** (ca. 1636 - bef. 25 Jul 1705). Of Stamford, CT.

10.703. **JONATHAN BELL** (Sep 1641 - 11 Mar 1699). The first child born in Stamford, CT. Prominent in civil and religious affairs. Married first Mercy Crane. Married SUSANNA in Branford, CT, on 31 Oct 1672. Owned a tanning yard. Deputy to colonial legislature, for a least one session a year for most years between 1670 and 1691. Commissioner for Stamford and Greenwich, 1682-7; for Stamford, 1690-7. Justice, 1698. Selectman, 14 years. Commissioned a captain of the Stamford train band by the General Court in May 1698 and directed to take charge of the ammunition of the town and find a suitable place for it in the Meeting House. Prominent in religious, civil, and military affairs. Will dated 24 Nov 1698. Left an estate worth £456, mostly in land. "A worthy successor of his distinguished sire."

10.704. **SUSANNA PIERSON** (10 Dec 1652 - 4 Jan 1706/7). Born in Branford, New Haven colony. Died in Stamford, CT.

10.705. **SAMUEL HAIGHT** (1 May 1647 - 12 Nov 1712). A "Friend" (i.e., member of the Society of Friends (Quakers)). From Windsor, CT. Moved to Eastchester in Westchester County, NY. Died in Flushing, Long Island.

10.706. **SARAH NOBLE** (b. ca. 1651). Of Flushing, Queens, L.I.

10.707. **ANTHONY FIELD** (bef. 1633 - 1689). Of Flushing, Queens. Will dated 24 Jul 1687 and probated 10 Apr 1689.

10.709. **ROBERT SUTTON** (d. 1725). A yeoman born in Southampton, L.I. Moved to Hempstead. Had considerable land. Will dated 26 Nov 1724; probated 23 Jan 1725.

10.710. **HANNAH [WILSON?]** (d. 1753). Will dated 14 Aug 1735; probated 30 Apr 1753. Defied her husband in her will by having the lands sold and proceeds divided between their sons; ROBERT had wants the sons to have the land.

10.711. **JAMES SANDS** (1662 - 21 Sep 1732). Born on Block Island, R.I. Freeman, 1684. Moved to Matinicock, Nassau Co., in 1696. Married in MARY 1697. Died in Sands Point, Cow Neck, Nassau Co. Had considerable land. Will dated 21 Sep 1730; probated 19 Jan 1733. He and MARY are interred on their farm.

10.712. **MARY CORNELL** (b. 1679 - bef. 1732). Born in Scarsdale, Westchester Co., NY. Died before JAMES.

10.745. **RALPH KEELER** (ca. 1613 - 10 Sep 1672). Born in England. Perhaps the son of a Ralph Keeler, a yeoman in Lawford, Essex. A carpenter. SARAH was the mother of his children. Second wife: Sarah Howes, widow of a man named Whepley. Was in Hartford, CT, by 1639; in Norwalk, CT, by Dec 1653; in Jamaica, NY, by Mar 1663; back in Norwalk soon afterwards. Will dated 20 Aug 1672.

10.747. **JOHN ROCKWELL** (bapt. 22 Jul 1621). Of Stamford, CT. Baptized in St. James Church, Fitzhead, Somersetshire. Married in Rye, NY, around 1658. May have died in Rye. Ancestor of the painter Norman Rockwell.

10.748. **ELIZABETH WEED** (1637 - aft. 18 May 1677). Born in Wethersfield, CT. Lived in Stamford, CT. Died in Rye, NY. (She may not have been the mother of MEHITABEL — JOHN may have had a first wife by that name who died.)

10.749. **MARK ST. JOHN** (ca. 1633 - 12 Aug 1693). Born in Dorchester, MA. Married and died in Norwalk, CT. Deputy to Connecticut Legislature, 1672, 1676, 1678, 1684. Married secondly Dorothy Smith. Died in Norwalk about 59 years old. Estate inventoried on 7 Nov 1693.

10.750. **ELIZABETH STANLEY** (ca. 1635 - 12 Aug 1693). Born in Hartford, CT. Died in Norwalk, CT.

10.751. **THOMAS BETTS** (bapt. 3 Dec 1615 - 1688). Born in West Perkhams, Kent. Married in Guilford, CT. In Milford, CT, by summer 1639, and in Norwalk by 1660 (house next to RICHARD OLMSTED). Freeman, 13 Oct 1664. A founder of Wilton (then part of Norwalk), CT, in 1672. Owned lots of land. Will dated 10 May 1688; inventory 4 Dec 1688. Died there.

10.752. **MARY RAYMOND** (d. aft. 16 Apr 1723/4). Of Norwalk.

10.769. **LIEUT. RICHARD POST** (4 Feb 1617 - 1689). Immigrated to Lynn, MA, about 1635 with an older cousin. Married about 1638. One of the first settlers of Southampton, L.I., in 1640. (Southampton or Southold was the first English settlement in what is now the state of New York.) (The settlers may have decided to leave the Massachusetts Bay Colony because of the Puritans' intolerance there -- in the words of the preacher John Cotton, "it was Toleration that made the world anti-Christian.") Land granted to him by the crown in 1643. Constable and marshal in Southampton, 1651. Lieutenant in town's militia. Homestead was on east side of Main Street. Man of means and much real estate.

10.770. **DOROTHY [JOHNSON?]** (d. 1694). Oral will probated 19 May 1694.

10.773. **THOMAS HALSEY alias CHAMBERS** (bapt. 10 Mar 1593/4 - 27 Aug 1678). A yeoman from Kempston, Cranfield, Bedfordshire (family originally from Hertfordshire). Not the Thomas Halsey of the Golden Parsonage in Great Gaddesden, Hertfordshire (although they may have been related). Living in Lynn, MA, in 1638; owned 100 acres there. An original settler of Southampton, L.I., in early 1640s. Independent spirit and strong will. Not always respectful of his fellow townsmen. Outspoken and argumentative; often in court on disputes. Lived at first in a "cellar" (a dwelling dug in earth, lined with trees, with a roof made of trees); located near site of present Southampton Hospital. Homestead on South Main Street (house thought to be the oldest frame house in state). Land owner and town marshal. Delegate to the General Court in Hartford, CT. Married secondly Ann, widow of Edward Johnes. Will dated 28 Jun 1677.

10.774. **ELIZABETH WHEELER** (ca. 1599 -1649). From Cranfield, Bedfordshire. Married there. Probably the "good honest woman" killed by Pequot Indians in Southampton; one was hanged in Hartford after it was found out that he at least knew of the attack.

10.775. **JOSHUA BARNES** (ca. 1616 - ca. 1692). From Eastwich, Norfolk, England. Upon his arrival in Boston, was apprenticed on 4 Sep 1632 to William Paine for five years. In 1639, was in Yarmouth (proposed for Freeman, 1641); Edgartown, Martha's Vineyard, 1646. On 6 Oct 1649, town of Southampton, L.I., made a settlement with him for the hire of his boat. Was planter in Southampton by 1650. Townsman, 1657; Deputy to the General Court in Hartford, 1663. Moved to Hempstead, L.I., and then to Westchester. Made deed in lieu of a will to his family members in Aug 1684 and in 1692.

10.776. **PRUDENCE or AMY**. AMY was JOSHUA's wife when he died, but he married first a woman named PRUDENCE, who probably was the mother of his children.

10.777. **THOMAS HALSEY**. See 10.773.

10.778. **ELIZABETH WHEELER**. See 10.774.

10.779. **JOSHUA BARNES**. See 10.775.

10.780. **PRUDENCE or AMY**. See 10.776.

10.781. **ISAAC WILLMAN**. One of the original settlers of Southampton, L.I. Accommodation laid out for him in 1645 in Old Town. The Willman family did not remain in Southampton after 1700.

10.782. **MARY**.



10.785. **JOHN HUNTTING** (1597 or 1602 - 12 Apr 1689). Married at Hoxne (pronounced “Oxen”) near Diss, Suffolk, in 1617. Immigrated in the spring of 1638. May have been a Nonconformist in England; ordained the first Ruling Elder in the Independent (Puritan) Church at Dedham, MA, in 1639. Admitted a Freeman on 13 Mar 1639 in Dedham. Died and buried there.

10.786. **HESTER SEABORNE** (ca. 1600 - 3 Apr 1676). A second cousin of the Protestant martyr John Rogers who was buried alive in front of his wife and children by order of Queen Mary.

10.787. **THOMAS PAYNE** (18 Jan 1612/3 - 3 Aug 1686). A weaver from Wrentham, England. Settled in Dedham, MA, about 1640, where he bought the house and lands of Henry Phillips. Married in 1641.

10.788. **REBECCA WARE** (d. 1688). Of Dedham, MA. Will dated 3 Mar 1687/8.

10.789. **PERCIVAL GREEN** (ca. 1603 - 25 Dec 1639). Sailed to Cambridge, MA, in the spring of 1635 aboard the “Susan and Ellen,” with ELLEN and two servants. House north of the Commons in Cambridge. Married in Cambridge. Admitted a Freeman there on 3 Mar 1636.

10.790. **ELLEN** (ca. 1600 - 27 May 1682). Married secondly Thomas Fox.

10.791. **EDWARD MITCHELSON, ESQ.** (ca. 1605 - 7 Mar 1682/3). Living in Cambridge, MA, by 1636. Married there. Marshall General of the colony for many years, beginning in 1654. One of his duties was to hang four Quaker missionaries who returned while under a sentence of exile from the intolerant Puritan colony.

10.792. **RUTH BUSHNELL** (b. 1612). Sailed to America aboard the “Abigail.” The “Abigail” sailed 20 Jun 1628 and landed at Naumkeag; the passengers took over the small fishing post established there by exiles from Plymouth two years earlier and renamed it “Salem” (from Hebrew *shalom*, “peace”).

10.799. **JOHN BUTLER** (2 Jan 1624/5 - 21 Jul 1658). Born in Ashford, Kent.

10.800. **MARY LYNDE** (b. 1629). From Dunstable, Bedfordshire. Alive in 1693 in Martha’s Vineyard, MA.

10.817. **CAPT. JOHN CONKLIN** (ca. 1634 - 6 Apr 1694). Born in Nottinghamshire. Sailed to Salem, MA, with his parents when he was a young child. Then moved to Southold, L.I. Married SARAH on 2 Dec 1657. Admitted a Freeman of Connecticut, 9 Oct 1662, the same day as his father. More aggressive and active than his father. Held much land; numerous land dealings in Oyster Ponds (Orient Point) and Acquabogue. Became the largest land-owner in Southold. Had 5 slaves. Was involved in a protracted litigation on behalf of SARAH and her children to defend their claim to more land in Hashamomack, L.I., but lost. Will dated 2 Feb 1689/90. Buried in Southold in heavy, flat-topped tomb.

10.818. **SARAH HORTON**. Was the widow of William Salmon when married JOHN.

10.819. **THOMAS SCUDDER** (ca. 1624 - 16 Nov 1690). Born in Kent. With his two brothers, Henry and John, he left Salem, MA, for New Haven, CT. They sailed to Southold, L.I. by 1651, and in 1657 they sold their lands and moved to the Northport/Huntington area of western Long Island, where they raised cattle and farmed. Died in Huntington. Will dated 7 Nov 1686 and probated 22 Oct 1691.

- 10.820. **MARY LUDLAM** (b. 7 Aug 1639). Born in Matlock, Devonshire.
- 10.821. **CAPT. BENJAMIN MOORE** (b. or bapt. 2 Aug 1640). Born in Salem, MA. Died without a will; letters of administration issued on 8 Sep 1691.
- 10.822. **ANN[E] HAMPTON** (b. ca. 1645).
- 10.823. **CALEB HORTON** (23 Dec 1642 - 3 Oct 1702). Born and married (23 Dec 1665) in Southold. Settled in Cutchogue. Accepted a Freeman of Connecticut, 1664. In 1685, appointed by the Connecticut Governor one of five prominent Southold men to act as Justices of Peace.
- 10.824. **ABIGAIL HALLOCK** (ca. 1650 - 7 Apr 1697). Born in Cutchogue, L.I. Youngest daughter of WILLIAM.
- 10.825. **LIEUT. SAMUEL GLOVER** (20 Jun 1644 - 29 May 1715). Married in Southold (in Jan 1669?).
- 10.826. **SARAH MARY MOORE** (b. ca. 1652). Born in Salem, MA.
- 10.829. **THOMAS DIBBLE** (b. 3 Sep 1647). Born and lived in Windsor, CT. Married MARY on 10 Oct 1672.
- 10.830. **MARY TUCKER** (4 Oct 1653 - 1681). Born in England.
- 10.831. **THOMAS MULFORD** (1655 - 2 Nov 1732). Born and lived in East Hampton, L.I. Will dated 14 Feb 1726/7 and probated 14 Feb 1732/3; gave MARY the use of the east end of their dwelling house and 1/3 of all his lands and privileges within East Hampton during her widowhood, and 1/2 of all his household goods, their two Indian servants, and so forth, to dispose of as she thought fit.
- 10.832. **MARY CONKLIN** (ca. 1658 - 14 Jul 1743). Born in East Hampton, L.I.
- 10.833. **SIMON SACKETT** (ca. 1628 - 9 Jul 1659). From St. John Margate, Isle of Thanet, Kent. Sailed to Boston on the "Lyon" with his father. Moved with his brother John to Springfield, MA by 1656. Married SARAH, a playmate from their youth, there. Died there.
- 10.834. **SARAH BLOOMFIELD**.
- 10.835. **CAPT. RICHARD BETTS** (11 Apr 1614 - 18 Nov 1713). Born in Hertfordshire. Came to New England about 1635. Settled in Newe Towne (Cambridge), MA. Moved to Ipswich before 1642 and remained there until 1654. A founder of Newtown (now Elmhurst), Queens, L.I. Married JOANNA about 1639 in Massachusetts. Prominent and influential. In public affairs for nearly 50 years. Played a zealous role in the English conquest of New Netherlands. Member from Newtown of the Provisional Assembly held in Hempstead, 1665. "High Sheriff of Yorkshire, upon Long Island," 1678-81. Magistrate for many years; several times was a member of the High Court of Assise (the supreme judicial power of the colony). Will dated 16 Mar 1711 and probated 26 Nov 1713; son-in-law JOSEPH SACKETT is one executor. Died in Newtown, L.I. "None in the township has been so eminent as he for commanding influence and valuable public service."
- 10.836. **JOANNA CHAMBERLYN [CHAMBERLIN]** (bapt. Oct 1630 - aft. 16 Mar 1711). From Strood, Kent. Had a brother Samuel. She died in Newtown, Queens.

10.837. **NATHANIEL KIRTLAND [KERTLAND]** (14 Nov 1613 - 27 Dec 1686). From Sherrington, Buckinghamshire, England. Sailed on the ship "Hopewell" to Massachusetts in 1635 with his brother Philip. Resided first in Lynn, MA. Moved to Southold, L.I., where he married PARNEL. Returned to Lynn by 1658; served several years as a Selectman. Died there.

10.838. **PARNEL RAND** (d. 1694). Married secondly John Laiton on 31 Oct 1687. Died in Lynn, Ma. Will dated 16 Sep 1694 and probated 15 Dec 1694.

10.839. **LIEUT. WILLIAM PRATT** (bapt. 6 Jun 1609 - 20 Feb 1670). Born in Stevenage, Hertfordshire. He and his brother John were followers of Rev. Thomas Hooker, following him first to Newtown, MA, and then to Hartford, CT. Married in Jun 1636 in Hartford. Distinguished himself in the Pequot Indian War. (Basically a genocide; event he Pequot language was outlawed.) Settled in Saybrook, CT, in a part that later became Essex. Was a Representative from Saybrook to the General Court in Hartford for 23 sessions.

10.840. **ELIZABETH CLARK[E]** (ca. 1623 - 17 Oct 1678). Living in Hartford when met WILLIAM. Died in Saybrook.

10.841. **ALBERTUS CONRADUS BOSCH** (early 1645 - ca. 1695). Born in Leyden. Learned his trade with his father as an apprentice in Leyden. Became a blacksmith in iron, copper, and silver. A "Sword Cutler of New Amsterdam." His residence and place of business was on the south side of Stone Street, east of Broad Street, near Battery Park. Married ELJSE on 1 May 1668 in the Dutch Reformed Church; joined the church in Oct. Predeceased his father.

10.842. **ELSIE [ELJSE] BLONCK [BLANCK]**. Lived nearby on Pearl Street.

10.843. **CAPT. DIRCH SMITH.**

10.844. **ANNETJE MEYDERTS.**

10.849. **WILLIAM LYON** (1540 - 7 Sep 1624). Of Little Stanmore, Middlesex, England. (There must be one generation between WILLIAM and RICHARD.)

10.850. **ISABELL WIGHTMAN.**

10.853. **HENRY JACKSON** (ca. 1606 - 22 Sep 1686). Born in London, England. Sailed over on the "Elizabeth and Ann" in 1635 at age of 29 with his younger brother. Settled first in Watertown, MA. Gave Edward Howe power of attorney to collect his debts in England. Was in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT, by 1648. Agreed with town to erect a grist mill on west side of the Uncoway River. Freeman, 10 Oct 1669. Will dated 11 Nov 1682. Died in Fairfield.

10.854. **MARY ABBOTT.** Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

10.855. **GILES SMITH** (1604 - 1 Dec 1669). Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

10.856. **MARY WHEELER** (20 Oct 1615 - aft 1654). Born in Bourne End in Cranfield, Bedfordshire. Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

10.857. **WILLIAM THORPE [THARP]** (d. 1679) Of New Haven, CT. But not the William Thorp who a founder of New Haven. Came to New Haven as a servant of John Johnson in 1637. Married secondly, Margaret, widow of Robert Pigg. Will dated 12 Sep 1670 and probated 8 Nov 1679.

10.858. **ELIZABETH** (d. 9 Oct 1660). Of New Haven, CT.

- 10.859. **DANIEL FROST** (17 Jan 1613 - 23 Feb 1682). Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.
- 10.860. **ELIZABETH BARLOW** (1622 - bef. 13 Aug 1686). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Was DANIEL's second wife. Her estate was inventoried 13 Aug 1686.
- 10.865. **NATHAN OLMSTEAD** (27 Apr 1678 - 1716/7). Lived in Norwalk, CT. Married first Sarah Keeler, daughter of RALPH KEELER. Estate inventoried, 12 Jan 1716/7.
- 10.866. **MERCY COMSTOCK** (b. 12 Nov 1676). Outlived NATHAN. Sister of MARY COMSTOCK, 10.672.
- 10.869. **JAMES TROWBRIDGE** (26 Mar 1664/5 - 1732). Born in West Haven, CT. Married first Lydia Alsop; secondly Hester [Esther] Howe. Married MARY on 19 Apr 1698. A farmer and cordwainer (shoemaker) from Hatfield, MA. Lived in New Haven and Stratford, CT, and beginning in 1712 in Wilton, CT (in Norwalk township). Deacon in the Congregational Church in Wilton from 1712 until his death. Grand juror in 1719 and town tax collector in 1721. Will dated 29 Apr 1732 and probated 5 Jul 1732.
- 10.870. **MARY BELDEN** (b. 17 Nov 1677). Born in Deerfield, MA.
- 10.871. **CAPT. JOHN SEYMOUR** (1675 - 1746). Born in Norwalk, CT, after Jan 1675/6 (possibly a child of his father's second wife). Married SARAH on 15 Sep 1698 in Norwalk; married secondly Hannah Higginbotham. A selectman in Norwalk. Died in Norwalk between 26 May 1746 (date of last codicil) and 5 Aug 1746 (when will probated).

- 10.883. **JACOB PATCHEN** (ca. 1663 - 15 Feb 1749 at age 87). Born in Fairfield, Fairfield Co., CT. Admitted a Freeman in Fairfield, CT, 16 Mar 1689/90 with his father. Baptized as adult in Fairfield on 17 Mar 1694/5. Active in church. Died in Wilton, CT.
- 10.884. **MARY HUBBARD** (1668 - 25 Mar 1754). Born in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Married first Samuel Grumman. Died in Wilton, CT.
- 10.885. **NATHAN ADAMS** (1660 - 6 Feb 1748/9). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Married secondly Jane Buckley, the widow of three men; married thirdly Anna.
- 10.886. **MARY JAMES** (23 Dec 1694 - bef. 1748). Born in Fairfield, Fairfield Co., CT.
- 10.887. **CAPT. JOHN FINCH** (1657 - 4 Jun 1727). Born in Westchester Co., NY. Moved with family to Huntington, L.I. Married first Hester Davis in New York City. A mariner in Greenwich, CT; granted land in 1697. In Stamford, CT, by 1699. Married ELIZABETH there around 1704. By 1707, was a shopkeeper in New York City.

10.903. **HUGH ROE** (1621 - 5 Aug 1689). From Devonshire, England. Married Abigail on 14 Jan 1655 in England. Died in Suffield, CT.

10.904. **ABIGAIL** (d. 3 Sep 1689). Died in Suffield, CT.

10.905. **MAJ. JOHN HOWELL** (bapt. 28 Nov 1624 - 3 Nov 1696). Born in Marsh Gibbon, Buckinghamshire. As the eldest son of EDWARD, he was a gentleman in the colony at Southampton, L.I. Married around 1647. Admitted as a Freeman there in 1648. Rose to rank of major in the town militia (the horse guard); clerk and secretary of the Quarter Court; commissioner for Indian affairs; tax collector; magistrate in 1664; deputy to the General Court in Hartford, CT. Buried in Old South End Burial Grounds, East Hampton, L.I.

10.906. **SUSANNAH MITCHELL** (bapt. 14 Oct 1627 - 24 Mar 1711). Baptized in South Ouram, Halifax, Yorkshire. Lived in Connecticut. Buried in Old South End Burial Grounds, East Hampton.

10.907. **THOMAS HALSEY** (bapt. 26 Nov 1626 - 1688). Will dated 3 Aug 1688. Son of THOMAS HALSEY, 10.773. Buried in Hay Ground Graveyard, Bridgehampton, L.I.

10.908. **MARY BARTLETT [BARNETT]** (bapt. 7 Aug 1631- 20 Dec 1699). Of Cransfield. Will dated 18 Dec 1699.

10.909. **OBADIAH ROGERS** (bapt. 7 Mar 1630/1 - 1692). Baptized in Stratford-on-Avon, Warwick. Died in Southampton, L.I. Will dated 24 Jul 1689 and probated 23 Jun 1692.

10.910. **MARY RUSSELL**. Sister of William Russell of Southampton.

10.911. **EDWARD HOWELL** (4 Sep 1626 - 29 Apr 1699). Born in Marsh Gibbon, Buckinghamshire. Married and died in Southampton, L.I.

10.912. **MARY FORDHAM** (10 Sep 1633 - 25 Mar 1717). From Flemstead, Hertfordshire. Died in Southampton. Will probated 29 Mar 1717.

10.913. **ENSIGN WILLIAM GOODRICH** (d.14 Nov 1676 at age 56). From Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk (the old capital of East Anglia). One of the first settlers of Wethersfield, CT. Admitted a Freeman there, 15 May 1646. Married 4 Oct 1648 in Hartford, CT. Deputy to General Court in Hartford, 1662. Ensign in Wethersfield's train band. Died in Wethersfield.

10.914. **SARAH MARVIN** (27 Dec 1631 - Dec 1702). From Great Bentley, Essex. Married secondly Capt. William Curtis. Will dated 21 Oct 1697. Died in Stratford, CT. Sister of HANNAH MARVIN, 11.1742.

10.915. **THOMAS WRIGHT, JR.** (13 Aug 1630 - 23 Aug 1683). Born in England. Settled in Wethersfield, CT. Married on 16 Jun 1657 or 1658.

10.916. **ELIZABETH CHITTENDEN** (ca. 1640 - 23 Aug 1683). Born in Wethersfield or New Haven, CT.

10.917. **SAMUEL PORTER** (2 Jun 1635 - 6 Sep 1689). From Felsted, Essex. Settled first in Windsor, CT. An original settler of Hadley, MA, arriving early in 1660; one the 59 men who signed the Agreement or Engagement to move to Massachusetts. Established "a venerable family

tradition of material wealth and political influence.” Engaged in trading, money lending, land speculation, and farming. “By combining the benefits of trade, land speculation, military distinction, and political patronage, the Porters became during the second and third generations one of the wealthiest and most powerful families in the Connecticut Valley.”

10.918. **HANNAH STANLEY** (ca. 1636 - 18 Dec 1702). Born in Hartford, CT. Married shortly before moving to Hadley, MA. Died in Hadley.

10.919. **CAPT. AARON COOKE** (bapt. 21 Feb 1640 - 16 Sep 1716). Born in Windsor, CT. Lived in Northampton, MA. Among the first settlers of Hadley, MA. Married there on 30 May 1661. Appointed Justice of the Peace and captain in the local militia, 1692. Died in Hadley.

10.920. **SARAH WESTWOOD** (ca. 1644 - 24 Mar 1730). Born in Hartford, CT. Died in Hadley, MA.

10.921. **THE REV. MR. JOHN WHITING** (1635 - 8 Sep 1689). Harvard College graduate, 1653. Married 1654; married secondly Phebe Gregson. A minister briefly in Salem, MA. But when asked about staying in Salem permanently, moved to Hartford, CT. A dispute in the church arose there, and he became pastor of a new church until his death.

10.922. **SYBIL COLLINS** (3 Apr 1634 - Jun 1672). From Framlingham, Suffolk, England.

10.923. **JOHN ALLYN** (bapt. 24 Feb 1630/1 - 16 Nov 1696). Born in Braunton, Devonshire. Came to New England with his father. Married ANNE on 19 Nov 1651; married secondly Hannah Lamberton, daughter of GEORGE LAMBERTON and the widow of Gov. Samuel Wells. Father gave him the mill at Hartford, CT, as a wedding present. Cornet of troops, 1657-58. Town clerk for Hartford, 1659-96; deputy to General Court, 1661; Judge of the Court of Common Pleas. Admitted a Freeman, 1662. Secretary of the Colony of Connecticut from 1663 to 1696 (known as “Secretary John”). Councillor to Gov. Andros in 1687. Lieut. Colonel of the Hartford County regiment. Wrote book on the war with the Pequot Indians. Buried in the churchyard near the Founders’ Monument in Hartford. A man of esteem, untiring industry, influence, and intelligence.

10.924. **ANNE [HANNAH] SMITH** (b. 9 Nov 1640). Born in Dorchester, England.

10.925. **MAJ. WILLIAM BRADFORD** (17 Jun 1624 - 20 Feb 1703/4). Born and died in Plymouth, MA. Married ALICE in the spring of 1650. Married twice more: a widow named \_\_\_\_\_ Fitch Wiswall and Mary Wood Holmes (daughter of JOHN ATWOOD). Resided in Stony Brook (Kingston), MA. Second to Miles Standish as leader of the Plymouth military. Commander in Chief during the King Philip’s War, 1675-6. Commander of the Plymouth forces at the “Great Swamp Fight” (or “Narragansett Fort Fight”) of 1675 between the Narragansett Indians (who were attacked although they were neutral in the war, to keep them from joining King Philip) and the English and their Mohegan allies; nearly a thousand Indians and nearly 150 English soldiers died; he was severely wounded (musket ball remained in him rest of his life). Deputy Governor, 1682-86, 1689-91; treasurer, 1679-85. Member of the Council of Massachusetts, 1687-88. Named Councillor of Province of Massachusetts Bay in Charter of 1692. Will dated 29 Jun 1703 and probated 10 Mar 1703/4. His estate comprised the whole of the present village of Kingston.

10.926. **ALICE RICHARDS** (16 Jun 1627 - 12 Dec 1671). Baptized on 7 Apr 1629 in Pitminster, Somersetshire. Died in Plymouth.

10.927. **JOHN ROGERS, JR.** (ca. 1640 - 28 Jun 1732). Born and married (Nov 1666) in Duxbury, MA. Admitted a Freeman, 1659. Constable of Duxbury, 1670, 1681; surveyor of highways, 1671 and later. A merchant. Lived at various times in Duxbury, Boston, Taunton, Swansea, and Bristol and Barrington, RI. Owned land in Tiverton and Little Compton. Married secondly Hannah Hobart Browne (daughter of Rev. Peter Hobart) and thirdly Marah Cobham Browning. Was blind late in life. Died and buried in Barrington, RI. Estate was embroiled in lengthy controversy when grandsons accused Marah and others of embezzling from his estate.

10.928. **ELIZABETH PABODIE** (24 Apr 1647 - ca. 1678). Born in Duxbury, MA. Died in Duxbury between 4 May 1677 (birth of child) and 21 Oct 1679 (JOHN's second marriage).

10.949. **ISAACK DE FOREEST** (bapt. 10 Jul 1616 - 1674). Baptized in Leyden, Holland. Probably accompanied his parents in the immigration to the Wyapoko River, Guiana (now the Oyapok River, the boundary between Surinam and Brazil), and returned to Leyden in 1625 with his widowed mother and his brothers. Sailed from Amsterdam with his brother and two servants on 1 Oct 1636 on the "Rensselaerwick" owned by Killian van Rensselaer, the first patroon. In 1637, he and his brother Hendrick and his wife became the first people to reside in Harlem on Manhattan. (Haarlem is a Dutch name.) Upper Manhattan was then a forest inhabited by bears and pumas and a few Indians. They raised tobacco and sold it in the village of New Amsterdam. ISAACK had 100 acres in a broad plain called "Muscoota" (the "flat land") in the area of what is now 126<sup>th</sup> Street and First Avenue. Raised tobacco; had slaves from Africa to work the fields. Married on 9 Jun 1641. ISAACK's wagon tracks became the first lane for the new village of New Haarlem. In the summer or fall of 1643, the family moved down to the village of New Amsterdam and lived on the market square just outside the fort. Rented the plantation in Harlem; the house and tobacco barn there were later destroyed by Indians during a war. Sold land in Harlem to Wilhelmus Beekman, a burgher. Opened a tobacco warehouse on the Strand (now Pearl Street); also had a brewery on Brouwer (Stone) Street and a hops farm and orchard. He and some others paved the street at their own expense -- thereafter called Stone Street, the first paved street in the city. Was important figure in civic affairs. On the advisory committee of nine men (advisors from the village to the colony's governor before the city was incorporated), 1652; inspector of tobacco, 1653; farmer of the revenue of the weighing-house, 1655-56; elected "schepen," 1657; appointed a small burgher, 1657; great burgher and schepen, 1658. Will dated 4 Jun 1672. "One of the most influential burghers and inhabitants of the city."

10.950. **SARA DU TRIEUX** (Jun 1624 - 9 Nov 1692). One of the first children born in New Amsterdam -- either born there or on the "New Netherlands" while sailing over. (Colonists began arriving in 1624.)

10.951. **LAURENS VAN DER SPIEGEL** (b. 29 Nov 1637). Born in New Amsterdam, New Netherlands. Married there on 22 Apr 1661.

10.952. **SARA WEBBER** (b. 1640). Born in New Amsterdam.

10.953. **FRANCIS GOELET.**

10.957. **JACOB BOELEN** (d. 4 Apr 1729). Married 21 May 1679 in New Amsterdam.

10.958. **CATHERINA or TRYNTIE CLOCK [KLOCK]** (18 Jan 1654 - 9 Feb 1730). Of New Amsterdam, New Netherlands.

10.959. **DANIEL JOSEPHS WALDRON** [“**ALDERING**”] (bapt. 16 Jan 1650 - 19 Mar 1691). Married, 11 Oct 1673, in New Dutch Church, New Amsterdam.

10.960. **SARAH RUTGERS** (bapt. 5 May 1643 - 1 Jan 1738). Of New Amsterdam.

10.993. **EDWARD CAIRNS** (d. 1714). Laird of Torr. An ardent Roundhead. Fought in Cromwell’s army (for which he was fined 240 pounds after the Restoration). Married 1647. When his eldest son DAVID predeceased him, disputes and law suits arose over who would inherit Torr after his death (went to JOHN, the son of DAVID).

10.994. **MARGARET LEITCH**.

10.995. **JOHN HALTHORNE**. Of Cairnfield, Scotland.

11.1281. **FRANCIS HOLMES**. See 11.1365.

11.1283. **JOHN WATERBURY** [anglicized from **JOHANNES VON WASSERBERG**] (1615 - 31 Jul 1658). From Pfalz, Germany. (“Waterbury” is the English translation of “Wasserberg” and is not a traditional English name.) Sold his property in Neufeld, Germany to his father-in-law in 1636 and moved to England. Naturalized in London, England, 23 Feb 1637. Lived in Saint James, Clerkenwell Parish, London. Came on the “Arabella” with parents. Moved to Wethersfield, CT in 1646 and to Stamford, CT, by 1650. (His brother Michael back in Germany wrote in 1653 that he did not know where JOHN was and “it is not known if he is still alive.”) A leading citizen and one of the largest land owners in Stamford. In colonial legislature. A magistrate at Stamford, 1657-58.

11.1284. **ROSE PURCELL** [**PERSELL**] (ca. 1618 - 12 Feb 1684). Naturalized in London, England, 23 Feb 1637. Married secondly Joseph Garnsey on 11 Jul 1659 in Stamford.

11.1285. **JONATHAN HOBBY** (b. ca. 1606).

11.1287. **JOHN GRAY** [**GREY**] (ca. 1610 - bef. 25 Feb 1663). Born in St. Mary’s, Norfolk. Was in Lynn, MA, by 1639. Married before 11 May 1639. Moved to Fairfield in New Haven Colony by 1639. Moved to Newtown, L.I., perhaps in 1649. Died there.

11.1288. **ELIZABETH FROST** (bapt. 24 Nov 1614 - bef. 12 May 1682). Baptized in St. Peter’s Church in Nottingham. Married first John Watson, then JOHN, then John Ramsden of Newtown, L.I. Died there.

11.1289. **JONATHAN REYNOLDS** [**RENOLS, RENOLDS**] (ca. 1636 - Jan 1673/4). Born probably in Wethersfield, CT. One of the first settlers of Greenwich, CT, around 1653. The “Two Brothers Brook” there named for JONATHAN and his brother John who had farms on it. Estate inventoried, 23 Jan 1673/4.

11.1290. **REBECCA**. Born in England. (Not Rebecca Heusted.)

11.1313. **JEFFREY FERRIS** (ca. 1610 - 31 May 1666). From Leicestershire, England. Admitted a Freeman in Watertown, MA, 6 May 1635. One of the original settlers of



Wethersfield, CT, Stamford, and then Greenwich (bought 4 acres from the Indian chief Keofferam). In Wethersfield, fined for corn destroyed by cattle due to a defective fence. Left with group to form Stamford after a controversy in the church. Of the purchasers of the land from the Indians made into Old Greenwich (Horse Neck), CT. (The Dutch claimed the land — all land west of the Connecticut River — originally and there was a dispute with the New Haven Colony and Hartford over it. The settlers first sided with the Dutch. In 1650 the Dutch ceded all lands in Connecticut to New Haven. New Haven asserted control over Greenwich after reported that its inhabitants lived in a disorderly and riotous manner, selling alcohol to the Indians, harboring servants who had fled their masters, and performing unlawful marriages.) Also one of the Stamford families to start a settlement in Westchester County, NY (now Eastchester) but was arrested by the Dutch and taken to Manhattan and deprived of their guns; had to affirm the Dutch government of Eastchester. Went back to Greenwich by 1658. Died there. Will dated 6 Jan 1664; probated 9 Mar 1666/7. Estate inventory taken Nov 23, 24 26, and 29 1666. Total value: £493. Family legend has it that his wife and the mother of his children was Ann Milton, sister of the poet John Milton. Married secondly Susannah St. John Lockwood, widow of ROBERT; married thirdly Judith Feake, widow of William Palmer.

11.1314. **ANNE HOWARD** (ca. 1614 - 31 Jul 1658). Born in Greenwich, Kent. Died in Stamford, CT.

11.1315. **THOMAS MERRITT** (bef. 1630 - 1662). Of Wethersfield, CT. Born either in Wethersfield or England. Estate inventory, 16 Oct 1662; in that one page document his name is spelled MERRITT, MERRIT, MARRAT, and MARRETT.

11.1316. **MARY**. Remarried quickly to Richard Vowles after death of THOMAS and moved to Rye, NY.

11.1321. **ROBERT LOCKWOOD** (14 Jan 1600/1 [bapt. 18 Jan 1600/1] - 11 Sep 1658). Came from England, to Watertown, MA, 1630, on the “Mary and John.” Married there in 1634. Admitted a Freeman there on 9 Mar 1636/7. Settled in Fairfield, CT, in 1641. Admitted a Freeman of Connecticut, 20 May 1652. Sergeant of Fairfield militia in 1657. Died in Fairfield, CT. Estate inventoried, 11 Sep 1658.

11.1322. **SUSANNAH NORMAN** (ca. 1608 - 23 Dec 1660). May not have been mother of ROBERT’s children. Married secondly JEFFREY FERRIS.

11.1323. **LORD THOMAS MILLINGTON**. Had no sons; so title did not remain in his branch of the family.

11.1324. **ANNE RUSSELL**.

11.1329. **LIEUT. JONATHAN LOCKWOOD** (10 Sep 1634 - 12 May 1688). Born in Watertown, MA. Lived in Stamford, CT, until 1665 before moving to Greenwich. Signed an oath of allegiance to the Dutch governor on 1 Jan 1657. Freeman, 1670. Assistant (of something), 1671. Listed as one of 27 proprietors (along with his brother GERSHOM), 1672. Representative to the colonial General Assembly, 1671, 1673-4, 1676, 1681, 1683. A prominent citizen. When he died in Greenwich, the people in a town meeting passed a resolution deploring the loss of so valuable a citizen.

11.1330. **MARY [MARAH] FERRIS**.

11.1337. **THE REV. MR. THOMAS HANFORD** (22 Jul 1621 - prob. Dec 1693). Born in London. Immigrated by 1643, settling in Scituate, MA. Cotton Mather describes him as one of the “young scholars” who began their education for the ministry in England but completed it in America. It is believed he completed his education with the Rev. Charles Chauncey, who later became the second President of Harvard College. Made a Freeman of Massachusetts in 1650. In 1651-2, he became a school teacher in New Haven, CT, teaching reading, writing, and Latin, for 20 pounds a year plus room and board. Was of poor health. Became a minister in Norwalk, CT, in the summer of 1652. Had a 4 acre lot. Ordained, 1654. Became a Freeman on 18 May 1654. Paid 30 pounds a year, mostly in wheat, barley, and peas. Married first Hanna Newberry. Married MARY on 22 Oct 1661 in Norwalk, CT. Granted 200 acres of land by the General Court in Hartford. Held in high regard by the Indians; received land from them. Well respected in Norwalk. Remained a minister there until near his death. Estate inventory issued on 13 Mar 1693/4. Believed that his grave is marked by a brown tombstone (words now obliterated) in East Norwalk burying ground.

11.1338. **MARY MILES** (d. 12 Sep 1730). Widow of Jonathan Ince. (Said to have been 100 years old at death, but that may just indicate that she was really old.)

11.1339. **GERSHOM LOCKWOOD, SR.** (b. 6 Sep 1643). See 10.661.

11.1340. **LADY ANN MILLINGTON.** See 10.662.

11.1341. **MATTHIAS [MATHIAS] ST. JOHN** (1630 - 12 Dec 1728/9). Born in Dorchester, MA. Lived in Norwalk, CT. A selectman; fence viewer.

11.1342. **ELIZABETH** (b. 1634).

11.1343. **CHRISTOPHER COMSTOCK** (7 Oct 1635 - 28 Dec 1702). See 11.1731.

11.1344. **HANNAH PLATT** (bapt. 1 Oct 1643 - aft. 28 Dec 1702). See 11.1732.

11.1345. **SAMUEL HOLLY** (ca. 1586 - Oct/Dec 1643). Born in Cambridge, England and died in Cambridge, MA. Will dated 22 Oct 1643; recorded 5 Dec 1643.

11.1346. **ELIZABETH [ELSPETH]** (ca. 1590 - 1651). Married secondly John Kendall. As Elspeth Holly Kendall, she was executed for witchcraft in Boston (for bewitching a child to death); based on testimony of the nurse who had kept the baby outside in the cold for a long time the night before its death. Here is the account of her witchcraft case from John Hale’s “A Modest Enquiry” (1702):

Another suffering in this kind was a woman of Cambridge, against whom a principal was a Watertown nurse, who testified, that the said Kendall (so was the accused called) did bewitch to death a child of Goodman Genings [Jennings] of Watertown; for the said Kendall did make much of the child, and then the child was well, but quickly changed its color and died in a few hours after. The court took this evidence among others, the said Genings not knowing of it. But after Kendall was executed ([Mrs. Lake and Mary Johnson] also denied her guilt to the death), Mr. Richard Brown [a deputy to the General Court from Watertown] knowing and hoping better things of Kendall, asked said Genings if they suspected her to bewitch their child, they answered no. But they judged the true cause of the child’s death to be thus, viz. the nurse had the night before carried out the child and kept it abroad in the cold a long time, when the red gum was come out upon it, and the cold had struck in the red gum, and this they judged the cause of the child’s death. And that said Kendall did come in that

day and make much of the child, but they apprehended no wrong to come to the child by her. After this the said nurse was put into prison for adultery, and there delivered of her base child, and Mr. Brown went to her and told her, It was just with God to leave her to this wickedness, as a punishment for her murdering Goody Kendall by her false witness bearing. But the nurse died in prison, and so the matter was not farther inquired into.

11.1349. **THOMAS CALVIN NEWMAN** (ca. 1584 - 2 Jun 1659). Born in England. Married MARY on 28 Sep 1607 at St. Saviour's Parish, Southwark. Sailed on the "Mary and John" from Southampton to New England on 24 Mar 1633/4. Settled first in Ipswich, MA. Was in Westchester, NY, for a time. Living in Stamford, CT, by 1642. Will dated 2 Jun 1659 and probated 27 Feb 1660..

11.1350. **MARY MORTON [MOORTON or MOORTEN]**.

11.1361. **JEREMIAH [JEREMY] JAGGER** (d. 14 Aug 1658). May have come to America on the "Arabella" in Gov. John Winthrop's fleet, 1630. Settled in Watertown, MA. Moved to Wetherfield, CT, in 1636. Fought in the 1637 expedition against the Pequots; received land for service. One of the 30 original proprietors of Stamford, CT, 1641. He, WILLIAM NEWMAN, and RICHARD WEBB all disliked the rule of New Haven and paying taxes without representation. Had to pay fine (£20) for his disobedience. Master of a trading vessel that traded up and down New England and the British West Indies. Moved to the West Indies in 1654 (probably Barbados) and died there. Estate inventory (£472) was taken 11 Dec 1658 by RICHARD LAW and FRANCIS BELL. (The name "Jagger" is of Dutch origin and means one who works with draught horses for hire or teamster; it is related to our word "jockey" and the name "Jack.")

11.1362. **ELIZABETH**. Married secondly Robert Usher.

11.1363. **WILLIAM CROSS** (d. 7 Sep 1655). Born in London or Gent, Belgium. Was an early resident of Windsor, CT. Moved to Wethersfield, CT, 1644. Served in the Pequot War from Wethersfield. Died in Windham, CT. Their children moved to Stamford after his death.

11.1364. **MARGARET OKES [OAKES]**. Sister of Robert Okes. Married secondly ROBERT BATES, 11.1393.

11.1365. **FRANCIS HOLMES** (d. bef. 3 Mar 1675/6). Probably from Beverly, York, England. Arrived in Massachusetts around 1636. A blacksmith. Removed to Stamford, CT, by 1648. Fined 10 shillings for being drunk. Married secondly Ann, widow of Thomas Stevens. A fence viewer for the town, 1667, 1673. Will dated 6 Sep 1671; probated 14 Mar 1675/6. Estate inventoried in Stamford on 24 Jan 1675/6.

11.1377. **WILLIAM BISHOP, ESQ.** (13 May 1570 -28 Aug 1638). Of Holway, Dorset.

11.1378. **ALICE DUNNING** (ca. 1570 - 15 Aug 1638). Died in Cattistock, Devonshire.

11.1379. **MR. STEPHEN GOODYEAR** (26 Nov 1598 - 27 May 1657). A major figure in early New Haven. From London. Baptized at St. Gregory's, London. The Merchant Tailor Guild records show he was apprenticed to a tailor in London for seven years, 1614-21. An original proprietor and Freeman of New Haven, CT. Deputy, 1641; one of two magistrates, 1641-42. Member of an advisory committee to consult with the New Haven commissioners of the United

Colonies of New England (united against the Dutch and the Indians), 1643. Deputy Governor of New Haven Colony, 1643 until his death. Wrote letter to Southold, L.I., to sooth their ire over being taxed by the New Haven Colony. Commissioner for the United Colonies, 1645-47 and 1650-51. Town auditor, 1645. Member of committee for settling Delaware Bay, 1651. A merchant and ship-owner. Permitted to brew beer, 1646. Started up an iron works at Stony River. In 1641, he bought Shelter Island and sold it in 1651 for 1600 pounds of sugar. Continued to own property in England. His commercial interests required frequent trips to Barbados, Delaware Bay, New Amsterdam (had business dealings with Peter Stuyvesant), and back to London. Married secondly MARGARET LEWEN LAMBERTON, 12.3476, and had three more children. Died on trip in London. Estate inventoried on 15 Oct 1658, with as estate worth £804 plus the interest in the iron works if £300.

11.1380. **MARY [LEWEN?]** (d. 27 May 1646). Family tradition has it that she was a woman of large estates in London, including Grosvenor Square. Lost at sea on the “Phantom Ship.”

11.1381. **ALEXANDER KNOWLES** (d. Dec 1663). Made a Freeman of Massachusetts, 7 Dec 1636. On commission to form a legal code for Massachusetts, 1645. Moved to Fairfield, Fairfield, CT, and purchased a house there, 1653. Became prominent in public affairs. Elected an assistant judge of the General Court of Connecticut, 1658. Had will.

11.1383. **JOHN CABLE [CABELL]** (d. 1682). Probably from Essex, England. Came with John Winthrop’s fleet in 1630. Resided first in Roxbury. Settled in Springfield, MA, 1636 with WILLIAM PYNCHON; moved to Fairfield, CT, 1641. A sawyer and a seaman (perhaps a captain); assisted in capture of a Dutch vessel off Fairfield in 1652. Admitted a Freeman in 1669. Married secondly Ann, widow of Roger Betts. Died in Fairfield. Will dated 4 Apr 1682/3 and probated 21 Sep 1682. Ann refused appointment as executrix and requested that Jehu and John Burr be appointed.

11.1384. **SARAH [BURR?]**. JOHN is somehow related to Jehu Burr. SARAH may have been part of his family or Jehu’s wife may have been part of JOHN’s.

11.1389. **DAVID SELLECK** (d. 1654). Perhaps from Bristol, England. Arrived in Dorchester, MA, Jul 1633. Moved to Boston, 1641. Admitted a Freeman, 18 May 1642. A “soap boiler.” Also traded along the coast (may have owned a ship or been a speculator). Died in Virginia.

11.1390. **SUSANNAH KIBBY**. Admitted to the First Church of Boston, 25 Jan 1643/4.

11.1391. **RICHARD LAW** (1610 - 1686). A King’s Attorney in England. “The first gentleman of the Colony.” (Prior to 1635, most immigrants were not gentry, although even on the “Mayflower,” some were.) Sailed from London to New England in 1635. Settled first in Watertown, Mass; Wethersfield, CT, 1638; Stamford, 1640 (one of the early settlers). Married MARGARET in Wethersfield. One of two men authorized to traded with Indians for beavers.

11.1392. **MARGARET KILBOURN[E]** (23 Sep 1607 - 10 Jan 1689). Born in Wood Ditton, Cambridge, England. Sailed to Plymouth on the “Increase” with parents, 1635. Died in Wethersfield, CT.

11.1393. **ROBERT BATES** (d. 11 Jan 1675). Came from England with one of Sir Richard Saltonstall's colonies in 1630. Settled first in Watertown, MA. One of the original settlers of Wethersfield, CT, in 1636. Then one of the original settlers of Stamford, CT. Will probated 1 Nov 1675. Married secondly, MARGARET, widow of WILLIAM CROSS. Married thirdly Susanna, widow of SIMON HOYT, 12.2817.

11.1395. **WILLIAM CROSS**. See 11.1363.

11.1396. **MARGARET OKES**. See 11.1364.

11.1401. **JEFFREY FERRIS**. Same as 11.1313.

11.1402. **ANNE HOWARD**. Same as 11.1314.

11.1403. **JOHN REYNOLDS [RUNALLS]**. Married in Ipswich, England. At least SARAH came to America on the "Elizabeth," 1634; he may have preceded her. Freeman of Watertown, MA, 6 May 1635. Chosen to divide the common land. Removed to Wethersfield, CT, 1636. Successful landowner and farmer. His earmark for cattle was recorded in 1641. A founder of Stamford, CT, on the Long Island Sound in 1641 (part of a group of 30 dissidents from Wethersfield following the more liberal Rev. Denton).

11.1404. **SARAH [CHESTERFIELD?]** (ca. 1614 - 21 Aug 1657). Of Stamford, CT.

11.1405. **FRANCIS BELL** (1614 - 8 Jan 1689/90). Early resident of Wethersfield, CT. A founder of Stamford, 1641. (Stamford was founded by a group of men from Wethersfield who bought land from the New Haven Colony in Oct 1640 and moved there in May 1641). A prominent citizen. Lieutenant in the train band there May 1655. Deputy to New Haven Colonial Legislature, 1653-59, 1661-69. Magistrate, 1652, 1654-56, 1658-63. Will dated 24 May 1688; probated 11 Mar 1689/90. Died in Stamford. Cotton Mather said of him: "A firm Puritan in form and principles."

11.1406. **REBECCA** (d. 17 May 1684). Died in Stamford.

11.1407. **THE REV. MR. ABRAHAM PIERSON** (bapt. 22 Sept 1611 - 9 Aug 1678). A rigid Puritan. From Yorkshire. Baptized in Guiseley, Yorkshire. Graduate of Trinity College, Cambridge, 1632. (His son was the first president of Yale.) Ordained an Episcopalian minister in England. Sailed to America for religious reasons, 1639. Settled in Lynn, MA. Ordained a Congregationalist minister in Boston. Moved to Southampton, L.I., 1640. Established the first church there (was Congregationalist; then Presbyterian). Very rigid in his religious beliefs. Also wanted civil and ecclesiastical power to be vested in the church. His views divided the church. So he and part of his congregation moved across Long Island Sound and founded Branford, CT, in 1647. Interested in local Indians; learned their language and prepared a catechism in their language. The New Haven colony (consisting of Branford, Guilford, Milford, New Haven, Stamford, and Southold on Long Island) was the most theocratic of the colonies, and when it merged in 1664 with the more liberal Connecticut colony, ABRAHAM objected. He and about 65 families from Branford and two other towns then went to New Jersey, purchased land from the Indians, and formed the town of Newark. Died there. Will dated 10 Aug 1671 and probated on 12 Mar 1678/9. Gov. Winthrop said of him: "he was a Godly learned man." Cotton Mather said: "wherever he came he shone."

11.1408. **ABIGAIL MITCHELL** (b. 26 Apr 1618). May have moved to New Hampshire after ABRAHAM's death.

11.1409. **NICHOLAS HOYT** (10 Nov 1622 - 7 Jul 1655). Born in Upway, Dorset. His American descendants spelled the family name "Haight." Married on 12 Jun 1646 in Windsor, CT. Died in Windsor three days after SUSANNA.

11.1410. **SUSANNA** (ca. 1626 - 4 Jul 1655). Widow of William Joyce. Died in Windsor.

11.1411. **WILLIAM NOBEL** (b. ca. 1625).

11.1412. **ANN [HAIGHT or HOYT?]**.

11.1413. **ROBERT FIELD** (d. bef. 6 Feb 1672/3). Married on 23 Nov 1624 in Halifax, Yorkshire to Ruth Fairebanke. Married secondly ELIZABETH at Bradford on 18 May 1630. Emigrated from England about 1630 to Watertown with neighbors and relatives. In Newport, RI, in 1638. Admitted a Freeman there, 16 Mar 1641. An original settler of Flushing, Queens, L.I. Named in original patent, 10 Oct 1645. Had residence near the Long Island Sound.

11.1414. **ELIZABETH TAYLOR**.

11.1417. **JOSEPH SUTTON** (d. ca. 1695). From Lincolnshire. Settled in Massachusetts. Moved to Southampton, L.I. In 1663, sold his land there and moved to Oyster Bay and then Hempstead, L.I. Town clerk, 1667-71.

11.1421. **CAPT. JAMES SANDYS** (1622 - 13 Mar 1695 at age 73). Born in Reading, Berkshire. Landed in Plymouth, MA. Followed Ann Hutchinson when she was exiled from the Massachusetts Bay Colony. A lifelong friend of Roger Williams. Moved to East Chester, Westchester Co., NY, where he was building a house for Ann Hutchinson until Indians told him to stop (she and her family were killed there by Indians the next year). In Portsmouth, R.I., by 1643. Married there in 1645. Freeman, 1655. Commissioner to R.I. General Court, 1657. Moved to Block Island, 1660 (he and 15 others bought the island from the Maniesses Indians — he owned 1/16th of the island). He built the only stone house on the island; it served as a garrison and hospital in the attacks by pirates and Indians. Constable, 1663. Commanded the town militia in the King Philip's War. Deputy to General Assembly, 1665. Tax rater, 1670-1. Assistant Warden, 1676.

11.1422. **DR. SARAH WALKER** (1631 - 1709). Born in Portsmouth, R.I. Was the only doctor and midwife on Block Island at the time. Skilled in surgery and medicine. Emancipated the family's slaves after JAMES's death. Will dated 17 Oct 1703. "A gentlewoman of remarkable sobriety and piety, given also to hospitality."

11.1423. **JOHN CORNELL** (6 Jun 1634 - 1704). From Saffron Walden, Essex. Married in 1669 in Dartmouth, MA. Was in Cow Neck, L.I. by 1675. His house was destroyed by some people from Hempstead who claims a right to his land; the people were shown not to have any such right and ended up being fined and imprisoned. Accumulated hundreds of acres. Justice of the Peace, 1689. Buried with MARY on their property.

11.1424. **MARY RUSSEL(L)** (b. 1645). Born in Marshfield, MA.

11.1493. **JOHN ROCKWELL** (5 Jul 1588 - 1662). From Somersetshire, England. Died in Connecticut. Married WILMOT on 22 Feb 1619.

11.1494. **WILMOT [WILMETH] CADE** (ca. 1588 - 1662). Died in Windsor, CT.

11.1495. **JONAS WEEDE** (1610 - 1676). A Puritan from Stanwick, Northamptonshire (60 miles northwest of London). Sailed to Salem Town, MA, in Jun 1630 on the "Arabella," the flagship of John Winthrop's fleet of 4 ships (more came in the following years; Winthrop was governor of the Massachusetts Bay Company and moved on to Connecticut). (Daily religious services on the ship.) Disembarked later in Charlestown, MA. Freeman, 18 May 1631. Married about 1636. A founder of Watertown, MA. (By 1634, there were 4,000 English settlers in the Boston area in 20 towns.) In 1635, became a founder of Wethersfield, CT, the first settlement by Europeans in CT. A founder of the church in Wethersfield. Fought the Pyquang ("Pequot") Indians. From court records: accused someone's Indian slave of stealing wine from his house; the slave's owner said it was JONAS' daughter ELIZABETH who drank the wine; the court believed JONAS and sentenced the Indian to a public whipping. Later moved to Stamford, CT. Died there. Will dated 26 Nov 1672; inventory taken on 5 Jun 1676; will probated 7 Nov 1676.

11.1496. **MARY HOYT or SCOFIELD** (1616 - 10 Mar 1689/90). Born in Stanwick, England and died in Stamford, CT.

11.1497. **MATTHIAS ST. JOHN [SENSION or SENTION or SENCHON]** (1604 - 10 or 19 Oct 1669). Born in England. (Probably the son of either Richard or Oliver St. John of London.) Living in Dorchester, MA, by 1631-32. Admitted a Freeman, 3 Sep 1634. Moved to Windsor, CT, by 1640. Settled in Wethersfield, CT, around 1640 (bought house of JONAS WEED when he moved to Stamford). Grand Jury, 1643, 1644. Living in Norwalk, CT, by 1654. Juryman, 1650-51, 1653. In court for debt two times; plaintiff in defamation suit. Brought before a court in Hartford in 1654 because he "sold syder to Indians by which they was drunke." Moved to Norwalk in 1654. Died there. Will dated 19 Oct 1669 (RALPH KEELER was a witness); estate inventoried on 31 Jan 1669/70.

11.1498. **SARAH**. Died in Norwalk, CT.

11.1499. **TIMOTHY STANLEY** (22 Jan 1604 - 20 Jun 1663). Born in Ashford, Kent. Died in Hartford, CT.

11.1500. **ELIZABETH MORRICE** (d. 22 Feb 1679). Died in Hartford, CT.

11.1501. **JOHN BETT[E]S** (bapt. 23 Sep 1576 - 8 Aug 1620). Born in Bearsted, Kent and died in West Peckham, Kent. Married on 26 Dec 1600. Will dated 24 Jan 1619/20; probated 20 Aug 1620.

11.1502. **MARY [MARIE] [BIGGE?]**. Of West Peckham, Kent. Almost certainly the younger sister of John Bigge of Cranbrook, Kent. (The Betts and Bigge families of this area intermarried a lot.) Married secondly John Bridger of West Peckham.

11.1503. **GEORGE RAYMOND** (d. 1632). Of St. Clement's, Ipswich, Kent. Married there on 26 Nov 1604.

11.1504. **MARY SHELL**. Of Ipswich.

11.1537. **ARTHUR POST** (bapt. 26 Aug 1580). Born in Oudenarde, Holland. Dropped “van der” from name and spelled last name like his great-grandfather. Married in Maidstone, Kent, 2 Feb 1614.

11.1538. **BENNET LAMBE.**

11.1545. **ROBERT HALSEY alias CHAMBERS** (ca. 1552 - bur. 18 Apr 1610). A yeoman of Holtsmere End, Flamstead, Hertfordshire. Married in 1577. Buried in Flamstead,

11.1546. **ELLEN ALE [ALLEY] alias COOKE.**

11.1547. **JOHN WHEELER, JR.** (d. 2 Dec 1643 or 25 Dec 1632). Of Cranfield, Bedfordshire. Will dated 18 Jan 1642/3; probated 22 Jan 1643/4.

11.1548. **ELIZABETH.**

11.1549. **WILLIAM BARNES** (1580 - 1657). Of Eastwich, Norfolk.

11.1550. **THOMASINE SHEPHERD.**

11.1569. **WILLIAM HUNTTINGE** (1558 - 1638). Died at Hoxne, Suffolk. Married at Topcraft, Norfolk, about 1599.

11.1570. **MARGARET RANDOLFE.**

11.1571. **JOHN SEABORNE.**

11.1572. **MARY.**

11.1573. **THOMAS PAYNE** (11 Dec 1586 - 1639 or 1640). Born in Wrenton or Cooklie, Suffolk, England. According to a family record of births, marriages and deaths, “was borne into this worlde upon sonday beinge the xi day of December, 1586, betwyne the howers of v and vi of the clok in the afternoone.” Married on 22 Nov 1610. Arrived in Salem Town, MA, in August 1637. Sailed from Yarmouth, England, about 10 May 1637 on his own ship, the “Mary Anne,” with ELIZABETH, their three children, and friends. Will dated 10 Apr 1638.

11.1574. **ELIZABETH [TUTHILL?].**

11.1577. **RICHARD GREENE** (b. ca. 1577). Of Bowridge Hill, Gillingham, Dorset.

11.1578. **MARY HOOKER.**

11.1597. **NICHOLAS BUTLER** (ca. 1595 - 13 Aug 1671). Born and married (on 22 Jan 1624/5) in Ashford, Kent. Immigrated to Dorchester, MA, in 1636 from Eastwell, Kent, with three children and five servants (JOYCE came later). Moved to Edgartown, Martha’s Vineyard, MA, in the 1650s. Magistrate and assistant to the Chief Magistrate. A gentleman (“Mr.”). Occassionally fined (e.g., for missing a town meeting) and in some minor litigation over debts. Owned much land, beginning with a 20 acres homestead near Swimming Place Point. Will made the day before he died and signed only with a mark. Died in Edgartown.

11.1598. **JOYCE BAKER** (30 May 1602 - 20 Oct 1680). From Ashford, Kent. In his will, NICHOLAS refers to “her children and my children,” suggesting that she was a widow with children before he married her and that he may have had children by a previous wife (although



wills of that time never said “our children”). Died between 13 Mar (date of will) and Oct 28 1680 (date of estate inventory).

11.1599. **DEACON THOMAS LYNDE** (3-5 Nov 1595 - 30 Dec 1671). Born in Dunstable, Bedfordshire. Died in Massachusetts.

11.1600. **MARGARET MARTIN.**

11.1633. **JOHN CONKLYNE** (ca. 1598 - 24 Feb 1683/4). From Nottinghamshire, England. Married in St. Peter’s, Nottingham, 24 Jan 1624/5. Sailed to Salem Town, MA, in the 1630s after his brother ANANIAS (12.3325). He and his brother were glass-makers; made the first glass windows and bottles in New England. Freeman, 18 May 1642. He and ANANIAS left for Long Island in the spring of 1650. JOHN’s family settled first in Southold in Apr 1650. Freeman of Connecticut, 9 Oct 1662. Thrifty; prospered and became a leading citizen. Moved to Huntington, L.I., about 1660, where he died. Still held land in Southold; also held land in Monmouth County, New Jersey. Third wealthiest man in Southold by 1675 (behind BARNABAS HORTON and WILLIAM HALLOCK), but did not take a leading role in the public life there or in Huntington. Will probated 20 Mar 1683/4.

11.1634. **ELIZABETH ALLSEABROOKE.** From Nottinghamshire, England.

11.1635. **BARNABAS HORTON** (1600 - 13 Jul 1680). A founder and leading citizen of Southold, L.I. (PETER/WILLIAM HALLOCK and JOHN CONKLIN were also among the founders of Southold.) A baker from Mowsley, Leicestershire. From a yeoman family from 1200s. He and two brothers sailed to Hampton, MA (now New Hampshire), in the 1630s. Moved to New Haven with his family about 1638. (The New Haven Plantation was a theocracy, with the Bible as the source of civil and religious law.) Had married first Anne Smith; married MARY by 1640. In the autumn of 1640, his family moved to Southold, L.I. (Southold was part of New Haven Plantation until 1662 and part of Connecticut until 1674.) Eventually owned more than 125 acres. An organizer of the Congregational Church there, 21 Oct 1640. Built the first frame house on Eastern Long Island. Described as a strong man of large stature, with a ruddy complexion, genial, and “a man of force and character who impressed his personality on the community in which he lived.” Deputy to the General Court of New Haven, 1654-61. Appointed by the General Court to be one of two Constables (at the time a high judicial position), 1654-59. As a Constable, took depositions concerning a Quaker; based on the depositions, had the man whipped and had him pay a 50 pound bond for his good behavior. Appointed receiver of the customs and excise taxes on wine and spirits for Southold, 1658-59. Preferred New Haven to Connecticut, but made a Freeman of Connecticut, 1662. Appointed one of two Commissioners for Southold by General Assembly in Hartford, 1663-64. Magistrate from 1664 until his death. The Overseers of Southold, of which BARNABAS was one, received the patent granted by Governor Andros when Southold became part of New York, 1676; rent was “one fatt lamb” to the Duke of York a year. One of the wealthiest men of Southold. A resolute Puritan. (New Haven was the strictest of the Puritan plantations.) Will dated 10 May 1680. Buried in Southold; his massive blue marble tombstone (which he brought with him from England) still standing. Wrote his own epitaph:

Here sleeps my body toombd in the dust  
The Christ shall come and raise it with the just,  
My soul ascended to the throne of God.

Where with sweet Jesus now I make aboard.  
Then hasten after it my dearest wife  
To be partaker of this blessed life,  
And you dear children, all follow the Lord,  
Hear and obey his public sacred word,  
And in your homes call upon his name,  
For oft I have advised you to the same.  
Then God will bless you with your children all,  
& to this blessed place he will you call.

Hebrews II & ye 4.

HE being dead yet speaketh.

11.1636. **MARY LANGTON [LANDON]**. Born in England.

11.1637. **THOMAS SCUDDER** (d. 1657-8). From Horton Kirby, Kent. Married in Groton, Sussex. Sailed with ELIZABETH and their five children to Salem Town, MA, in 1635, as part of the Puritan migration led by John Winthrop lasting from 1629-40. Died in Salem, MA. Will dated 30 Sep 1657 and probated 29 Jun 1658. (Prior to the founding of Salem, less than 500 English people had arrived to settle in New England; the founding of Salem as a Puritan colony marked the beginning of the major English influx into the New World, as Charles I drove around 20,000 Puritans out of England.) His younger brother Henry was a distinguished Presbyterian minister who was a member of the Westminster Assembly of Divines which revised the 39 Articles of the Church of England and harmonized them with the Church of Scotland.

11.1638. **ELIZABETH** (d. 9 Sep 1665). From Groton, Sussex. Died in Salem, MA.

11.1639. **WILLIAM LUDLAM [LEADHAM]** (d. 1665). From Matlock, Devonshire. In Southampton, L.I., by 1653. The town miller. Had 36 acres at the head of mill pond. Juryman, 30 Apr 1660. Died in Southampton. Will dated 27 Apr 1665; probated 5 Oct 1665.

11.1640. **CLEMENCE FORDHAM** (d. 26 Aug 1647). Born in Sacomb, Hertfordshire. Died in Matlock, Devonshire.

11.1641. **THOMAS MOORE** (ca. 1616 - 25-27 Jun 1691). Born in Southwold, England; came to Salem Town, MA with parents. (That is Salem Town, not Salem Village where the witch trials were.) May have been a shipwright (the head of a often-repaired carpenter's adze was preserved as family heirloom); was occasionally a ship master. Married MARTHA 17 Feb 1635/6. Was admitted a Freeman of Massachusetts in Salem, 22 Dec 1642. Important landowner in Southold, L.I. Came to Southold in 1651. According to tradition, he dissented from a harsh law against Quakers in Massachusetts. (Many Puritans who left Massachusetts became Quakers.) Was a Constable, along with BARNABAS HORTON, in Southold and in 1658 was elected a Deputy to the New Haven General Court. Married secondly Katherine Westcote. In 1673, he was named by Dutch officers to be Magistrate but declined; but in 1685, when Southold was under English rule, he became a Magistrate to try cases under 40 shillings. In 1683, he was an Overseer and on the committee to nominate members of the first assembly of New York colony. Died in Southold. Will dated 25 Jun 1691 and probated 30 Sep 1691.

11.1642. **MARTHA YOUNGS** (bapt. 1 Jul 1613 - 27 Jun 1671). Born in Southwold, Suffolk, England. Died in Southold, L.I.

- 11.1643. **JAMES HAMPTON.** Of Salem, MA.
- 11.1644. **JANE.**
- 11.1645. **BARNABAS HORTON.** See 11.1635.
- 11.1646. **MARY LANGTON.** See 11.1636.
- 11.1647. **WILLIAM PETER HALLOCK [HOLYOAKE/HALLIOCK]** (ca. 1610 - 29 Sep 1684). Married in Southold, L.I., 1640. Will dated 10 Feb 1682 and probated 21 Oct 1684; divided his land among his four sons. His will expresses sorrow that his son John had married into and joined the Society of Friends (which did not recognize the existing civil or religious authority): a proviso provided that if any of his sons “shall apostatize from the Protestant doctrine and faith” or willfully and of set purpose contemn and neglect the public worship of God suitable thereto,” then what is willed to him would pass to the “next lawful heir that shall steadfastly profess and own the said doctrine and faith” (i.e., he disinherited John).
- 11.1648. **MARGARET HOWELL** (1620 - 1707). Died in West Mattituck, L.I.
- 11.1649. **CHARLES GLOVER** (ca. 1615 - Jan 1664/5). From Boston, Lincolnshire. Sailed to America and settled first in Salem, Town MA, 1632. After ELIZABETH died in 1647, remarried and quickly divorced his second wife; married thirdly, Elizabeth Sauders in 1650. Moved soon after to Southold, L.I. A tract of land at Hallock’s Neck was granted to him to be used as a shipyard. Also had a large farm at Eagle Neck.
- 11.1650. **ELIZABETH** (ca. 1619 - 6 Mar 1646/7). Died in Salem, MA.
- 11.1651. **THOMAS MOORE.** Same as 11.1641.
- 11.1652. **MARTHA YOUNGES.** Same as 11.1642.
- 11.1657. **THOMAS DIBBLE** (1613 - 17 Oct 1700). Born in Weymouth, England. Admitted a Freeman in Dorchester, MA, 1637. A court record of his giving to the poor. Married secondly Elizabeth, widow of two men. Died in Windsor, CT. Will dated 17 Feb 1699/1700.
- 11.1658. **MARY [or MIRIAM or FRANCES]** (d. 14 May 1681). May be a daughter of Thomas Ford. Died in Windsor, CT.
- 11.1661. **WILLIAM MULFORD [MURFORD]** (ca. 1620 - Mar 1687). Arrived in Salem Town, MA, by 1639. Was a whaler. He and his brother John went to Southampton, L.I., in 1643 by way of Connecticut. John was one of the 9 original settlers of East Hampton, L.I., 1649; WILLIAM soon followed him. (The land as far east as Montauk was bought from the Montaukett Indians for 38 pounds.) A farmer there. Died in East Hampton.
- 11.1662. **SARAH AKERS** (b. 1625).
- 11.1663. **JEREMIAH CONKLIN [CONCKLYNE]** (1634 - 14 Mar 1711/2). Born in England; came to America with his parents. Named in the original Duke of York’s patent for East Hampton, L.I. Married there. One of the four founding families of Amagansett. The house he built is still standing. Died there. Prominent in town and church affairs. Town selectman for many years. Permanent grand juror, 1684. Wanted East Hampton to remain with New Haven. Wealthy. “He and his brother Benjamin set in motion the system of nepotism by rotation in civil offices that the East Hampton Conklings practiced most successfully for well over 100 years.”

“A leader among men, and a man of the highest character.” “No man stood higher in public esteem.” Brown gravestone in East Hampton graveyard.

11.1664. **MARY GARDINER** (30 Aug 1638 - 15 Jun 1727). Born in the fort at Saybrook, CT. Her father LION objected to the marriage on the grounds that the CONKLINGS were bottlers from Nottinghamshire, mere handymen and farmers without a large estate. LION gave them a house as a wedding present in East Hampton. Died in East Hampton, L.I. “She was called Granny Conkling and was a famous woman of those times and very useful, kind, and gentle.”

11.1665. **SIMON [SYMON] SACKETT** (ca. 1602 - 5-10 Oct 1635). From St. John Margate, Isle of Thanet, Kent. Married ISABEL there on 6 Aug 1627. Sailed with family to Boston with Winthrop’s Puritan company (including Roger Williams) in 1631. The rough autumn sea voyage undermined his health. One of the earliest settlers of Newe Towne (Cambridge), MA in 1635; house on Winthrop Street. ISABEL granted administration of SIMON’s estate on 3 Nov 1635 (in the same session Roger Williams was banished).

11.1666. **ISABEL PEARCE**. Moved with their sons to Hartford, CT, with Rev. Thomas Hooker’s congregation, Jun 1636. Married secondly WILLIAM BLOOMFIELD.

11.1667. **WILLIAM BLOOMFIELD**. Friends of the SACKETTS from England; settled with them in Newe Towne (Cambridge), MA. Moved to Hartford, CT, with Hooker’s company. Participated there (with the Mohegan Uncas) in a short and decisive war against the Pequots. Moved to New London. Was residing in Springfield, MA, in 1656. Moved to Middlebury, L.I., in 1657 and became a leading citizen there. Married secondly ISABEL SACKETT.

11.1668. **SARAH**. Died soon after their arrival in New England.

11.1669. **RICHARD BETTS**. Of Wortham, Suffolk, England.

11.1670. **ALICE UNK**. Of Wortham, Suffolk, England.

11.1671. **THE REV. MR. ROBERT CHAMBERLAIN** (d. 1 Jun 1639). Pastor in Strood, Kent. Married there on 30 Apr 1627. Died and buried in Strood. His first wife was named Joanna.

11.1672. **ELIZABETH STOUGHTON** (d. Mar 1647). Widow of John Scudder, son of HENRY and ELIZABETH SCUDDER, 12.3273. Went to America after her brothers. Joined John Lothrop’s church in Barnstable. Died in Ipswich, MA. Estate filed on 30 Mar 1647.

11.1673. **PHILIP KYRTLAND [KIRTLAND/KERTLAND]** (b. ca. 1585). Probably from Sherrington, Buckinghamshire. Was in Lynn, MA, by 1638. Granted 10 acres there.

11.1675. **ROBERT RAND** (d. aft. 1639). Was in Charlestown, MA by 1636 when admitted a church member there. Their house was on the west side of Windmill Hill; had 66 acres. Died in Lynn, MA.

11.1676. **ALICE [SHARP?]** (d. 5 Aug 1691). In 1658, she and their son Thomas were granted 34 or 35 acres. Was sister of Mary, wife of Capt. Richard Sprague. May be daughter of Nicholas Sharpe. According to town records, she was 87 years old at time of her death; but her gravestone says she was 97.

11.1677. **THE REV. MR. WILLIAM PRATT** (1 Jun 1562 - 1629). Of Baldock, Hertfordshire. Trained at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. (That was a hotbed of the Puritan revolution and where Rev. Thomas Hooker was trained a few years later.) Served at Stevenage, Hertfordshire from 1598 until his death in 1629.

11.1678. **ELIZABETH PRIME.**

11.1679. **JOHN CLARK[E]** (d. 5 Feb 1673). Originally from Great Mindon (about two miles from Stevenage), Hertfordshire. Immigrated to Connecticut. Served in Pequot Indian Wars. Settled in Saybrook. Died in Milford. Will dated both 17 Feb 1672 and 19 Jan 1673.

11.1680. **MARY ELIZABETH COLEY [COOLEY]** (d. 6 Feb 1678). Of Great Munden, Hertfordshire. Died in Farmington, CT.

11.1681. **HENRICK ALBRACHTSEN BUSH [BOSCH/BOS]** (12 Aug 1625 - 1703/4). Native of Maory of Bosch, an old city in the Netherlands. (Another history says he was born in Randerhuys, Denmark, and like thousands of others moved to Holland to get away from the fighting and economic trouble at the end of the 30 Years War.) Married secondly Marie Eshhysen in Leyden; married thirdly a widow, Ebbertye Dirick in New Amsterdam. Married ANNA on 4 April 1643; had 11 children. Resided for some time in Tellust, near Amsterdam. Became a master "sword cutler" (made swords) in Leyden; expanded with a partner to include armor and a fencing school. Changed spelling of name to Dutch: Hendrick. He and Marie came to New Amsterdam with their two sons from Leyden in Dec 1660 on the "Faith" (brought his brother Jan over in 1662 on the "Fox"). In New Amsterdam, anglicized the name to "BUSH." A man of affairs in New Amsterdam. A "swordcutter" there too, but also worked with this son ALBERT as a blacksmith for all sorts of ironworks. Prominent householder and merchant. A fire warden. Was a lay leader of the Lutheran community, not a Calvinist, but had trouble arranging for a Lutheran minister in New Amsterdam, and eventually joined the Dutch Reformed Church in 1671. His house was on north side of Pearl Street second lot east of Broad Street (ALBERT's was across the street) in 1665. Owned a 30 acre triangle of woodlands (planning to make a farm) north of where Columbia University now is on the Hudson River. Will dated 23 Apr 1701 (left only one shilling to each of two daughters by his second wife who suffered the loss of their mother and did not "respect him as their father nor accepted his guidance"; one also because of her "scandalous and unclean way of living").

11.1682. **ANNA MARIE REMBACH** (1621 - 30 Dec 1656). Her family was also involved in the sword cutler business. Five of her children predeceased her.

11.1683. **JULIAN [JURIAEN/JEURIAN] BLANCK.** A ship owner of New Amsterdam.

11.1697. **JOHN LYON.**

11.1698. **JOAN.**

11.1699. **WILLIAM WIGHTMAN.**

11.1700. **AUDREY DEERING.**

11.1706. **ANNE HOBSON.**

11.1707. **GEORGE ABBOT.**

- 11.1719.     **JOHN BARLOW** (1610 - 28 Mar 1674). From England. Was in Fairfield, New Haven Colony, by 1650. Freeman, May 1665. Will dated 7 Mar 1674 and probated 3 Nov 1674. Estate inventory, 9 Jun 1674; appraised at £101.
- 11.1720.     **ANNE WARD** (1604 - 25 Feb 1684/5). Of Fairfield, Fairfield, CT. Gave testimony in defamation trial of a man who accused a woman of being a witch. After another woman was hanged for being a witch, ANNE and some other women examined her body to see if she had the marks of a witch but found none. Left a will. Her estate was inventoried 25 Feb 1684/5.
- 11.1729.     **CAPT. JAMES OLMSTEAD** (17 Apr 1645 - 28 Apr 1731). Probably born in Hartford, CT. One of Norwalk's most eminent and influential citizens. Married on 1 May 1673. Commissioner of Deeds and town clerk for 29 years. Lieutenant in Norwalk's trainband, 1680; Captain, May 1691. Commissioner for Norwalk, 1690-8. On Fairfield county's Committee for Safety, 1704. Judge, 1698-1724. Deputy to colony's General Court in Hartford; selectman. On various committees related to the church (e.g., hiring a new minister). Had a seat of honor in church. Will dated 28 Apr 1731 and probated 12 Jun 1731. Died in Norwalk.
- 11.1730.     **PHEBE BARLOW** (b. ca. 1640). Of Fairfield, CT.
- 11.1731.     **CHRISTOPHER COMSTOCK** (7 Oct 1635 - 28 Dec 1702). Born in Culmstock, Devonshire. Immigrated to Fairfield and moved to Norwalk, CT. Signed affidavit on 29 May 1654 concerning Goodwife Knapp, who was charged with (and executed for) witchcraft; also on grand jury 19 Sep 1692 that indicted several people for witchcraft. Moved to Norwalk before 1633. Married on 6 Oct 1663. Part of the force that captured a Pequot fort at Mystic, killing 500 Indians (including women and children). Admitted a Freeman on 10 Oct 1667. Deputy to the General Court in Hartford in 1686, 1689, 1690. On a committee in 1694 to find a "faithful minister."
- 11.1732.     **HANNAH PLATT** (bapt. 1 Oct 1643 - aft. 28 Dec 1702). Born in Milford, CT. Baptized 10 Oct 1643 in Norwalk, CT.
- 11.1737.     **WILLIAM TROWBRIDGE** (bapt. 3 Sep 1633 - Nov 1688). Born in Taunton, Somerset, England. Married 9 Mar 1656/7 in Milford, CT. Moved to West Haven, CT, in 1667. Planter and husbandman; master of the sloop "Cocke." Admitted a Freeman on 13 May 1669. Lived on the Lambertson Farm. Owned 144 acres on the Long Island Sound near the Oyster River.
- 11.1738.     **ELIZABETH LAMBERTON** (1630s - 1716). Born in London, England. Widow of Daniel Sellivant. Died in West Haven, CT.

11.1739. **DANIEL BELDEN** (20 Nov 1648 - 14 Aug 1732). Settled in Hatfield, MA, around 1671, and then in Deerfield, MA, by 1689. Married ELIZABETH on 10 Nov 1670. Married secondly Hepzibah Welles (widow of Thomas Welles), who was killed by Indians on 29 Feb 1703/4; married thirdly Sarah, widow of Philip Mattoon. Household attacked by French and Indians again in 1709. Died in Deerfield.

11.1740. **ELIZABETH FOOTE** (1654 - 16 Sep 1696). Had fourteen children. Killed by Indians (Pequots) in Deerfield, MA, along with three of her children (Daniel, John and Thankful). DANIEL and son Nathaniel and daughter Esther were taken captive. Another son, Samuel, and daughter, Abigail, were wounded but recovered.

11.1741. **THOMAS SEYMOUR** (bapt. 15 July 1632 - 1712). Born in Sawbridgeworth, Hertfordshire. Married HANNAH in Norwalk, CT, 5 Jan 1653/4; married secondly Elizabeth. Admitted a Freeman in 1668. A deputy from Norwalk to the Connecticut General Court in 1690. Died in Norwalk between 22 Sep 1712 (date of will) and 15 Oct 1712 (date of estate inventory).

11.1742. **HANNAH MARVIN** (b. Oct 1634). Born in Essex, England. Died after 1680. Sister of SARAH MARVIN, 10.914

11.1743. **JACHIN [JACKIN] GREGORY** (ca. 1641 - 1697 or 1698). Lived in Norwalk, CT. Admitted a Freeman in 1669. Married in 1669. Moved to what is now Redding, CT, after May 1697.

11.1744. **MARY**.

11.1765. **JOSEPH PATCHIN** (ca. 1610 - aft. 10 Dec 1689 at age over 80). Born in Ashford, Kent. Came on the "Hercules" as the second servant to Thomas Besbeech in 1634. Married ELIZABETH in Roxbury, MA, on 18 Apr 1642. Moved from Roxbury to Fairfield, Fairfield Co., CT, by 1652. Granted a house lot on 29 Jan 1655. Bought and sold land. Had his debts to a Dr. Pell forgiven in Pell's 1669 will. Freeman, 16 Mar 1689/90. Married secondly Mary \_\_\_\_\_. Died in Fairfield.

11.1766. **ELIZABETH BENNETT**. From Biddenden, Kent. Came to America as a servant, with her children. Was widow of \_\_\_\_\_ Iggleden. Joined Roxbury Church on 16 Mar 1649; reference to "Goodwife Patchin, a poor [i.e., sick] old woman [i.e., over 50]" may refer to her or JOSEPH's mother.

11.1767. **WILLIAM HUBBARD** (d. 1702). Married in Saybrook, CT, 24 May 1667. Owned land in both Greenwich and Stamford, CT. Will dated 10 Oct 1702 (named son-in-law JACOB PATCHEN as executor) and probated 7 Nov 1702.

11.1768. **ABIGAIL DUDLEY**. Born in Mildford, CT.

11.1769. **EDWARD ADAMS** (1619 - 11 Nov 1671). Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

11.1770. **MARY PATCHEN [PATCHIN]** (1621 - 2 Dec 1687). Born and died in Fairfield, CT.

11.1771. **JOSEPH JAMES** (d. 1687). Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

11.1772. **MARY DICKERSON**. Died in Fairfield, Fairfield, CT.

11.1773.     **JOHN FINCH** (d. 16 Jun 1685 at age about 60). Came from England with his father and resided in Stamford, CT. By 1650, had moved to Westchester Path, Westchester Co., NY. Married HANNAH 8 Nov 1652. In 1657 was in the Dutch colony of Eastchester. His home lot, house, and cows were sold at an “outcry” at town meetings in 1657 and 1658 to pay debts. His house sold for £9, the lot for £9, and a cow for £9, 11 shillings (other cows sold for £5). Moved to Oyster Bay, L.I. by 1663. Moved to Huntington, L.I., by 1666. Was a husbandman and mariner there. In 1682, his estate was committed to the care of the constable and overseers due to his being “deprived in some measure of his intellectuals and yt he is very subject to swounding fits, and yt he is very subject to extravagant courses of drinking strong drink.” Died in Huntington.

11.1774.     **HANNAH MARSH**. Of New Haven, CT. Widow of, or married secondly, Lancelot Fuller. In 1656 returned to Stamford for medical aid for their lame child.

11.1775.     **THOMAS ELLISON** (bapt. 27 Feb 1631 - 11 Oct 1697). Baptized in St. Mary’s, Blackburn, Lanchashire. Of Hempstead, L.I.

11.1776.     **MARTHA HONOR CHAMPION**.

11.1793.     **EDMUND WELLS** (bapt. 26 Apr 1606). Baptized at Alveston, Warwickshire. (Near Stratford-on-Avon.) Married 20 Jul 1620.

11.1794.     **JANE ANGE** (bapt 21 Aug 1608). Baptized at Alveston, Warwickshire.

11.1805.     **HUGH ROE**.

11.1809.     **EDWARD HOWELL** (bapt. 26 Jul 1584 - May 1655). Baptized at the parish church in Marsh Gibbon, Buckinghamshire, by a minister with Puritan sympathies. Married on 7 Apr 1616 in Odell, Bedfordshire. His second wife was named Eleanor. Sold the family’s estate (Westbury Manor) in Buckinghamshire after coming to America. Brought servants with him to America. Was in Lynn, MA, as early as 1633 (had 500 acres and a mill). Admitted as a Freeman in Boston on 14 Mar 1638/9. A founder of Southampton, L.I., in 1640 with 46 other Puritans from Lynn (including RICHARD POST and ISAAC WILLMAN). (Settled first in Old Town, then in 1648 in the present Southampton.) Bought land from the Shinnecocks, but was concerned about the mainland Indians to whom the Shinnecocks paid tribute (after his death the Narragansetts attacked Southampton, burning his house). One of two representatives sent to the colony’s General Court in Hartford, CT, 1647-53. Built a water mill (still stands in Water Mill) by agreement with town of Southampton (the town provided a dam and 40 acres of land). A “gentleman” (i.e., earned sufficient income from land to obviate the need to work) and, as a former lord of a manor in England, headed the social order in Southampton. “Father of the colony.” A magistrate and selectman. Had servants, but no slaves. Estate probated on 6 Oct 1655. Buried at Old South End Cemetery.

11.1810.     **FRANCES PAXTON** (ca. 1596 - bur. 2 Jul 1630). Born in Buckinghamshire. Died at Westbury Manor.

11.1811.     **MATTHEW MITCHELL** (ca. 1589 - 16 Jun 1646). Of Southowram, Halifax, Yorkshire when he married SUSAN. He may be the son of a Thomas Mitchell of Thornton-in-Bradforddale, just north of Ovenden. Married SUSAN on 16 Apr 1616 in South Ouram. Came to America on the “James” in 1635 with SUSAN and a son, with many others from Yorkshire.



Cotton Mather describes him in his *Magnalia* as a “son of misfortune,” but he became prominent and wealthy. Settled first in Charlestown in 1635. Next spring moved to Concord but his house and goods were lost in a fire. One of the eight incorporators of Agawam (Springfield), MA, along with his friend WILLIAM PYNCHON. His house lot was on the mill brook. But during the summer he and his family moved down the Connecticut River to Fort Saybrook. Lost most of his property in Indian attacks that winter. Moved to Wethersfield, CT in the spring of 1637, losing some cattle along the way to the Indians. Became involved in a dispute with the ruling elder of the Wethersfield church and had to move out of the Connecticut colony to become a founder of Stamford in the New Haven colony in 1641, with his friend Rev. Richard Denton, also on the “James.” His house, barn, and goods were again destroyed by fire. Became by far the richest person in Stamford. Was in Long Island for a little while, but died in Stamford “of a stone,” a very painful disease. He exhibited “a high degree of Christian humility and patience” through his travails. Was well respected and “of excellent social position, and education, a man of enterprise, unbounded patience and resolution, clear judgment and earnest positive convictions of duty; his staunch uprightness commanded respect and his unswerving integrity invited confidence in times when trials demonstrated character.”

11.1812. **SUSAN WOOD** (b. ca. 1590). Of Ovendon, Yorkshire. Married first Thomas Butterfield, a prominent citizen of Ovendon. (Their son Samuel was captured, tortured, and roasted alive by Pequots at the outbreak of the Pequot War in Saybrook.) Outlived MATTHEW.

11.1813. **THOMAS HALSEY**. See 10.773.

11.1814. **ELIZABETH WHEELER**. See 10.774.

11.1815. **RICHARD BARTLETT [BARRETT]** (d. 28 Jan 1677). Of Cransfield, Bedfordshire, England. Married MARY there 29 Jan 1621/2.

11.1816. **MARY WHEELER** (d. 25 Aug 1658). Of Cransfield. Died in Boston, MA.

11.1817. **WILLIAM ROGERS** (ca. 1601 - ca. 1667). Married ANNE on 2 Feb 1630/1 in Stratford-on-Avon, Warwick. First appears in America in Wethersfield, CT, where he owned 5 pieces of land before 1640. Perhaps belonged to the company of the Rev. Richard Denton; but did not accompany the group to form Stamford. Located in Southampton, L.I., by 1644; perhaps there by 1642. Had a house on Main Street by 1648; owned by the family for 7 generations. Became a Freeman, 6 Mar 1649. May have lived in Hempstead for a few years. After 1655, apparently moved to Huntington with all his family, except his son OBADIAH. The Matinecock Sachem and other Indians deeded land to settle Huntington to WILLIAM and 2 others from Wethersfield (and perhaps also from Stratford-on-Avon).

11.1818. **ANNE HALE [HALL]** (16 Feb 1612/3 - ca. 1670). Married George Wood after WILLIAM's death and moved to Setauket. After George's death, Ralph Hall and his wife Mary were charged with witchcraft in causing the death of ANNE's and George's son George. Will dated 22 Nov 1669 and probated 21 Feb 1670 in Huntington, L.I.

11.1821. **EDWARD HOWELL**. See 11.1809.

11.1822. **FRANCES PAXTON**. See 11.1810.

11.1823. **THE REV. MR. ROBERT FORDHAM** (b. 1603). Born in England. Married in Stamford, CT. Led settlers from Stamford, CT, who thought Long Island was a paradise and

founded Hempstead, under the more tolerant Dutch authority, not the English, in 1644. (The English kicked the Dutch out of America in 1664.)

11.1824. **ALICE.**

11.1825. **JOHN GOODRICH** (1587 - 19 Apr 1632). A clothier of Bury St. Edmond, Suffolk, England. Married on 7 Aug 1615 in St. James, Bury St. Edmonds. (Common ancestor to Mother and Dad.) Will probated 16 May 1632.

11.1826. **MARGARIE HOWE** (1 Sep 1588 - 21 Apr 1632). (Common ancestor to Mother and Dad.)

11.1827. **MATTHEW MARVIN** (26 Mar 1600/1 - 1679). See 12.3483.

11.1828. **ELIZABETH GREGORY** (b. 1604). See 12.3484.

11.1829. **THOMAS WRIGHT, ESQ.** (bapt. 19 Nov 1610 - 1670). From Kelvedon, Essex, England. Baptized at St. Peter's Church. Married on 10 Aug 1629 in South Weald, Essex. Came to Watertown, MA, and settled in Wethersfield, CT, around 1639. Married secondly Margaret, the widow of John Elson. Admitted a Freeman, 11 May 1654. A man of influence and high standing. Wright's Island (an island where Indians used to meet for games) below Hartford is named for him. Deputy to the General Court, 1643; selectman, 1658; commissioner on town lines; constable, 1668-69. Prominent in the church fight over the successor to Rev. Mr. Hooker that led many to establish Hadley, MA.

11.1830. **MARY CRANBROOKE** (21 Sep 1609 - 1641). Born in Kent and died in Boston, MA.

11.1831. **LIEUT. WILLIAM CHITTENDEN** (bapt. Mar 1594 - Feb 1660/1). Baptized in Marden, Kent. From Cranbrook, Kent (35 miles southeast of London). Part of a group of 25 families from Kent (including JOANNA's brothers), Surrey, and Sussex that sailed about 20 May 1639 to New Haven, CT. An original proprietor of Guilford, CT (bought land from the woman leader of the Menunkatuck Indians). Had a lot near the village green. "A man of ability and influence." One of four magistrates of Guilford who ran the civil government until the church was organized. Deputy to General Court in Hartford until his death. Principal military leader of the New Haven plantation (he was said to have been a major in the English army in the Netherlands during the Thirty Years War).

11.1832. **JOANNA SHEAFFE** (d. 16 Aug 1668). Married secondly Abraham Cruttenden. Died in Guilford, CT.

11.1833. **JOHN PORTER** (21 Jun 1594 - 21 Apr 1648). Born in Felsted, Essex. Married on 18 Oct 1620 in Messing, Essex. Came from England and settled in Windsor, CT, in 1639. On a committee for the General Court in Hartford. Died in Windsor. Left a will dated 20 Apr 1648.

11.1834. **ANNA [ROSANNA] WHITE** (1600 - May 1648). Born in Shalford, Essex, and died in Windsor, CT. Buried on 12 May 1648.

11.1835. **THOMAS STANLEY** (1600 - 30 Jan 1663/4). Married on 3 Aug 1630 in Ashford, Kent. Sailed to Cambridge, MA, in 1634 with 2 older brothers on the "Planter." Settled first in Lynn where he was a member of the General Court and a constable. Admitted a Freeman, 4 Mar

1635. Moved to Hartford as part of Rev. Hooker's company in 1636. Juryman, 1639, 1643; constable, 1644, 1647, 1648, 1653. An original settler of Hadley, MA, in 1659.

11.1836. **BENNET TRITTON** (b. 30 Jul 1609). Born in Ashford, Kent.

11.1837. **MAJ. AARON COOKE** (bapt. 20 Mar 1613/4 - 5 Sep 1690). Born in Bridport, Dorset. Sailed to Dorchester, MA, in 1630 on the "Mary and John." Freeman, 6 May 1635. Moved to Windsor, CT, and married a daughter of Thomas Ford there. Married 3 or 4 times. Captain of military company in Northampton. A captain and major in Windsor. Representative to General Court in Hartford, 1638-54. Will dated \_\_\_ Aug 1690 and probated 24 Oct 1690.

11.1838. **MIRIAM or MARY FORD** (bapt. 18 Aug 1612 - 1645). Possibility that this first wife of AARON did not exist and his first wife was Joan Denslow, daughter of Nicholas Denslow.

11.1839. **WILLIAM WESTWOOD** (1606 - 9 Apr 1699). Born in Ipswich, Essex. Came to America on the "Frances" in Apr 1634. Moved to Hartford, CT. Member of first General Court, Apr 1636. Later moved to Hadley, MA. Died there.

11.1840. **BRIDGET GREEN** (1602 - 12 May 1676). Born in Ipswich, Essex and died in Hadley, MA.

11.1841. **WILLIAM WHITING** (ca. 1605 - 24 Jul 1647). Born in Suffolk, England, and died in Middletown, CT. One of the early settlers of Hartford, CT. "One of the most respectable of the settlers." "One of the civil and religious Fathers of Connecticut." A man of wealth and education. A Gentleman ("Mr."). Treasurer of the colony, from 1641 until his death. Also a magistrate and mayor. In 1646, "a plot was laid by Sequasson, Sachem of the Naticks, to kill Governors Haynes and Hopkins and Mr. Whiting, on account of the just and faithful protection which these gentlemen had afforded Uncas. The plot was made known by a friendly Indian and the danger averted."

11.1842. **SUSANNA** (ca. 1609 - bur. 8 Jul 1673). Married secondly Samuel Fitch and thirdly Alexander Bryan. Died in Middletown, CT, at the house of her daughter.

11.1843. **DEACON EDWARD COLLINS** (ca. 1603 - 9 Apr 1689). Born in Brammford, Suffolk. Came to Cambridge, MA, in 1638. Admitted a Freeman, 13 May 1641. Deputy to Massachusetts General Court, 1654-79 (except 1661). Died in Charlestown, MA.

11.1844. **MARTHA BAYLIE** (ca. 1607 - 22 Mar 1699/1700). From Framlingham, Surrey. Died in Charlestown, MA.

11.1845. **MATTHEW ALLYN** (bapt. 17 Apr 1605 - 1 Feb 1670/1). Gentry from Branton, Devonshire. Married MARGARET there on 2 Feb 1626/7. Came to Cambridge, MA, in 1632-3. Admitted a Freeman on 4 Mar 1635. Within 4 years was Cambridge's largest land owner. Merchant. Representative to General Court, 1636. One of Rev. Mr. Hooker's adventurers to Hartford (the 1636 trip), along with THOMAS STANLEY and MATTHEW MARVIN. (The overland trip to Hartford took 14 days.) Built a dam and a saw and grist mill in Hartford on Allyn's Island (named for him). Moved to Windsor, CT, by 1648; owned land there many years earlier. Purchased the Windsor Trading House of the Plymouth Colony and its lands. Owned 110 acres. A gentleman ("Mr.") in Windsor. Deputy to the General Court, 1648-51, 1654-57; on various governmental committees to 1666. Commissioner to the United Colonies, 1660, 1664.

Moderator of the committee petitioning King Charles II in 1661 for a separate colony of Connecticut. (Charter was granted, but had to be hidden from Massachusetts Governor Andros when King James II succeeded to the throne; hidden in a tree — known thereafter as the “Charter Oak.”) Excommunicated from the Hartford church for his ideas on baptism, membership and discipline. In 1658, there was more trouble in the Hartford church, and he was chairman of the committee of the General Court examining the subject. Will dated 30 Jan 1670/1 and probated 2 Mar 1670/1. “Few men in the Colony had more influence or received more honor.” “He was a man of superior talents, energetic, wilful, and obstinate in all projects.” “Not always smooth tempered.” A statue of him now stands near the capitol in Hartford.

11.1846. **MARGARET WYATT** (bapt. 8 Mar 1594/5 - 12 Sep 1675). Born in Brauton, Devonshire. She and MATTHEW are ancestors of President Grover Cleveland.

11.1847. **CAPT. HENRY SMITH** (ca. 1616 - 1 Aug 1681). Born and married in Dorchester, Dorsetshire. “A godly, wise young man.” Once arrived in New England, accompanied his father-in-law to found Springfield, MA. Freeman, 18 May 1631. Foreman of the juries and clerk of WILLIAM PYNCHON’s court. Returned to England with his father-in-law in Sep 1652. Died in Wraysbury, Buckinghamshire.

11.1848. **ANNA PYNCHON** (b. ca. 1616). Born in Springfield, Essex. Survived HENRY.

11.1849. **GOV. WILLIAM BRADFORD** (bapt. 19 Mar 1589/90 - 9 May 1657). The head of the Plymouth colony. Born in Austerfield, Yorkshire (he later had a very low opinion of the religious state of the village). When his father died in 1591, he went to live with his grandfather (who died in 1595) and then his uncle in Scrooby. His family was gentry. Inherited 10 acres and a house in Bentley from his grandfather; sold them in 1611 while in Leyden. Member of the Scrooby congregation meeting at William Brewster’s house in 1606. (The Pilgrims were “Separatists” who left the Anglican church while “Puritans” remained in the church to reform it; in America, the Pilgrims’ Plymouth Colony was a little more tolerant and dealt more fairly with the Indians (Wampanaug) than the Puritan Massachusetts Bay Colony; Plymouth was absorbed by Massachusetts in 1694.) Studious, with an excellent education (knew Latin, Greek and Hebrew). In 1607, he and other principal members of the group made an agreement with a Dutch captain to sail to America, but the captain betrayed them to magistrates and they were arrested. Escaped in 1608, and 125 Separatists fled to Amsterdam. Had to learn a trade and so apprenticed himself to a French silk weaver. Moved with rest of the company to Leyden; learned fustian (corduroy-like cloth) weaving and did considerable studying. Married first Dorothy May in 1613 in Amsterdam; she drowned in Provincetown harbor on Cape Cod while the “Mayflower” was anchored there in Dec 1620. Married secondly ALICE on 14 Aug 1623. (When he learned that ALICE’s first husband had died he wrote to her and asked her to marry him; she arrived on the “Anne,” leaving her sons with relatives.) The second signer of the Mayflower Compact, 11 Nov 1620. On the first landing of the “Mayflower” in Provincetown harbor, was a member of the first group of men to go ashore (got caught in a rope trap set for deer by the Indians). Soon after Gov. Carver died, he was elected governor in annual elections from 1621 to 1657 (except for 5 years, when he declined to run and was elected a governor’s assistant). The governor was chief executive, chief judge, and treasurer. His administration was marked by vigor, prudence, humor, plain speaking, and self-denial. Councils held at his house on all civic and military affairs. In the fall of 1622, traded inland with Wampanaug and Massachusetts Indians for food. Tried to deal with the Indians by trade rather than arms; other English settlers dealt with them differently. Each

Sunday morning, company assembled at his house at foot of Burial Hill and marched up to the fort at its top to hold religious service. The Warwick patent of 1630 made him sole proprietor of Plymouth, but he shared his right to land with the other “Old Comers” and confirmed freemen’s electoral and legislative powers; in 1639, the Old Comers yielded the patent to all freemen (while reserving tracts of land for themselves). Historian of the colony (his *History of Plymouth Plantations* is one of the few of his works to survive.) Late in life was discouraged about the state of the religious experiment of Plymouth; had wanted it to remain a small close-knit community, but many moved out so they could have bigger houses and cattle farms, and there was the intrusion of many “loose and profane” persons. He thought God’s interest in New England was in doubt and he urged the younger generation to repent and reform in order to avert divine displeasure. Late in life he studied Hebrew to understand the word of God in God’s own “holy tongue.” At time of his death, the richest man in the colony; his estate included 275 books. Gravestone erected in 1835 at the probable site of his grave (next to MAJ. WILLIAM BRADFORD). Cotton Mather said of him: “He died lamented by all the Colonies of New England as a common blessing and Father to them all.”

11.1850. **ALICE CARPENTER** (bapt. 3 Aug 1590 - 26 Mar 1670/1). May have been born in Bath, Surrey, but was baptized in Wrington, Somerset. Arrived in Plymouth on the “Anne” on 14 Jul 1623 and married WILLIAM soon after (4th marriage in Plymouth). Married first Edward Southworth in Leyden (a family story says that originally WILLIAM wanted to marry her, but her family objected because of his lower social standing and pressured her into marrying Edward). Will dated 7 Jun 1670. Died in Plymouth. Well-educated and of considerable property. Promoted education of the young. Strong personality, deep faith, and of great respect and influence in the colony.

11.1851. **THOMAS RICHARDS** (bapt. 15 Apr 1596 - Dec/Jan 1650-1). From Pitminster, Somerset. Came to America in 1630. One of the original settlers of Dorchester, MA. Admitted a Freeman, on 18 May 1630. A merchant (made trips back to England). Owned a mill with Henry Waltham; they were fined in 1639 for “taking too much toll.” Designated by the title of a gentleman (“Mr.”). Moved to Weymouth, MA, about 1639. Selectman, 1643-45. Will dated 17 Dec 1650 and probated 28 Jan 1650/1 in Weymouth.

11.1852. **WELTHIAN LORING** (ca. 1599 - 1679). Moved to Boston in 1651 after death of THOMAS. Will dated 3 Jul 1679. Died before 4 Nov 1679 (date of probate) in Boston, MA.

11.1853. **JOHN ROGERS** (bapt. 6 Apr 1606 - 1691/2). Born in Watford, Northamptonshire. Lived in Leyden with his mother and other Pilgrim families after his father and older brother went on the “Mayflower.” Came to Plymouth Colony about 1630 with the last of the Leyden congregation. Bought land in Duxbury in 1634. Married on 16 Apr 1639 in Plymouth. A weaver and yeoman. Admitted Freeman by 1641. Jury member, 1641; highway surveyor, 1644; deputy at court, 1657; constable, 1666. On 3 Jun 1662, he was one the “ancient freemen” given land on the north side of Taunton, MA. Died in Duxbury between 26 Aug 1691 (date of will) and 20 Sep 1692 (date his will probated).

11.1854. **ANNA CHURCHMAN** (1618 - 1670). Born in Huntington, Suffolk, England.

11.1855. **WILLIAM PABODIE [PAYBODY]** (ca. 1619 - 13 Dec 1707). Born in England. Lived in Duxbury, MA. Described variously as a yeoman, husbandman, boatman, planter, wheelwright, and land surveyor. Married his next door neighbor ELIZABETH on 26 Dec 1644.

Early settler of Little Compton (Saconett), RI. Admitted a Freeman, 5 Jun 1651. Town officer of Duxbury; selectman and deputy to the General Court for both Duxbury and Little Compton; grand jury, 1650; elected annually to the General Court, 1654-63, 1668, 1671-82. Died there. Will dated 13 May 1707. He and ELIZABETH are buried next to each other.

11.1856. **ELIZABETH ALDEN** (ca. 1624 - 31 May 1717, in her 94<sup>th</sup> year). The first European girl born in New England. Died in Little Compton, RI. (Her brother John was arrested in Boston as a witch [wizard] and imprisoned in Salem Village in 1692; he escaped and fled to New York until the witch craze died down; those who stayed behind during the escape were among the last hanged in Salem Village.)

11.1897. **JESSE DE FOREEST** (ca. 1576 - Oct 22 1624). "The founder of New Amsterdam." A Walloon from Avesnes, Netherlands. The organizer and driving force behind the Walloon settlement of New Amsterdam in 1623 or 1624 that became the first permanent European settlers of the island (and in the state of New York). Born in Avesnes when it was part of Spanish Netherlands. Married in Sedan, Luxemburg, Sunday 23 Sep 1601. Took over his father's wool business in Sedan when JEAN's family moved to Holland. Moved to Leyden in 1615 for religious freedom. Joined guild of merchant dyers (permitted not only to dye wools and camlets black but also other colors, indicating his expertise). Had large family and became indebted. Was in Leyden when the Pilgrims left for America in Jul 1620 and was in the same trade as some of them (including WILLIAM BRADFORD); the Walloons were part of the French congregation in Leyden who were on very good terms with the English (many moved to England); so he might have known some of the Pilgrims. After the Pilgrims left, JESSE petitioned the English authorities in Jul 1621 for permission to lead a group of Walloons to Virginia (the designation for most of North America). The English were interested but wanted to divide the Walloons among the English settlers. That did not appeal to the Walloons. So in Apr 1622 JESSE petitioned the Dutch to set up a colony in the West Indies (the Dutch designation for all of the Americas). JESSE's idea was to set up the principal colony on the "wild coast" of Guiana in South America (the settlements in New Netherlands were to be only trading posts for fur, tobacco, and timber). Sailed with fleet of 26 ships carrying soldiers and settlers from Leyden to the Wyapoko River in eastern Guiana in Jun 1624. Soon bought fields from the Yaos Indians for growing tobacco, cotton and sugar. On 13 Oct suffered severe sunstroke on a canoeing expedition; rested for two days (and was "bled") but was impatient and went exploring again on the 15th and suffered even worse sunstroke, and died on the 22nd. The colony soon failed, with the last colonists returning to Holland within about a year of his death. "The first permanent, cultivating, town-building settlement of New York had been accomplished by a handful of French-speaking Protestants, recruited and enrolled by Jesse de Forest of Avesnes." "Indefatigable explorer and experimenter."

11.1898. **MARIE DU CLOUX**. Survived JESSE and returned to Leyden from Guiana with the last settlers. Sailed to New Amsterdam in 1623 (their son ISAACK may have accompanied her) but returned to Leyden and supported herself by boarding students of the university. Living in Leyden in 1626.

11.1899. **PHILIPPE DU TRIEUX [de TRAY]** (between 18 Jul and 14 Aug 1586 - ca. 1651). A worsted-dyer from Robez (Roubaix), Flanders, France (near Avesnes, Belgium). Family name from the village of Trieu, Belgium. Joined a Walloon church in Leyden in 1617. Resided in Amsterdam for several years. Married first Jacquemine (Jacqueline) Noiret; she died

in 1621. Married SUSANNA on 17 Jul 1621 in Leyden. He and SUSANNA were part of a large Walloon migration to New Amsterdam in 1623 and 1624; member of the first Walloon immigration to Manhattan Island in May 1624. (30 families, mostly Walloon, went to New Netherlands and set up 4 forts from Albany to the Delaware River just below Philadelphia, with most colonists settling in Manhattan.) Sailed on the “Nieuwe Nederlandt [New Netherland]” from Leyden in Apr 1623; stopped first in Wyapoko, Guiana, before sailing on to New Netherlands in North America. (The ship and an accompanying yacht arrived at the mouth of the Hudson River just when a French ship was about to land and set up a fort for Catholic France; the Walloon colony existed under the authority of the Dutch West Indies Company, and so solidified the Dutch claim to the region.) The early colonists lived in bark-covered lodges which stretched unguarded along the western shore of Manhattan. Was living there when the local director of the West Indies Company, Peter Minuit (another Walloon), “bought” Manhattan from a branch of the Mohawk Indians in 1626 for 60 guilders. (The Dutch in 1630 replaced the Walloon leadership with Dutch patroons when the Dutch emigration began.) A dyer and a dresser of plush or mock velvet. A “court messenger” (marshal) in 1640. Had title to land in “Smit’s Valley”(near the East River in Manhattan above New Amsterdam’s old common pasture). Later moved closer to middle of the settlement to a house he built on Bever Gracht (Beaver Street), near the fort and market place. May have been killed by Indians along with his son Philippe in Sep 1653.

11.1900. **SUSANNA DU CHESNE** (30 Jul 1602 - 1654). From Sedan, Luxemburg. Described as an orphan in her wedding bans.

11.1903. **WOLFERT WEBBER** (18 Jan 1604 - 28 Feb 1663/4). Born in Amsterdam and died in New Amsterdam. Married 22 Jan 1630 in old Amsterdam. Had tavern north of the main settlement on road to Harlem above the Commons and near the Pond.

11.1904. **ANNA WALLIS** (ca. 1610 - 5 May 1674). From Vera, Zeeland, Holland.

11.1913. **ROELLOLSZEN JONGERMAN BOELEN**. Born in Amsterdam, Netherlands.

11.1914. **BAYKN ARENTS**. Born in Amsterdam, Netherlands.

11.1915. **ABRAHAM KLOCK** (ca. 1625 - 1665/6). Of Niew Amsterdam, New Netherlands.

11.1916. **TRYNTIE ALBERTS** (ca. 1629 - aft. 1683). Of Niew Amsterdam.

11.1917. **JOSEPH WALDRON [WILLEMSON/WILLEMSZ]** (ca. 1617 - 1662-3). Probably born in Amsterdam. Married first Aeltje Hendricks in Old Church, Amsterdam in 1639. Was a bombazine (clothworker of a twill fabric with a silk warp and a worsted filling) and book printer. Married second ANNETJE in Old Church, Amsterdam, 4 Apr 1649. Immigrated to America in 1654-5 with his brother Resolve. They bought a house and lot on Broadway. Butler to the garrison and in charge of its magazine.

11.1918. **ANNETJE DANIELS** (bapt.15 Jan 1623 - 10 May 1688). From Amsterdam. Married secondly Herman Smeeman in New Amsterdam and third Coenraedt Ten Eyck. (If she married Coenraedt in 1649 then by the date of DANIEL’s birth, this is his father.)

11.1985. **ROBERT CAIRNS** (ca. 1580 - 1647). A thrifty man. Paid off a “wadset” on the estate of Torr (a pledge of land as security for a debt) in 1604.

11.1987. **THE REV. MR. DAVID LEITCH.** Minister of Rerwick, Scotland.

12.2565. **JACOB VON WASSERBERG** (d. 1653). Spent a year at Heidelberg University. Was an “Imperial Officer” in the Thirty Years War between Lutherans and Calvinists. Their area of Germany was devastated by the wars. Died in Mannheim, Germany.

12.2567. **JONATHAN PURSELL.** A swordmaker from Assington, Suffolk, England, who had moved to Germany.

12.2568. **ROSE.**

12.2573. **WILLIAM GRAY** (bur. 3 Feb 1647/8). A yeoman of Harrow on the Hill, Middlesex. Will dated 27 Jan 1647/8.

12.2575. **WILLIAM FROST** (d. 1645). See 11.1717. Married on 20 Apr 1612 at St. Mary’s Church in Nottingham. Married secondly Joane Lupton. An early “planter” of Fairfield, CT. Died there. Will dated 6 Jan 1644/5.

12.2576. **JOYSE BARKER** (bur. 23 May 1634). See 11.1718. Buried in St. Peter’s in Nottingham.

12.2577. **JOHN REYNOLDS** (ca. 1612 - aft. 1651). From England. First appears in Watertown, MA, in 1634. Freeman, 1635. Late in 1635 or early in 1636 moved to Wethersfield, CT. Successful land owner and farmer. In 1641, moved with some other families from Wethersfield to Stamford over a dispute within the church, moving from the Connecticut colony to the New Haven colony. They got a 276 acres tract encompassing parts of Stamford, Darien, and Greenwich for 33 pounds, paid as 100 bushels of corn (JOHN paid 3.2 bushels and received 11 acres); New Haven later wanted more money (56 pounds). (Same as 11.1403.)

12.2578. **SARAH [CHESTERFIELD?]** (ca. 1614 - 31 Aug 1657). Probably the Sarah Reynolds who came across on the “Elizabeth” with people from Ipswich in 1634 to Boston. (Same as 11.1404.)

12.2625. **RICHARD FERRIS** (b. ca. 1585). From Leicestershire, England.

12.2641. **EDMUND LOCKWOOD** (2 Sep 1574 - bef. 3 Mar 1634/5). Of Combs, Suffolk. Married 9 Mar 1592. Settled in Cambridge, MA. Admitted a Freeman there on 18 May 1631. Constable in Cambridge, 1632. Married secondly Elizabeth Masters.

12.2642. **ALES COOPER [ALICE COWPER]** (b. ca. 1573). Died in England.

12.2643. **RICHARD NORMAN** (ca. 1587 - 1653-64). Born in Orchard Portman, Suffolk, England. Married on 2 Sep 1615. Fisherman and shipwright. Settled in Naumkeag (Salem), MA. Norman Street in Salem and “Norman’s Woe” (a dangerous reef off Marblehead) named for this family. Died in Salem.

12.2644. **MARGARET ALFORD.**

 12.2682. **SARAH.** Same as 11.1498.
- 12.2685. **WILLIAM COMSTOCK** (4 Jul 1595 - ca. 1682). From Culmstock, Devonshire. Came to Massachusetts about 1635. Very shortly thereafter moved to Wethersfield, CT. Owned land on the Connecticut River there in 1641. One of 26 men from Wethersfield in an expedition commanded by Capt. John Mason that captured the Pequot fort at Mystic, CT, on 26 May 1637, killing about 500 Indians. Moved to New London, CT, about 1650. Helped establish a mill on the river that is still there. Same as 12.3461. On 25 Feb 1661/2, elected Sexton “to order youth in the meeting house, sweep the meeting house and beat out dogs” and to dig all graves. Died in New London.
- 12.2686. **ELIZABETH DANIELS** (8 Jan 1608 - 1665). From Culmstock, Devonshire. Probably WILLIAM’s second wife. Died in New London, CT. Same as 12.3462.
- 12.2687. **DEACON RICHARD PLATT.** Same as 12.3463.  
 12.2688. **MARY WOODE.** Same as 12.3464.
- 12.2753. **WILLIAM BISSHOP, ESQ.** (ca. 1540 - 27 Dec 1621).  
 12.2754. **BRIDE BUCKLER** (ca. 1540 - 12 Jul 1613).
- 12.2755. **WILLIAM DUNNING.**
- 12.2757. **ZACHARY GOODYEAR** (bur. 23 Jul 1613). Married in St. Michael’s, Cornhill, London, 5 Jul 1596. Described himself in his will dated 18 Jul 1613 as “a citizen and vinter of London.” Will probated 31 Jul 1613.
- 12.2758. **SUSANNAH BAXTER** (bapt. 22 Apr 1575). Born in London.
- 12.2779. **HENRY KIBBY** (1632 - 1661). From London. Admitted a Freeman in Boston in 1642. Member of the honorary Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co., 1644. Married secondly Grizel. Will probated 15 Aug 1661.  
 12.2780. **RACHEL** (1635 - 16 Jul 1637).

- 12.2783. **THOMAS KILBOURNE** (8 May 1578 - 25 Dec 1640). Born in Wood Ditton, Cambridge, England. Married in Moulton, Suffolk, England. Sailed to Plymouth on the "Increase," 1635, with family.
- 12.2784. **FRANCES MOODY** (11 Oct 1584 - 10 Nov 1650). Born in Wood Ditton, Cambridge, and died in Wethersfield, CT.
- 12.2805. **CHRISTOPHER REYNOLDS.**
- 12.2809. **ABRAHAM BELL** (d. Jul 1644). Died in Charlestown, MA.
- 12.2810. **KATHERINE WAFFE** (d. 1692). Married secondly \_\_\_ Bullfinch.

Living in Charlestown by 1629, in Dorchester by 1630, in Scituate by 1634 or 1635; in Windsor, CT, by 1639, in Fairfield by 1646, and in Stamford 1649-57, where he died. In America, he married secondly Susanna Smith, who married ROBERT BATES after Simon's death. Estate inventoried, 9 Oct 1657.

- 12.2825. **WILLIAM FIELD [FEILD]** (d. 1619). Resided in Sowerby, Halifax, Yorkshire; then moved to North Ouram. Had a will.

- 12.2842. **ELIZABETH GOFFE.** Of Reading, Berkshire.
- 12.2843. **JOHN WALKER** (15 May 1604 - 1647). From Cowfold, Essex. Landed in Boston. Moved first to Roxbury, CT, then to Portsmouth, R.I. Freeman of Boston, 1634. A signer establishing Rhode Island as a separate colony, based on civil and religious liberty.
- 12.2844. **KATHERINE HUTCHINSON** (7 Feb 1629 - 20 Aug 1643). From Alford, Lincolnshire. Died in Portsmouth, R.I.
- 12.2845. **THOMAS CORNELL [CORNWALL]** (24 Mar 1593/4 - 8 Feb 1656). From Fairstead, Essex. Came to Boston in 1636 with REBECCA and at least 7 of their 14 children. Had an inn for several years and was fined for selling wine without a license. Moved to Portsmouth, R.I., by 1641. Freeman, 1641. Constable. Ensign in town militia. In 1642, went

with Roger Williams to New Amsterdam and received a land grant in Westchester County in 1642. His home, stock, and barn were destroyed in same Indian attack in which Ann Hutchinson died. Returned to Portsmouth by 1644. Again returned to New Amsterdam and was again driven away by Indians and returned to Portsmouth. Died there. Will dated 5 Dec 1651.

12.2846. **REBECCA BRIGGS** (25 Oct 1600 - 3 Feb 1673). From London, England. Died in Portsmouth, R.I. (She was sitting next to the fire, smoking, and was found by her son Thomas. Thomas was convicted of murder and hanged on testimony of REBECCA's brother John who said her ghost spoke to him in a dream. Her daughter-in-law MARY testified at the trial that REBECCA was depressed and senile and had thought of doing away with herself but remembered "resist the Devil and he will flee from you.") She and THOMAS were buried on their land.

12.2847. **JOHN RUSSELL, SR.** (1616 - 1 Jun 1676). A cordwainer (shoe maker and leather worker). Came from England with DOROTHY and son John (and Henry Dunster) in 1640. Settled on a 94 acre plot in Charlestown, MA. Freeman, 1644. Constable, 1651. Selectman, 1652-57. Surveyor and commissioner for the allotment of land. Deacon. Wrote the first popular petition for the separation of church and state in America, the "Woburn Memorial for Christian Liberty." Stopped going to public worship and opposed infant baptism. Arrested and convicted in 1672. Sent to jail in Charlestown; had a serious illness and was released on bail. Became a leader in the founding of the Baptist Church in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Died in Woburn, MA. A man "whose resolute spirit no opposition could subdue, no suffering could break or cause to swerve from the path he deemed right."

The latter is a well-documented land owner in Southold and Mattituck. In any case, here are the legends: He is said to be the first of the heads of the 13 families who founded Southold, L.I., to step on shore among the Indians at Southold (lots were cast to see who would be first to set foot there). "Hallock's Neck" and "Hallock's Beach" named after him. Purchased Oyster Ponds (now Orient Point) from the Indians. Returned to England for his wife, a widow of a man named Howell; promised her that, if she would accompany him back, her son by her former husband would share in his property (descendants of the families had property next to each other for 250 years). When they returned, they found that the Indians had resold Oyster Ponds. Bought more land extending from Long Island Sound to Peconic Bay near Mattituck.

Sailed to Salem Town, MA, in the 1630s; his brother JOHN (10.817) followed later. Granted land in Jun 1638. Member of the First Church in Salem, 1639. Married secondly a woman named Susan in Salem; thirdly married Dorothy in East Hampton. Became a Freeman on 18 May 1642. He and JOHN were both glass-makers by trade in King Swinford, Staffordshire. (They may have been second generation English descendants of glass-makers from the continent, since their family name does not have long English roots.) Were the first in New England to manufacture window glass and bottles (light and dark green, blue, and brown). ANANIAS and JOHN were granted a 10 acre plot in Salem for a glass factory; they were the craftsmen and two others supplied the money for the glass company. Had a dispute over lack of pay and non-involvement of the two other partners of the factory. The company failed; ANANIAS was listed among the poor of Salem. Requested release from their agreement with Salem in order to seek work elsewhere. He and John left for Southold, L.I., in Apr 1650. ANANIAS settled in East Hampton, 1653. Chosen assistant to the town magistrates, 1654. He and LION GARDINER were appointed chimney inspectors, 4 Feb 1656; fence viewer, 1653-4. "A devout man of energy and good judgment."

12.3326.     **MARY LAUNDER [LAUDER/LANDER/LAVENDER]** (Mar 1613 - Nov 1657). Born in Wasail, Staffordshire. A spinster when she married ANANIAS. Probably died in Salem, MA.

12.3327.     **LION GARDINER** (1599 - 1663). Perhaps originally from Norfolk or Kent. (But the name "LION" suggests Walloon origins; some Walloons had settled in Worcester.) Educated in the profession of arms; studied civil and military engineering. Joined a troop of pikemen and musketeers journeying to Holland to fight the Spanish and Austrians. Became a Lieutenant. Stationed in Holland until 1635. Became an Engineer and Master of Works and Fortifications for the Prince of Orange. Married MARY in Woerden near Utrecht, Holland by 1625. Commissioned by the Earl of Warwick and other nobles to build a fort at the mouth of the Connecticut River for a settlement to be formed there (to defeat a Dutch claim to the area). Took an oath of conformity to the English Church and sailed from London aboard the small North Sea barque "Bachelor," 11 Aug 1635; only 11 people on board; MARY brought a maid. A difficult voyage for the small ship, arriving in Nov in Boston. Helped with the fortification of Boston (he was the first engineer in New England); built fort on Breed's Hill that lasted until after the Revolution. Sailed the next year on the "Bachelor" to the Connecticut River. The company

formed Saybrook (two of the lords commissioning the settlement were named Say and Brooke). Commander of the fort for a difficult 4 years. The small force there fought the Pequot Indians for 2 years (LION wrote a book on the wars); severely wounded by an arrow. One ally was Uncas and the Mohegans. The GARDINERS' son David was the first European born in Connecticut, 1636. Purchased the island of Manchonake ("Island where many have died"), 3 May 1639, from Wyandanch, sachem of the Montauk Indians. LION knew Wyandanch from the Pequot wars; once remained as a hostage with the Montauks when Wyandanch had to appear before the magistrates at Southampton, and once ransomed Wyandanch's two daughters from the sachem of the Narragansetts. Purchase confirmed by an English royal grant. Renamed it first "Isle of Wight," and later "Gardiner's Island." Has been in his family ever since. Moved there in the fall of 1639 with his family and some laborers; some Indians still lived there at the time. Their daughter Elizabeth who was born there was the first English child born in New York. By terms of the grant, Gardiner's Island was a separate "plantation," giving the grantee the right to make his own laws for church and civil government. Settled before Southampton and Southold. After 14 years there, moved to Maidstone (East Hampton), L.I., 1653. Bought a lot on high ground near the Old South End Burial Ground. Buried in East Hampton; monument erected in 1886. Will probated 5 Oct 1663 in East Hampton. "He understood [the Indians'] language, and by his integrity, decision and bravery, which were characteristic of his command of the fort at Saybrook and of his residence on his island, he gained their love and admiration." Noted for his kindness and generosity to both friends and strangers. "With all the frankness, gaiety and bravery of an old soldier, he possessed the zeal, piety, and prudent forethought which marked the character of the Puritans."

Moved to Norwalk, CT, in 1650 or 1651 (name on deed of land to the town from Indian chiefs). A leather seller. Soldier in Pequot War of 1637 (granted 60 acres by colony for his service in 1669); soldier in King Philip's War, 1675-76; appointed captain in 1680 for 6 years. Held many public offices in Hartford and Norwalk: Constable, "fence-viewer," a deputy to the General Court for 14 years, on committee to settle land dispute with Indians, grand juror, and selectman. Muster Master for Fairfield County, CT, 1673. Witness to will of RICHARD SEYMOUR. Will dated 30 Sep 1684; probated 23 Feb 1686/7.

- 12.3461. **WILLIAM COMSTOCK.** See 12.2685.

- 12.3463. **DEACON RICHARD PLATT** (bapt. 28 Sep 1603 - 13 Feb 1684/5). Baptized in Bovington, Hertfordshire. Married in Roydon, near Ware, Hertfordshire on 26 Jan 1628/9. Became a tailor like his father and grandfather. Profound Puritan and of good character. Landed in New Haven, CT, in 1638 or 1639. One of the founders of a church there on 22 Aug 1639. Member of Davenport & Eaton Co. which founded the New Haven colony in 1638. New Haven was the most theocratic (government based on Bible) of the colonies; a dispute over a new government based on the Bible caused a group to move and found Milford, CT, in 1639. One of the original "Plantors" of Milford and a Deacon in the first church there. Willed a Bible to each of his 24 grandchildren. Estate inventoried, 13 Feb 1684/5. Probably buried in his orchard, as was the custom. Stone memorial placed by descendants on a bridge over the Wapawaug River in Milford.
- 12.3464. **MARY WOODE** (bapt. 10 Nov 1605 - bur. 24 Jan or Mar 1675/6). From Roydon, Essex.
- 12.3473. **THOMAS TROWBRIDGE** (1590s - 7 Feb 1672/3). A devote Puritan. Married on 26 Mar 1627/8. Arrived in Dorchester, MA., by 1636 from Taunton, England. Respectful title "Mr." appears before his name. Member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery of Boston. Moved to the Plantation of New Haven in 1638. A rich trader in West Indian goods. On the



threat of Civil War in England, left New Haven, CT, and returned to Taunton, Somerset, in 1641. Captain in Oliver Cromwell's army defending Taunton when it was besieged by Royalists. Became a man of prominence there, too. During the Commonwealth and Restoration, was active as a merchant on the Atlantic routes. Met his sons who had been left in New Haven, but never resettled in New England. Left his estate and 3 sons in the care of Henry Gibbons, who did not fulfill his trust; town took over estate and supervision of the children; suit against Gibbons settled in 1680 when the sons had become of age. Ancestor of President Rutherford B. Hayes.

Lost at sea on the ship in 1646; a phantom replica of the ship supposedly appeared in New Haven harbor and repeated the tragic wreck (theme of Longfellow's "Phantom Ship"). (MARY GOODYEAR, 11.1380, died in same incident.) Left a large estate of £1,090.

Received land from the town on what is now North Main Street. A founder of Norwalk, CT. Elected a selectman, 1655; a "chimney viewer" (a fire warden and chief). Progenitor of a prominent Connecticut family. Died in Norwalk between 29 Jul 1655 (date of his will) and 10 Oct 1655 (date of the inventory of his estate). Forgery in a family Bible attempts to establish that he was a descendant of the brother of Jane Seymour, wife of Henry V.

Sailed from London on

the "Increase" in Apr 1635 with ELIZABETH, five children, and two servants. He and his brother Reinold were among the founders of Hartford, CT (his name is on a memorial there) in 1635. May have lived briefly in Farmington, CT. Among pioneers of Norwalk, CT, by 1651. Deputy to General Court in Hartford, 1654. Died between 26 Dec 1678 (date of will) and 13 Jul 1680 (date of estate inventory).

A shoemaker, tanner and sealer of leather. Moved to Stratford and then Norwalk, CT. Constable; selectman; deputy to colonial court in Hartford; official cow herder. Will dated 21 Aug 1689 and probated 9 Oct 1689.

12.3673. **AARON COOK** (1585 - bur. 28 Dec 1615). A “joiner” (carpenter) of Bridport, Dorset. Married on 25 Sep 1610 in Thorncombe parish, Dorset.

12.3674. **ELIZABETH CHARDE** (d. 18 Apr 1643). From Bridport, Dorset. Widowed soon after AARON’s birth, she married THOMAS FORD. Died in Windsor, CT.

12.3675. **THOMAS FORD** (ca. 1592 - 28 Nov 1676). From Bridport, Dorset. Married 13 Dec 1610. Sailed to Dorchester, MA, in May 1630 on the “Mary and John.” Died in Northampton, MA. Ancestor of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Thomas Dewey, and Grover Cleveland.

12.3676. **JOANE WAY** (d. 10 May 1615). Of Bridport, Dorset.

12.3681. **JOHN WHITING** (ca. 1570 - 22 Oct 1617). Of Boston, Lincolnshire.

12.3682. **ISOBEL** (d. 4 May 1602). Of Boston, Lincolnshire.

12.3685. **JOHN COLLINS** (ca. 1564 - 29 May 1599). Born in London and married and died in Bramford, Suffolk.

12.3686. **MAGDALINE [MAUDLEN] TREATHONE [TREITHERNE]** (b. 28 Apr 1577). Born in Bramford, Suffolk.

12.3689. **RICHARD ALLYN** (ca. 1560 - 10 May 1652). Of Braunton, Devonshire. Married on 24 Sep 1583. Died in Cambridge, MA.

12.3690. **MARGARET WYATT [WYOTT]**. Of Devonshire. Not related to her daughter-in-law of the same name.

12.3691. **JOHN WYATT** (bapt. 11 Nov 1557 - bur. 29 Nov 1598). Born in Braunton, Devonshire. A "gentleman" ("Mr."). Admitted to the Inner Temple, 1576.

12.3692. **FRANCES CHICHESTER** (ca. 1562 - bur. 5 Apr 1626). Born in Arlington, Devonshire. (Charts setting forth connections to CHARLEMAGNE and through an illegitimate son to HENRY I of England are included under ROYAL ANCESTORS.)

12.3693. \_\_\_\_\_ **SMITH**.

12.3694. **FRANCES**. Married secondly \_\_\_\_\_ Sanford, and thirdly WILLIAM PYNCHON after ANNA's death.

12.3695. **HON. WILLIAM PYNCHON** (11 Oct 1590 - 29 Oct 1662). A paradigm of Yankee spirit. Born in Springfield, near Chelmsford, Essex. Church warden, 1619-24. Active in the Puritan movement. Contributed a round communion table to church (a symbol opposed to an Anglican altar); restored to church in 1986. One of the Patentees of the Charter that King Charles I granted to the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, 4 Mar 1629. Chosen Assistant Magistrate by the Massachusetts Bay Company while in London, 1629. Sailed to Massachusetts with ANNA and 3 daughters in 1630 on the "Ambrose" as one of the leading members of John Winthrop's fleet. Settled in Roxbury, MA. First person admitted to the Roxbury church at its founding in 1632. Treasurer of the company, 1632-3. Assistant to the Massachusetts Bay General Court, 1630-6, 1642-50. Expanded maritime trade with Maine and traded for furs with the Indians. In 1636, moved to Springfield (Agawam), MA, the northern most English colony in the Connecticut (Conecicot) River Valley, with his son-in-law HENRY SMITH and 6 other families to corner fur trade routes with the Indians (outmaneuvered Dutch, Plymouth, and Hartford traders). One of its original settlers who bought land from the Indians. (Springfield was originally part of Connecticut, but WILLIAM took it back to the Massachusetts Bay Colony after Rev. Hooker censured him for letting Indians profit when there was a corn shortage after the Pequot War of 1637.) Was a magistrate of Springfield; presided over his own court and a jury of six men. Became wealthy trading with the Indians. Became a community leader and its largest land owner and principal merchant. "A man born to rule, to initiate, confident in his status and destiny." In 1650, wrote a pamphlet, *The Meritorious Price of Our Redemption*, on religious justification and whether Jesus suffered God's wrath in hell for us; he argued that Jesus' perfect obedience saved us and God would not punish him. The book was to remove obstacles to belief for Catholics and Jews, but it also severely criticized the prominent ministers and civil leaders of the Colony as full of errors, weaknesses, and heresies. They did not like a layman disputing the opinions of learned divines. "A common-sense harbinger of a less savage Christianity." The treatise was published in London, but when Massachusetts government officials received a copy, they ordered it be

burned publically in the marketplace to prevent dissemination of the heretical ideas. Branded a heretic in Massachusetts, but the church leaders in England disagreed. He agreed with the right of the government to protect the purity of doctrine. But to avoid the same form of purification as his book, he and his second wife (a widow, Frances Sanford) abandoned his lucrative enterprises and returned to England in 1652. Settled in Wraisbury on the Thames, Buckinghamshire, in 1652. Died there. Continued his theological studies, publishing more treatises. Will dated 4 Oct 1662; probated 8 Dec 1662.

12.3696. **ANNA ANDREW** (ca. 1594 - 30 Aug 1630). Born in Triwell, England. Died during her first year in Roxbury, MA.

12.3697. **WILLIAM BRADFORD** (bur. 15 Jul 1591). A yeoman of Austerfield, Yorkshire, England. Married on 21 Jul 1584.

12.3698. **ALICE HANSON** (bapt. 8 Dec 1562 - bur. 23 May 1597). Of Austerfield, Yorkshire. Married secondly Robert Briggs.

12.3699. **ALEXANDER CARPENTER** (b. ca. 1548). From Bath, Surrey. He was a Dissenter and immigrated to Leyden. Later returned to England and settled in Somersetshire. (Also an ancestor of Uncle Henry Torrey.)

12.3700. **PRISCILLA DILLEN** (d. 21 Dec 1653). From Bath, Surrey. Died in Wrington, Somerset.

12.3701. **THOMAS RICHARDS** (b. ca. 1560). Of Pitminster, Somerset.

12.3703. **DEACON THOMAS LORIN(G)** (d. 1661). From Axminster, Devonshire. Sailed to Douchester, MA, on 22 Dec 1634. Moved to Hingham, MA.

12.3705. **THOMAS ROGERS** (ca. 1571- Feb 1621). Born in Watford, Northamptonshire. Married ALICE on 24 Oct 1597 in Leyden. Member of the Leyden congregation of Separationists; moved there in 1616 or 1617 when he bought a house there (sold the house to help pay for the "Mayflower" trip). Little is known of his life or family prior to 25 Jun 1618 when he became a citizen of Leyden, but may have come over from Sandwich, Kent. Was a taxpayer in the parish of St. Bartholomew the Great in London. Described as a "camlet (waterproof cloth and coats) merchant" in Leyden. Sailed on the "Mayflower" with his twelve year old son Joseph, while his wife and the rest of their children waited in Leyden. One of the 41 signers of the "Mayflower Compact," 21 Nov 1620. (The Mayflower Compact was quickly written and signed 21 Nov 1620 in the cabin of the "Mayflower" while anchored in Provincetown harbor in order to give rights to the "strangers" so that they would not mutiny; the leaders were to elected (modeled on the Pilgrims' election of their ministers) by a vote of all adult male property-owners, not appointed by the king or the company in London; a landmark in the development of American democracy.) Died of disease during the "Great Sickness" of the first winter in Plymouth that killed half the settlers.

12.3706. **ALICE COSFORD** (bapt. 10 May 1573). Of Watford, Northamptonshire. Described in the 1622 Poll Tax in Leyden, Holland, as "Elsgen Rogiers, widow of Thonis Rogiers, an Englishwoman." Died in Leyden after 1622.

12.3707. **HUGH CHURCHMAN** (1592 - May 1644). Died in Lynn, MA. (Some genealogists doubt that he was the father of ANNA since there is no mention of her or her children in his will; but at that time daughters were often not mentioned in their parents' wills if they received their portion of the estate at the time of their wedding.)

12.3709. **JOHN PABODIE [PAYBODY or PEABODY]** (1590 - ca. 1667). Born in Nosely Parish, Lancashire, England. Admitted a Freeman in Plymouth, MA, 2 Jan 1637/8. Given 10 acres in Duxbury; given 30 more acres later. Died in Bridgewater, MA.

12.3710. **ISABEL HARPER**. From St. Albans, Hertfordshire. Survived JOHN.

12.3711. **JOHN ALDEN** (ca. prob. late 1598 - 12 Sep 1687, about age 89). A "stranger," not a "saint" (i.e., not a member of the Pilgrim congregation from Leyden — 41 "saints" and 61 servants and "strangers" recruited by the merchant adventurers were on board the "Mayflower"). Hired at Southampton as a cooper (one who makes or repairs vessels formed of staves and hoops) to look after the hogsheads of beer, water, and salted meat on board. In the words of WILLIAM BRADFORD, "John Alden was hired for a cooper, at South-Hampton, wher the ship victualed; and being a hopfull yong man, was much desired, but left to his owne liking to go or stay when he came here; but he stayed, and maryed here." Married PRISCILLA in Plymouth by 1623 in Plymouth's most famous marriage; probably Plymouth's third marriage. The youngest (and last surviving) signer of the Mayflower Compact. A wood-worker ("joiner"), farmer, and Indian trader. Above average in education. Very strong, blond, and said to be the tallest man in Plymouth. Admitted a Freeman prior to 1633. Member of Capt. Miles Standish's company. Quickly became important in Plymouth affairs. In 1626, one of 53 Plymouth men who purchased the colony from the original adventurers (he may have used PRISCILLA's inheritance) and in 1627 agreed with 8 other prominent men of the colony (including WILLIAM BRADFORD) and Miles Standish) to be an "undertaker" to pay their English debts and get control of the colony's fur trade. He, Elder Brewster, and Miles Standish formed the town of Duxbury in 1632; granted 169 acres. It became more prosperous than Plymouth. In 1634, was leader with John Howland of a Plymouth group engaged in trade in Kennebec, ME, when the group became involved in a dispute with a group from Piscataqua (Dover); one man from each side was killed; and JOHN did not take part in the violence but was detained in Boston as security against the final resolution of the conflict; no charges were brought against him. From 1633 until his death (except for 1640-50 when he was the Deputy from Duxbury), chosen to be a member of the Board of Assistants to the Governor; on committees to revise the laws. From 1666 to 1687, was Deputy Governor and "on him devolved the duty of presiding in the absence of the Govenor and on these occasions he ruled with dignity and perserverance." Treasurer, 1656-59. Often on the Council of War; an arbitrator; public and private surveyor of lands; on several occasions authorized to serve as agent or attorney-in-fact for the colony. Also a Magistrate who performed marriages (including at least two of own daughters'). His public service "reduced his estate," but his service was too valuable to lose, so the colony paid him a small gratuity. Died in Duxbury, in house built by his son John in 1653 (which is still there). Estate inventoried, 31 Oct 1687. "He was possessed of a sound judgment, and of talents, which though not brilliant were by no means ordinary, and disputable." "Indifferent to danger, a bold and hardy man of incorruptible integrity, an iron nerved Puritan who could hew down forests and live on crumbs." A devoted Puritan in both theory and practice. "He was a meek, humble, sincere, pious, and faithful follower of the blessed Redeemer, and his end

was peace and triumph.” Ancestor of Presidents John Adams and John Quincy Adams and of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

12.3712. **PRISCILLA MULLINS** (ca. 1602 - 1685). From Dorking, Surrey. Her parents and a brother all died during the Pilgrims’ first winter in Plymouth. Vivacious, dark-haired and dark-eyed; noted for her cooking. According to Rev. Timothy Alden’s account of the family history, after JOHN delivered Miles Standish’s proposal to her: “Miss Mullins listened with respectful attention, and at last, after a considerable pause, fixing her eyes on him, with an open and pleasant countenance, said, *prithoe, John, why do you not speak for yourself?* He blushed, and bowed, and took his leave, but with a look, which indicated more than his diffidence would permit him otherwise to express.” Died in Duxbury, in the house built by their son John.

12.3793. **JEAN DE FOREEST** (d. ca. 1620 at age 72). Their house was on marketplace of Avesnes, Hainaut, France. Married there on 5 Jun 1570. A wool merchant who was often absent from Avesnes. His sons JESSE and Gerard converted to Calvinism before he did. Became an avowed Protestant by 1601 when the family was living in Sedan in the Protestant principality of Luxemburg. Moved to Berghen op Zoom and to then to Leyden in 1603 and Amsterdam in 1604. Moved back from Leyden to Avesnes, where he died.

12.3794. **ANNE MAILLARD** (bur. 21 Apr 1640). Buried in Amsterdam.

12.3795. **NICAISE DU CLOUX**. A fellow merchant with JEAN DE FOREEST in Sedan.

12.3796. **MARIE AUBERTIN**.

12.3797. **PHILLIPE DU TRIEUX** (d. Apr 1601). Of Roubaix, Flanders, France. Died in Norwich, England.

12.3798. **JACQUELINE**.

12.3805. **WOLFERT WEBBER** (1587 - 1663). Of Maasland, Holland. Married TRYNTJE on 8 May 1600.

12.3806. **TRYNTJE JONAS** (ca. 1585 - 1648). Of Maesterland, Norway.

12.3807. **JAN WALLIS**. Of Vera, Zeeland, Holland.

12.3808. **SARA DE PIER**.

12.3833. **WILLIAM WALDRON** (bapt. 20 Sep 1589 - bef. 1639). Baptized in Goodworth Clatford, Hampshire, England. A clothworker like his father; bequeathed his father’s cloth shop. Shortly after 1611, left England and moved to Amsterdam. Married RUTH in 1615

12.3834. **RUTH WALKER** (1595 - bef. 1639). Of Market Overton, Rutland, England.

12.3835. **DANIEL ADRIANSZ LERNOUT [ADRIANSZ or AERJANS or ARNOULT]** (b. ca. 1592). Married MARITJE in the Walloon Church, Amsterdam, 16 Feb 1614.

12.3836. **MARITJE GOVERTS** (bapt. 25 Dec 1593 - aft. 1660).

12.3969. **HENRY CAIRNS** (d. 1601).
